Operation Christmas Tree benefits community's less fortunate families

Once again this year, Operation Christmas Tree will be helping to make the holidays brighter for many of north St. Clair Township's less fortunate families. The Christmas hamper program has been operated by the Optimist Club of Moore since 1989 and, every year, the club accepts donations of cash, food, and new toys.

The organizing committee will be seeking donations from local individuals, groups and businesses throughout the area for this worthy cause. It is estimated that the total budget stemming from all types of donations be \$48,500. Operation Christmas Tree has been a registered charity with tax exempt status since Dec. 17, 1992 and all cash donations over \$10 are eligible for tax receipts upon request.

This year's collection initiative will formally begin on Thursday, Nov. 20 with the annual Poor Boy luncheon at the Royal Canadian Legion Corunna branch hall on Albert Street. From 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., the Legion auxiliary will offer a hearty lunch and everyone is welcome to attend. The cost of admission is by free will offering at the door. Food for the luncheon is donated by the auxiliary.

On Monday, Nov. 24, the Operation Christmas Tree distribution/collection centre will open at the former Murray Street Public School building thanks to the generosity of owners Earle and Angela Gilgeous and EGA Systems. Donations can be dropped off there from Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 3

Local schools will be collecting non-perishable food items for Operation Christmas Tree and these are scheduled to be collected by officers from the Corunna office of the Lambton OPP, as well as volunteer firefighters from the St. Clair Township Fire Department Corunna and Brigden stations, on Thursday, Dec. 11.

The Lambton OPP Corunna station and the Corunna Community Policing Committee will also host the third annual Operation Christmas Tree donation drive-thru in the station's parking lot at the south end of Lyndoch Street on Saturday, Dec. 13 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Santa Claus will be on hand to personally thank all those who show their Christmas spirit through their generous donations.



St. Clair Township has no shortage of generous people who are willing to donate their time and talents to various clubs, causes and organizations.

The media spotlight recently shone upon two of these people. Bob and Marilyn Johnson, long-time volunteers at the Moore Museum, were the subjects of a CKCO-TV *Local Heroes* feature news story. CTV videographer Rick Smith met with the Mooretown couple at the museum site to interview the Johnsons and gather video footage to air on the Monday, Sept. 15 evening newscast.

Bob Johnson, a Dow Chemical retiree, has been a volunteer at the museum for 17 years and says he enjoys the things he is able to do there. "I really enjoy this (volunteering)," he said. "I just like building things." Bob's construction know-how is in evidence all around the Moore Museum site. Projects he has worked on include the St. Clair Trinity Chapel, the range light, the Basswood Block, the train station, the caboose and the fire hall. He also helped install the new shop areas in the Shaw building.

Marilyn Johnson has lent her considerable talents to the betterment of the museum for the past 12 years. Pleasant summer days find her out tending the gardens and keeping the museum grounds groomed, although she pitches in with many other museum tasks. Why?

"It's an awesome place to work," she says. "It's just like coming home."

The Johnsons are so enthusiastic about their work at the Moore Museum that they have often enlisted the help of their children and grandchildren to help with various museum activities and functions.

About 70 people currently volunteer at the Moore Museum and the Johnsons are representative of the commitment and love these volunteers have for the work they do there. It is estimated that about 1,100 manhours of work have been donated to the museum in the past year.

Moore Museum curator Laurie Mason says volunteers are a priceless resource. "They're very valuable to us," she said. "Our community supports us financially and with the artifacts that make up the museum, but they also support us by volunteering. We just wouldn't be able to do the things we do without them. We have 12 buildings and we need our volunteer maintenance crew to look after them - there are just so many things to do. And we can always use more volunteers." She added, "We have lots for volunteers to do. (For instance) they can help at events or do office work like inputting files into the computers. We can always figure out something they can do to put their talents to use."

Regional Neighbourhood Watch meeting in Brigden

The Corunna Community Policing Committee will host the ninth annual Southwestern Ontario Regional Neighbourhood Watch meeting on Saturday, Oct. 25 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Brigden Community Hall.

This event is held to allow Neighbourhood Watch members from the region to share information and experiences. The meeting will also feature several presentations. A representative of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will explain the role and responsibilities of the RCMP in protecting Canada. Ron Flowers of the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) will discuss the smuggling of people, drugs and property, and the role and goals of the CBSA. Cst. Ken McLaughlin of the Sarnia Police Services will explain identity theft and offer prevention strategies. And OPP Cst. Paul Gagne will make a presentation about bombs.

High gas prices lead to thefts

Tips on combating fuel thefts

With the cost of gasoline on the rise, the temptation to 'borrow' fuel from other motorists becomes increasingly attractive. During the summer, the OPP received a number of reports of fuel thefts across Ontario. In a single month, \$80,000 worth of diesel fuel was reported stolen.

The following tips have been offered by the OPP to help motorists, as well as gas station owners and business and farm owners with large fuel storage facilities, prevent fuel theft.

Motorists should park in well-lit areas where foot traffic is high if possible. (This is also helpful in ensuring personal safety at night.) Those who regularly leave their vehicles unattended in high-risk areas should consider using a locking gas cap, with the gas cap key kept separately from the ignition key if it is left with a parking lot attendant.

If possible, keep the vehicle in the garage with the door closed and locked. And never leave an unattended vehicle open with the key in the ignition even in the winter because thieves who have come to steal gasoline may steal the vehicle instead.

Business and farm owners who have large fuel storage facilities on their land should make sure pumps and access to the storage tanks are secured with heavy duty locks. If the location is isolated and unsupervised for long periods of time, consider installing lights and security cameras. And if any suspicious activity or persons are detected in the area, advise police immediately.

Gas station owners should consider installing security cameras to record license plates of customers at all pumps. If someone tries to "gas and dash," this information can help police apprehend the suspect. An attendant monitoring the cameras can also determine if a license plate has been concealed.

Where possible, obtain pre-payment for fuel before activating the pump. Police

recommend this especially after dark. Owners of gas stations with multiple pumps on more than one island are advised to put the islands farthest from the attendant's kiosk out of service during slow periods and when staff is limited.

And finally, police advise the public to never confront a thief who is in the process of stealing fuel. Call 911 immediately and write down the license plate number, colour, make and model of any vehicles involved in the theft, plus a description of the suspects involved.

Cyclist dies in collision

A 64-year-old Brigden man has died as the result of a collision that occurred the evening of Sept. 20. Lambton OPP reports the man was riding his bicycle northbound on Brigden Road when he swerved and struck a northbound pickup truck driven by a Dawn-Euphemia man.

The OPP Technical Traffic Collision Investigation Unit attended the scene to determine what happened and police say no charges will be laid as a result of the collision.

Police say cyclists out riding after dark are required to have a white light on the front of their bicycle and a red light on the back. The bicycle should also be equipped with reflectors and reflective tape on the wheels, spokes and frame. Cyclists are advised to wear light-coloured, reflective clothing and should ride in the same direction as the traffic is going. Anyone under the age of 18 is required by law to wear a helmet, but it is a wise safety practice for all cyclists to wear a properly-fitted helmet when riding.

Police urge caution after dirt bike tragedy

Lambton OPP is advising caution in response to a recent dirt bike incident that resulted in the death of a 17-year-old Wilkesport teen. Police say the teen was riding a dirt bike southbound through a field along Bickford Line when he drove into the path of a car being driven along Bickford Line by an Alvinston man. The

teen was taken to hospital in critical condition but died as the result of his injuries.

The OPP's Technical Traffic Collision Investigation Unit attended the scene, but no charges were laid.

The Lambton OPP reminds all motorcycle riders that helmets must be worn and properly fastened whenever their vehicles are in operation.

Other policing issues

The Lambton OPP has responded to other St. Clair Township locations during the past month for a variety of reasons. These are just a few of the many incidents that required police investigation:

A residence on Sixth Street in Courtright was entered when an exterior door lock was forced. About \$200 in cash was taken.

A public complaint of erratic driving prompted Lambton OPP officers to try to apprehend a motorist along Rokeby Line. While in pursuit, police clocked the suspect traveling at speeds up to 150 kilometres per hour in an 80 kph zone. The pursuit was discontinued in the interest of public safety, but the suspect's vehicle crashed at the corner of Rokeby Line and Mandaumin Road a short time later. Officers apprehended the suspect who had left the vehicle and was fleeing on foot. The suspect, a Samia man, will appear in Samia court to answer to Criminal Code of Canada charges of dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, flight from police, and failing to comply with a court order

And at a Colborne Street residence in Corunna, the tires and rims of a 2007 Chevrolet Corvette were taken in an overnight theft in early September. The items were valued at about \$7,600.
