Winter motoring calls for caution

Summer has spoiled motorists and made them forget their winter driving skills. But the snow, ice and slush are on the way, so with this in mind, here are a few reminders about how to cope with Old Man Winter's treacherous roads.

Be sure your vehicle is ready for winter with good tires and a well-serviced engine. And drive according to road conditions, keeping an eye out for black ice.

Remember that overnight parking on township streets is prohibited from Dec. 1 to April 1 between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. Those who do not comply with this regulation not only make it difficult for snow plows to do their jobs, but they may also be ticketed or have their vehicles towed to make way for the plows.

Allow right of way to snow removal equipment and salters, vehicles that bear flashing blue lights, and stay well back since these vehicles frequently back up.

And regardless of the season, DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE!

During the holidays and all year 'round, drive sober and be safe!

Wear a poppy and remember

For rural areas of Lambton County, high-speed Internet service has been, for the most part, hit-or-miss. Most residents in urban centers like Corunna, Brigden and Sombra have the service, but those who cannot receive the line-of-sight feed are currently excluded.

A provincial grant program, Rural Connections, will soon make it possible for rural Internet users to have true high-speed service. St. Clair Township will benefit from an agreement between Dawn-Euphemia Township, the province, and Bell Aliant to install additional equipment on existing Internet transmission towers and to erect more transmission towers in the rural areas, as will Enniskillen Township.

The purpose of this new initiative is to provide rural agribusiness and commercial concerns with the Internet service needed to be competitive in the marketplace. It will also benefit rural families on a general level.

Campers angry over rate increase

About 40 campers who currently park their recreational vehicles in township-operated campgrounds attended the regular meeting of council on Oct. 15 to protest a proposed rate increase. They had been informed by letter in August that the increase would be no greater than five per cent. However, the issue was revisited and Mayor Arnold urged council to investigate the rates charged by similar campgrounds in areas such as Chatham-Kent, citing as an example the municipally operated sites in Mitchell's Bay.

to the proposal of an increase which substantially exceeded the initial five per cent. However, input garnered from the public meeting will be considered before a final decision is made.

St. Clair councillor Darrell Randell has been nominated to sit as the representative of Lambton County municipalities on the Source Water Protection Committee. His name is currently being circulated to other county municipalities for consideration.

Safety zone being established

A Community Safety Zone will be established in Corunna on Hill Street from Brooktree Street to Lyndock Street. This designation means that motorists committing driving infractions within this zone will face double fines.

Upgrades at Wilkesport Community Centre

The Wilkesport Community Centre is being upgraded to make it handicapped-accessible, and it may receive further upgrades. It is hoped that such improvements will make the center a desirable locale for events such as election polling stations and large public meetings, thereby generating more revenue.

Since it is currently designated as an emergency evacuation center, some councillors believe it should also be fitted with a backup generator.

Fire Prevention Week contest winners

The goal of the contest is to educate children about fire safety and to encourage them to get their families involved in home fire safety and in the development of emergency evacuation strategies.

The St. Clair Township Fire Department hopes every township family will work to be fire-safe all year 'round. Homeowners are reminded that smoke alarm batteries should be replaced at least once each year. And don't forget to vacuum smoke alarms to keep sensors free from spider webs and dust that could interfere with their proper function.

It's also a good idea to replace smoke alarms after about 10 years. It's a small price to pay to ensure vour family is safe. And if your kitchen smoke alarm goes off too much, you can either pay closer attention to your cooking or buy a photoelectric smoke alarm, which is less likely to activate due to cooking accidents.
