Fluoridation vote not supported

The ongoing discussion regarding the ramifications of the Fluoridation Act of 1990 and their current impact on the Lambton Area Water Supply System (LAWSS) was discussed during the August sitting of council.

The act requires that before the fluoridation of a community's water supply can be terminated, a public plebiscite must be held to reveal the will of the public. However, Mayor Steve Arnold, currently a member of the LAWSS governance board, pointed out that such a decision should be made by the board and should be based on the best available science.

LAWSS currently has six member municipalities: St. Clair Township, the City of Sarnia, Point Edward, Plympton-Wyoming, Warwick and part of Lambton Shores. Alvinston uses the water but does not have a seat on the board.

After the discussion, council voted to not support the efforts to conduct a plebiscite vote relative to the water fluoridisation issue. It was generally felt that the decision must be made by the governance board after the review of the most up-to-date and well-researched information available.

Local tourism discussed

Local tourism was the subject of a visit to council by John Dickson, interim general manager of Tourism Sarnia Lambton. Mr. Dickson outlined his organization's role in promoting local tourism and efforts that can be made to assist municipalities in promoting their own tourist attractions. During the presentation, Mr. Dickson pointed out there were advertising opportunities available for local festivals and he described his efforts to prepare the 2009 business plan as well as a draft strategic plan. Council inquired about specific efforts that could be used to assist St. Clair Township. One example of such efforts would be the installation of better signage along main roads denoting the location of area attractions such as the township's two museums and the St. Clair Parkway Golf Course.

Envirofresh project gets conditional permit

Council approved a conditional building permit to allow the commencement of some of the work on Phase One of the Envirofresh Produce Inc. development at the Terra International site north of Sombra. Approval was given to activities such as the digging and setting of greenhouse posts, the installation of footings and

foundations for the service building area, and the construction of the entrance and parking lot area. Approval also required the owner to provide security amounting to \$25,000 for the removal of all work completed that does not meet site plan requirements.

Council has authorized the building inspector to enter into the conditional permit agreement and issue the permit with a separate fee for the service building as specified in the building inspector's previous report.

OMB appeal made

Some residents concerned about the recent zoning amendment to property just north of the St. Clair Township Civic Centre recently attended council to discuss OMB appeals which resulted from the amendment approval. The group was informed that one appeal to the OMB was made relative to the zoning amendment and one appeal has been filed with the board relative to the suburban residential zoning. Two of the residents who have attended the previous public meetings were informed by township CAO John Rodey that they could seek to have participant status with the board.

St. Clair Township council holds regular meetings on the first and third Monday of each month at 7 p.m.

Police seek information about thefts

The Lambton OPP is requesting public assistance to address a number of unsolved incidences of theft, break-and-enter and mischief that have occurred in the township recently.

These incidents include mischief that occurred at a Fane Street apartment complex in August. Several vehicles had painted surfaces scratched and tires slashed.

At the Corunna Home Hardware. items valued at about \$4,700 were taken during an overnight break-in on Aug. 12/13. Items included a 4400 volt Coleman generator, an 1800 volt Honda gen-

erator, a red Honda rottotiller, and a General Steer post auger and ten-inch bit.

The person or people responsible for incidents of vandalism and mischief, such as the recent defacing of the fire hall at the Moore Museum, are also being sought by police.

The Lambton OPP asks residents to stay alert for any suspicious activity and to report this activity immediately. Using timely reports from concerned citizens, the Lambton OPP can not only apprehend more suspects, but can identify and address growing crime trends in any given
