# Golf course spruced up for new season

The St. Clair Parkway Golf Course has been spruced up to greet the new golf season. An open house in late March, which attracted an estimated 350 people, allowed avid golfers to sign up for the 2008 season and get a preview of the improvements that have been made. Gary Hackett, Director of Community Services, says the event was a tremendous success. "We had nothing but positive comments all day," he said.

The first improvements are immediately noticeable upon entering the clubhouse through the new doors. The corridor has been completely redone with ceramic tile flooring, a lower, tiled ceiling and elegantly-finished walls. In the dining room, the north wall has also received a make-over to brighten and modernize the space, and new carpet has been installed throughout the dining room and lounge. The pro shop has also been redone, with the snack bar relocated to the building's lower level.

Matt Lafontaine, the club's new general manager, says it is hoped the community will see the upgraded facility as a suitable place to hold events such as wedding receptions, reunions, retirements and showers. As proof that the changes are already paying off, he said, "Several non-golf events have already been booked (including one wedding.)"

Lafontaine says he hopes to make a substantial difference to the club. "I welcome the opportunity the township and the community has given me to come in and bring my years of experience and expertise, and to implement them in this fantastic facility. I also have to say a special thank you to the mayor and council for their commitment to the reinvestment in the St. Clair Parkway Golf Course.

#### **Public meeting** draws crowd

It was standing room only on April 21 when council held a public meeting to garner input regarding the form or density of residential uses on Emily Street lots 38 and 39 just north of the St. Clair Civic Centre. Council recently approved an amendment to the township's official plan which would see the property reclassified from 'open space' to 'residential.' According to county planner Barry Uitvlugt, at the time of the meeting, the amendment had not yet been approved at the county level.

Uitylugt reviewed several options available to council on this matter, pointing out that the proposed development of the property entailed only "a concept layout at this point." At the conclusion of his presentation, several members of the audience expressed their concerns to council. The general tone of the meeting indicated a preference that the property be retained as open space for the time being. The concept of developing the area as a recreational core was also put forward, as was the concept of retaining the property to be part of a town centre.

A concern was also raised as to the ability of the local infrastructure to support a development in that area. Engineer Terry Gray pointed

The township has received a one- out that this information can only be determined once the development size is resolved, adding that the requirements of the Ministry of the Environment must be satisfied be-

> The ability of the Courtright treatment plant to handle an additional residential load was also discussed. Mayor Arnold pointed out that, should the plant require expansion to accommodate a new development, the developer would contribute to the cost through fees paid to the township.

> Mayor Arnold told the meeting that the initial intent of exploring a residential development on the subject property was to promote local growth and to potentially stop the closure of the Mooretown-Courtright Public School. However, in light of public input, he motioned that option four, deferral, be considered by council.

> The motion to defer the matter was passed by council to allow time for clarification of the issue. A signin sheet was filled out by those in attendance and will be used to notify interested residents when the issue comes back before council.

### Better signage required

The three-lane section of the St. Clair Parkway adjacent to the No Frills store south of Corunna is posing some problems for motorists who are unsure of which lane to drive in. Council has instructed staff to investigate a solution to this problem to head off potential traffic mishaps. Clearly-painted directions on the road surface may be used to help dispel the confusion.

### Yard waste/brush collection schedule for 2008

A yard waste/brush collection program is offered in defined areas of St. Clair Township in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill. Yard waste is collected separately from regular waste on a weekly basis in urbanized areas of the township beginning at 7 a.m. In other areas, it is collected with the regular waste collection.

#### Collection Schedule

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday each week, depending upon the service area.

Wednesday: \* Corunna (including Froomfield area)

\* St. Clair Parkway (north of Emily St. in Mooretown)

Friday:

\*Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

\*Sombra village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Gardens

\* St. Clair Parkway (south of Emily St. in Mooretown)

Wednesday, June 25 and Friday, June 27. During the collected with regular waste collection subject to the six (6) item limit.

Fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, October 15 and Friday, October 17 and will continue be collected. until Wednesday, November 19 and Friday, November 21.

#### What is yard waste?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings and twigs (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil.)

The following items are not permitted: kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached.

#### Packaging for waste disposal

Spring yard waste collection will begin Wednes- bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on day, May 7 and Friday, May 9 and will continue until both sides. It must also be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. months of July through September, yard waste will be NOTE: The open container classification does not include blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg/50lb.

#### **Brush collection**

Small brush bundles will also be collected on May 9, June 20, and November 28 with the following guidelines: 4 foot maximum length, 1 inch maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled). with the bundles tied and placed neatly at the curb.

### 2008 budget supports long-term growth

Mayor Steve Arnold is the author of this month's council column. Watch for this column each month for insights directly from your municipal council.

It has been a while since I had a chance to chat with all of you. A lot has occurred over the past few months - many exciting new projects have been started or are in the works and will be released soon to the media. One of the latest was the recent announcement of a Bio-fuels Grant Funding for Project Feasibility at the Highfield farm - a great project for a very well-respected, innovative agricultural family in our community.

I understand that we will see a listing of the capital budget items in a future issue of The Beacon and we have talked as a council about setting up a travelling capital budget review and open dialogue discussions in other areas of the township.

Yes, the budget has been adopted by council and it will represent a 3.74% overall increase from 2007. Council struggled with any increase for our ratepayers. We will continue with the same basic programs throughout the municipality. We have also increased our capital spending an additional 6% and continue to aggressively complete projects to position ourselves for expanded growth and infrastructure integrity in all sectors - residential, commercial and industrial. Our capital budget will entail almost \$11.5 million in projects in all departments - a very aggressive undertaking for council and staff.

We ask for continued patience as the construction season begins. One five-month provincial project is the upgrading of Kings Highway 40 between Courtright Line and Rokeby Line. Council continues to meet with federal, provincial and county representatives to access more funds for our municipality and more projects for our continued sustainability. And we are aggressively pursuing the twinning of this township's water supply: the proposal is for a 42-inch line that will help provide additional security for all serviced areas of our township.

### Strategic plan to provide 'roadmap' for future of township

A strategic plan, dubbed St. Clair Township Now to Wow, is currently being formulated to guide the future growth and development of St. Clair Township.

The objective of this initiative, being spearheaded by CityMedia, is to gain a general consensus from the

residents of St. Clair Township. Through the use of public discussion groups and surveys, the township's strengths and weaknesses will be identified and current and future opportunities will be explored. CityMedia hopes to collect a minimum of 368 completed surveys from which to garner an accurate cross-section of opinion

A training session for community leaders was held on April 22 at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre with about 35 people in attendance. It is hoped that each person will host discussion groups where opinions and ideas can be gathered for use in setting the future direction of township development.

However, for those who cannot attend a discussion group and still wish to participate, the survey can be found on the St. Clair Township Website at www.twp.stclair.on.ca (click on Strategic Plan to the right of the screen.)

CityMedia representatives Katherine Wiggett and Joe Swan say they will use the information gathered during the next few weeks to compile a final report, which they hope to issue by June 30.

#### "Burn out" results in collision

A 52-year-old Corunna man has been charged under

section 172 of the Highway Traffic Act for "stunt driving." Lambton OPP say witnesses reported the driver had attempted to "burn out," accelerating rapidly, loosing control and rolling into the ditch along Rokeby Line west of Highway 40, where the vehicle ended up on its roof. The accused was driving a classic 1968 Plymouth Satellite, which received extensive damage during the collision. The driver received only minor injuries and was treated by Lambton EMS personnel at the scene.

The accused will appear in court on June 13 to answer to the charge.

# Al Gore trains local clergyman to present climate change program

Paul Woolley, an Anglican priest at Courtright's St. Stephen's Anglican Church, recently completed *The Climate Project* training program led by Nobel Laureate Al Gore. Dr. David Suzuki was also on hand for this three-day session in Montreal. The training will equip Woolley to spread the message about the challenges and solutions to the climate crisis.

As one of 275 Canadian trainees, Woolley will be spending the next year making presentations in and around Sarnia-Lambton, discussing how individuals, in their homes, businesses, industries and communities, can take actions necessary to reduce their environmental impact and urge others to also take action.

Woolley, who has done in-depth study into the causes and solutions to climate change and its impact on the planet, says he wants to use his training to raise awareness and spur people into taking positive steps to help save the environment. "The time to do something was yesterday," he said. "People need to hear this because it's not going to be a problem for our grandchildren, it's going to be a problem in our lifetime - it's already happening! But it's not all doom and gloom. There are solutions."

As a certified presenter, Woolley has pledged to speak on at least 10 occasions and hopes to reach 10,000 people. "My two jobs are to save souls and save the planet."

#### SPEAK YOUR MIND

I recently approached council requesting permission to establish an all-season, off-leash dog park somewhere in the township, with preference given to the Corunna area mainly due to the high concentration of dogs and owners in the community. I also specifically requested the use of Duggan Field, the former Giants baseball diamond on Hill Street. This location has existing fencing and parking facilities, and the diamond is not currently in use.

Statistics show the number of dogs in St. Clair Township greatly outnumbers those in Sarnia on a per capita basis, yet Sarnia already has an off-leash area. Trainers and researchers agree that many of the behaviour problems we see in dogs today can be

the result of too little exercise. An offleash park would provide dogs with the opportunity to engage in natural behaviour and allow them to socialize with other dogs. And while the dogs are in the park, their owners will be able to meet other owners through their common interest in dogs and perhaps share training tips.

However, as with any other privilege, owners would face certain responsibilities. Regardless of the location, if a dog park were established, owners would be required to exercise etiquette as well as exercising their dogs. Rules would need to be implemented and all park users would be required to clean up after their animals.

I believe the benefits of an off-

leash park to our community outweighs the risks. At the present time, a petition is being circulated in support of such a park and it will be presented to council at a future meeting. So far, support for a park has been extremely positive. The petition can be signed at the Corunna Veterinary Clinic or by calling 519-862-1573.
