

A bid to rezone the former Chinook Chemical site north of Port Lambton has area residents concerned. At a public meeting on Nov. 19, many of the residents were on hand to hear Lambton County planner Jeff Baranek outline a zoning by-law amendment that would see the bulk of the property changed from an M3-1 to M3 classification. The remainder of the property, previously severed from the original site, would be rezoned from M3 to M2.

The rezoning is being undertaken as part of an initiative by Chinook Global Ltd. to sell the property. An offer on the small parcel of land has already been received and would be used to house a contractor's yard, making the zone M2 classification appropriate. The M3 classification for the remainder of the property would allow it to be used for heavy industrial purposes, including the manufacture of chemical materials.

However, Chinook representative Ronald Breen pointed out that the chemical trimethylanime (TMA) and its associated products, (the materials associated with the noxious odour that often spread in the air from the site into the greater community,) were prohibited from being produced under a noncompetition agreement the company had already signed.

Breen noted any operations a buyer might propose for the site would have to be approved by the Ministry of the Environment, and current set-backs and restrictions would address community concerns. Further, Breen said he felt the wording of the planner's report was "unduly alarming." He said he spent six years working with Chinook to improve the company's performance and improve community relations, and he felt this had been accomplished.

Residents in attendance said they did not want an M3 designation awarded to the site. Some felt the site should be cleaned up and put to a use that would

have a less profound impact on the surrounding community, and some urged that an M2 designation be set for the entire site.

An alternative was suggested in the form of an M6 classification, which would preclude a heavy industrial use but would be more flexible than M2.

Council requested more information on the matter and agreed to revisit the rezoning request at its Monday, Dec. 3 meeting.

Emily Street property discussed

The proposed official plan amendment for a parcel of vacant property just north of the St. Clair Township Civic Centre on Emily Street in Mooretown drew criticism from a group of concerned residents at the Nov. 19 meeting of council.

The amendment would see the property classification change from "open space" to "residential." Council has been approached to allow the development of the property and a conditional offer has been received, but the amendment would be just the first step in pursuing this option.

The residents were upset that they didn't receive prior notice that the matter would be discussed at the Nov. 19 meeting. They feel that, since the property is public land, the public should be consulted before any move is made to sell it.

Council voted to approve the official plan amendment to "residential." Upon hearing that the amendment had been approved, the residents argued that council was not following the approved procedure for the sale of the property.

It was pointed out that the approval is just first of three steps necessary to allow any type of development on the subject property. The matter must now be addressed through the rezoning process, after which a detailed site plan will be required to gain a subdivision approval. This can only be done at the county level.

The residents say they will take the matter to an Ontario Municipal Board hearing if it is decided that the property should be developed.

Building permit infraction

Council recently discussed the matter of a resident who failed to check current municipal building code by-law revisions before proceeding with a major renovation at his home. This oversight could prove costly for the homeowner, and it is preventable.

Residents of St. Clair Township are reminded to check all municipal building code by-law revisions before making any significant alterations to their homes or places of business. This includes changes to out-buildings, grain hins etc.

Those who carry out building projects that do not conform to current building code requirements can be asked to make the changes necessary to bring the project into compliance. In extreme cases, an order can be made to demolish the project.

A failure to check current code requirements may also lead to a project being carried out without an applicable building permit. This can lead to a double permit fee being levied.

Anyone considering a major property renovation or addition should visit the St. Clair Township Civic Centre on Emily Street in Mooretown first. Up-to-date information is available and suitable building permits can be obtained if necessary.

St. Clair Township council holds regular meetings at 7 p.m. on the first and third Monday of each month. Anyone wishing to address council should call the municipal office at 519-867-2021. The next regular meeting is set for Dec. 17.



CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

Trees must be placed at the curb no later than 7 a.m. They must be free of all ornaments, stands, etc. and MUST NOT be placed in plastic bags.

For all areas of St. Clair Township where yard waste is NOT collected, Christmas trees will be collected with regular garbage. The tree will be counted as part of the six item limit.

Fire department has two new emergency vehicles on duty

The St. Clair Township fire department recently upgraded its fleet of emergency vehicles with two new rescue vehicles. The first, a 2007 GMC C5500 Duramax diesel rescue/command centre vehicle, is headed for the Corunna fire station. The vehicle, right, was purchased for about \$160,000 from Asphodel Fire Trucks Ltd. of Norwood, Ontario.

The combination rescue/command centre vehicle can carry eight firefighters, with six fully-suited firefighters safely buckled into their seats in the back service area. With immediate access to self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), these firefighters are ready to go into action as soon as they reach the scene of the emergency. The stainless steel-clad service area is also equipped as a command post, boasting a built-in 5,000 watt generator, refrigeration for an ample supply of drinking water, ample equipment storage space and built-in emergency/task lights.



The new 2007 GMC Duramax diesel rescue/command centre vehicle recently made an appearance at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre with Corunna District Deputy Chief Tim Sparks at the wheel.

The second vehicle, also a rescue unit, is a 2007 GMC C4500 walk-around unit destined for the Courtright fire station. These new vehicles will replace outdated rescue units.

Two local environmental groups receive financial support

Environmental restoration efforts in St. Clair Township and Chatham Kent recently received a welcome financial boost from the Ontario Great Lakes Renewal Foundation (OGLRF).

The foundation presented cheques totalling \$250,000, with \$50,000 going to the Rural Lambton Stewardship Network (RLSN) to help fund rehabilitation work in the St. Clair/Sydenham River Stewardship Initiative, and \$200,000 going to the provincial Ducks Unlimited Canada wetland program. The money presented to the RLSN brings to \$400,000 the total funding commitment made by the foundation since 2004. The Ducks Unlimited money is the final

instalment of a \$2.4 million six-year commitment that has allowed the organization to conserve and restore wetlands and waterfowl habitat, and in the process, substantially contribute to the improvement of water quality within designated Areas of Concern (AoC) around the Great Lakes.

Municipal representatives from St. Clair Township and Chatham Kent, as well as Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP Maria Van Bommel and Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey, were on hand for this event.

OGLRF president and CEO Don Robinson noted that the province has discontinued financial support for the foundation's work. He urged the public to lobby their government representatives to renew that support so that the ongoing effort to restore good water quality in the Great Lakes basin can continue.

Youth club helping community

The Friendship JOOI club 'book release' has been deemed a success. Nineteen club members, ages six to 11, left age-appropriate books in public places for other young people to find and read.

The group is now helping with Operation Christmas Tree as well as gathering items to make 24 treat packages to give to children who must spend the Christmas holidays in the Bluewater Health Mitton site hospital. Lambton OPP warns "Lock it or lose it!"

There is an epidemic of thefts from vehicles currently at large. in progress in St. Clair Township, as well as in several other communities throughout Lambton County.

In spite of countless warnings to keep property locked up, people are still falling victim to thefts from Clair Township alone!

The police are currently engaged in an all-out battle against these thefts, which are, for the most part, preventable. The Lock It Or Lose It campaign is part of the public awareness campaign aimed at reducing or eliminating this problem. "We hope the Lock It or Lose It program will help the public take ownership (in keeping their possessions safe)," said Cst. Reurink. "We've had because they didn't lock their vehicles."

Motorists are urged to keep all valuables out of sight and to lock vehicles, even if they will only be gone a short period of time. This strategy alone can eliminate most of the problem. "People have to understand thefts from vehicles are an easy target for people looking for change or items for their personal use," said Cst. Reurink. He added these items can also be sold and the cash used to buy drugs.

Cst. Reurink notes that victimized motorists often argue that they leave their vehicles unlocked because there is "nothing to steal." Unfortunately, the smallest amount of change or a pair of sunglasses is often enough to encourage entry of an unlocked vehicle. Once inside, the thief is able to search the rest of the vehicle, including the glove compartment, where valuable items may be stored.

Statistics show the majority of thefts from unlocked vehicles are done by youngsters. Cst. Reurink says part of the solution lies in parents knowing where their children are at all times. He advises parents that, if their children say they are going to sleep over at a friend's house, the friend's parents should be contacted to make sure they are aware of the arrangement. "We've had young kids found out on the streets at all hours of the night," said Cst. Reurink. "That's where the provincial curfew comes in." The curfew states that minors found out on the streets unaccompanied by adults between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. can be picked up by police and taken to the nearest police station. The children's' parents are called and instructed to pick them up at the station. This situation occurs more often than most people would imagine, and Cst. Reurink says in most cases, the children's parents are unaware that the children are

Public vigilance has also come in handy in solving some of the cases that have plagued St. Clair Township this year. In November, information from a Corunna citizen led the Lambton OPP to arrest a 17-year-old Cotheir unlocked vehicles and homes. > Part of the Lock It or Lose It campaign involves police officers doing random checks to see if vehicles are locked. Should the officer find an unlocked vehicle, a special 'ticket' is left either inside the vehicle or under the windshield wiper to remind the owner to lock up.

As Christmas approaches, be mindful of the need to some people who've been victimized more than once protect your property. Christmas shopping should be kept out of sight and vehicles should be securely locked, even if parked in the owner's own driveway. Cst. Reurink hopes all motorists and property owners will take the time to protect their property now and in the future.

Ratepayers contest rezoning of Emily Street property

Two concerns for over 100 ratepayers, many of whom attended the Nov. 19 St. Clair Township council meeting, regarding the proposed sale of public land immediately north of the St. Clair Township Civic Centre (lot 38 and 39, 8.3 acres along Emily Street in Mooretown) for the purposes of private residential development are: 1. The lack of information, knowledge and awareness at large among township ratepayers regarding this council endeavour currently underway; 2. We would like to know what other St. Clair Township ratepayers think about this situation.

Should the land be: a. rezoned to residential to allow private ownership or; b. retained as it is for future public needs opposite a multitude of end uses which could enhance public services in an already existing civic centre development area (ie. medical centre, senior citizens residence, curling rink, etc.)

Also, remember that the potential industrial expansion boom, becoming reality, would accelerate public service needs and wants. Allowing this green space to remain as it is would facilitate the creation, at some future time, of a public core area to address these needs

and wants.

Our campaign to seek signatures on a petition opposing the rezoning of this property has so far been signed by over 100 concerned ratepayers. We will continue to collect signatures with the expectation that upwards of 80 per cent of those approached will oppose the current action to rezone this property as residential. It is our intent that, if the property is rezoned to residential, we will take the petition and our concerns to the Ontario Municipal Board for a hearing. Our intrepid correspondent at Sir John Moore Community School says autumn has been a busy and exciting time for the students, beginning with the Terry Fox Run in September which raised over \$2,900 for cancer research. In sports, the intermediate boys' and girls' soccer teams were both victorious in the south Sarnia A Division soccer tournaments. The school's cross-country team of 49 runners garnered the most points of all Lambton schools at the area crosscountry meet on Oct. 16. And at the Lambton-Kent cross-country meet on Oct. 29, 23 Sir John Moore runners placed well in their individual divisions. This month, the school has been engaged in Christmas fundraising projects to benefit Operation Christmas Tree. Students are collecting Canadian Tire money to be used to buy gifts, and non-perishable food items are also being collected. Throughout the year, the students who belong to the school's Colour Houses earn participation points for their efforts in projects such as this. The houses are: The Green Giants, The Yellow Jackets, The Big Red Machine, The Purple Raptors, and The Orange Flames.

At St. Joseph Catholic School, students raised \$16,382 for cancer research during their Terry Fox campaign. Principal Bill Nelson became the *ice cream* in an ice cream sundae after students surpassed his challenge to raise over \$10,000. Top fundraisers and class representatives got to "top" Mr. Nelson with gooey goodies like chocolate syrup, whipped cream, sprinkles and even feathers (a ticklish situation to be sure!) A cheque was presented to Terry Fox Committee member Margaret Alexander, a retired school secretary, who accepted on behalf of the Terry Fox Foundation. In 2006, the school was ranked 20th in the province for money raised by elementary schools to benefit cancer research and the Terry Fox Foundation.
