Lambton G.S. reprieve would benefit township

The recent decision to postpone the Darlington nuclear power plant expansion may be positive news for St. Clair Township. It may mean that coal-fired power stations like Lambton Generating Station south of Courtright will remain open past the current 2014 closure deadline.

Mayor Steve Arnold com-

mented, "We are hopeful these announcements will have a long term positive direction for the site. We hope they will strengthen...our employment outlook as well as new investments involving greener technology. We know that those who work at L.G.S. continue to rise to any challenge they are given in a

safe and environmentally responsible way."

Ground broken for regional waste water treatment plant

The much-anticipated construction of the new regional waste water treatment plant in Courtright is underway.

An official ground-breaking was held on July 24 to kick off the project. Two-thirds of the \$31,000,000 cost of the project will come from the Federal and Provincial governments.

The project involves vast improvements and upgrades including new treatment plant tankage, alterations and expansion to the existing building and pumping station, biosolids storage and a new outfall sewer. With these improvements in operation, the Corunna waste treatment plant will be decommissioned and replaced with a pumping station that will convey sewage to the Courtright station.

Officials say the project will benefit not only the communities of Corunna, Mooretown and Courtright, but other users within the St. Clair River watershed as a result of improved waste water effluent and plant reliability.

The increased treatment capacity will provide redundancy for the plant and prevent plant failures in the event of high flows or maintenance malfunctions, and will also provide sufficient capacity to support anticipated community growth within the proposed official plan service area for the next 20 years.

The project is being undertaken because the existing Courtright plant, which was designed 35 years ago, is nearing the end of its useful life. Maintenance is becoming difficult because the equipment is becoming obsolete.

From an environmental standpoint, the new plant will help ensure the sustainability of the natural environment by improving effluent quality and ensuring the future growth within the service

area will not impact surface water.

Community health will also be positively affected. The improved effluent will reduce potential human health effects due to recreational uses of the St. Clair River downstream of the plant. Also, with additional capacity, it is hoped many existing private septic systems will eventually be tied into the waste water system.

DIARY*****Walkerton tragedy has sparked protective measures***

The author of this month's Council Diary is Councillor Darrell Randell. Watch this column each month for insights straight from the St. Clair Township council chambers.

When the Walkerton tragedies occurred back in 2000, a process began that places scrutiny on all aspects of safety in the provision of reliably safe municipal drinking water.

The process has been lengthy. It involved multiple hearings, criminal investigations, and hundreds of expert testimonies, and it eventually resulted in Justice O'Connor's decision which included recommendations for action to ensure that all municipal water systems are safe.

The O'Connor ruling led to the Clean Water Act. This is an act that has primacy over any other act that puts forward conflicting regulations. It has led to the establishment of Source Water Protection Areas, with local people as members representing various stakeholder interests. Most of Lambton County is part of the Thames-Sydenham Source Protection Area. This is a huge area which stretches from Leamington to beyond Stratford and Woodstock. It also includes the cities of London, Samia, Chatham, St. Mary's and seven First Nation bands.

I was appointed to be the municipal representative for Lambton County. For nearly two years, the committee has been meeting and working to pull together a Source Water Protection plan. This process is expected to take five years to get through, but that does not mean remedial action will wait for the plan. As assessment reports are completed on each intake, the operators at each

plant are still responsible and will act to correct any deficiencies. There is a Stewardship Fund available to assist with these early actions.

Aside from myself, there are two other members of the committee as general public representatives who reside in St. Clair Township. Both Doug McGee and Joe Kerr are environmentally knowledgeable farmers - I am always impressed by the knowledge and sincerity of the entire community where matters of the environment are concerned.

Our committee is a very diverse group and everyone brings with them skills and experience that contribute to the plan. It includes a lot of learning, too. At our June meeting, we viewed a moving and surprisingly entertaining presentation by Walkerton resident Bruce Davidson. He used humour and emotion to explain how it felt to live in a town where people were becoming sick due to an unknown cause. He said he saw neighbours become ill and, in some cases, die. Davidson described how terrifying it was to see a neighbour boy - a child whom his own children played with - airlifted to hospital.

Davidson's presentation was entitled, "Walkerton - The Cost Of Getting It Wrong!" The series of failures that resulted in this tragedy must never be repeated. 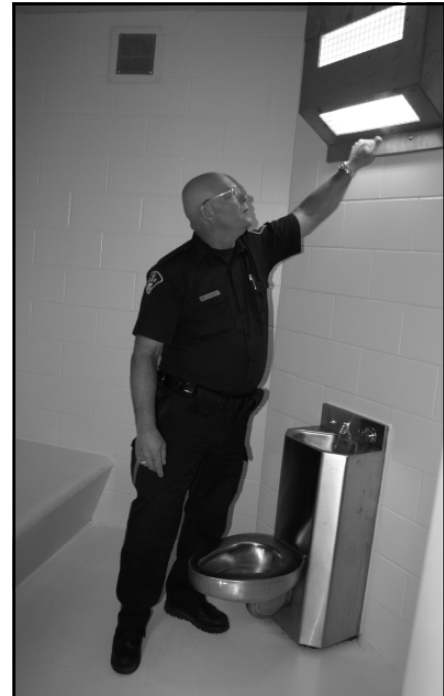
Some members of the OPP Emergency Response Team hosted a display of some of the vehicles and equipment they use on the job.

Visitors wait for a guided tour of the new facility.

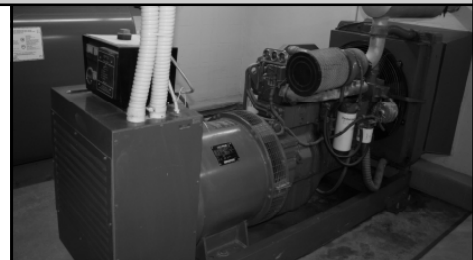

New play area makes big splash in Corunna



The new splash pad in the Corunna Athletic Park was dedicated during a formal ceremony on July 18. On hand for the occasion were several members of St. Clair Township council, including Mayor Steve Arnold, who got to try out the new equipment first hand when the water was turned on a bit too soon.

The cost of the splash pad is estimated at \$160,000, with the Optimist Club of Moore raising half of the cost and the Township of St. Clair contributing half. Optimist Club president Fred Strickland says the club has raised about \$54,000 to date and is continuing its

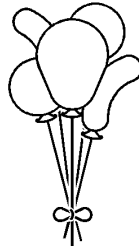

The pioneer past came alive recently as the Moore Museum hosted its Heritage Festival. About 80 people turned out to enjoy the journey back in time.

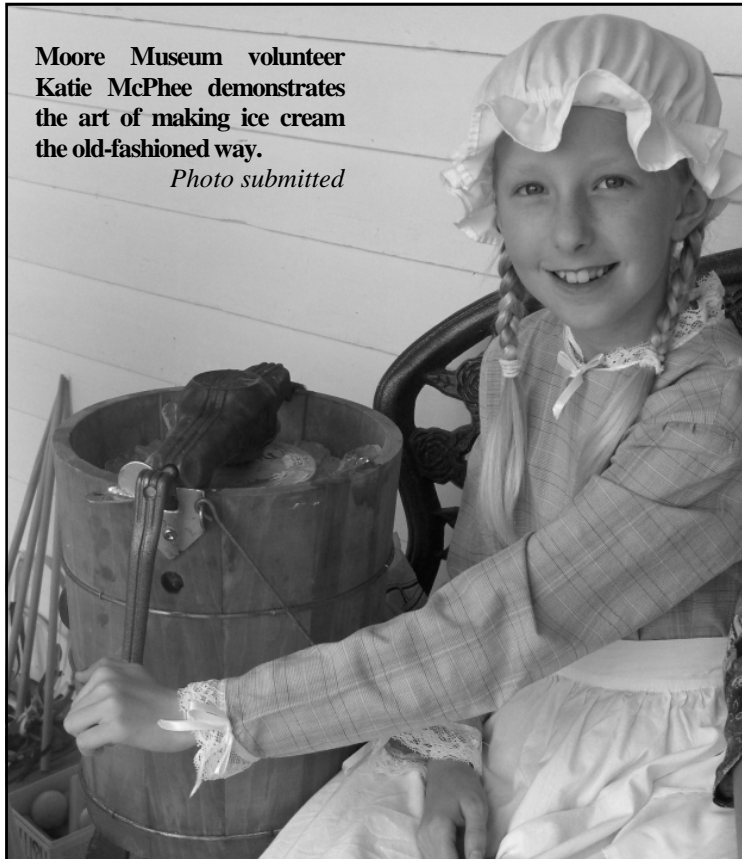
