# Olympic torch to make appearance in Corunna

The 2010 Olympic Winter Games will take place far from St. Clair Township, but its iconic symbol will be traveling through the township on Christmas Eve.

Three local residents will be carrying the torch during the local leg of the torch run. which is anticipated to take place just before 10 a.m. on Dec. 24. The public is invited to be at the clock tower park in Corunna to witness the torch's arrival, and there will be refreshments provided for all those who brave the winter weather to show their Olympic spirit.

In preparation for this event, Mayor Steve Arnold and the designated torch bearers will visit local schools to hand out torch wavers which have been provided by local industries and St. Clair Township as mementos of the occasion. These wavers will also be available at the clock tower prior to the arrival of the Olympic torch caravan on Dec.

Event organizers are hoping that all township residents will be on hand to enjoy this grand prelude to the 2010 winter Olym-

# Change may save OPGs Lambton Generating Station

A long-time corporate resident of St. Clair Township may survive into the future if environmental changes can be effected to insure its survival.

Ontario Power Generation's Lambton Generating Station south of Courtright was originally slated for closure under a provincial government mandate to phase out coal-fired power plants by 2014. However, Lambton's fall 2009 newsletter, Neighbours, recently carried the news that Lambton's units three and four will remain in service while units one and two will be placed in a permanent safe shutdown state. According to Steve Repergel, the station's corporate relations officer, the shutdown will necessitate a reduction in staffing levels. "We anticipate a reduction in staff of about 102 employees," he said. However, these employees will be given options. Mr. Repergel says many will be placed elsewhere in non-nuclear generation facilities while others may opt to accept appropriate severance packages.

Lambton's community presence has always included community involvement in fundraising efforts like the Canadian Cancer Society's Relay for Life, the annual United Way of Sarnia-Lambton campaign and many other local initiatives. Mr. Repergel says the station's employees will remain actively involved in efforts that benefit the community. In addition, the biodiversity preservation initiative which occupies a large area of land behind

# Parcels of riverside land not for sale

From time to time, some property owners along the St. Clair Parkway make inquiries about purchasing small parcels of river shoreline property across the parkway from their home. These small parcels of land were transferred to the township by the former St. Clair Parkway Commission with the approval of the provincial government subject to restrictions that they would be retained in public ownership as park lands or for other specific public uses.

Council directed staff to contact the Ministry of Tourism, the provincial body responsible for the matter, to see if the land could be sold, since some of the land in question is already being cared for by the adjacent property owners.

In a letter to the township from John Ota, manager of the provincial Tourism Agencies Branch, permission to sell the land was denied. Mr. Ota pointed out that the ministry would require a strong and compelling business case for any such sales.

# Alternate fuels hold key to Lambton's survival

the station will continue. Mr. Repergel notes it's still at the forefront and he anticipates the project will be maintained and sustained into the future.

But what of Lambton's future as a power generation facility? The possibility of converting the station to an alternative fuel source like natural gas or biomass is being seriously considered, according to Mr. Repergel. Biomass is the energy stored in renewable organic materials like wood, vegetable oil and wastes from agriculture, forest, and industrial sources. When burning biomass, the amount of carbon dioxide released during combustion is equal to the amount absorbed by a

plant while it is growing, so it is said to be *carbon-neutral*. It is even possible to outfit a co-fire station to burn both fuels simultaneously.

Mr. Repergel says two preliminary tests using biomass have already been carried out at Lambton. This is in addition to biomass testing that has been carried out at OPG's Atikokan and Nanticoke Generating Stations over the past three years.

Hopes are high that Lambton will have a future beyond 2014, but Mr. Repergel says there is much to be done before the station's transformation can take place. "We've still got a long, long way to go," he said. "We still have a lot of evaluations to do before we retrofit."

## Corunna chosen for youth pilot project

Corunna has been chosen as the sight of a pilot project that will help local children who are being bullied or persecuted, or feel unsafe or frightened.

The program, Harmony Haven, is an initiative of Harmony for Youth, a local charity for youth based in Sarnia-Lambton. Harmony promotes self-esteem through the arts and is a strong advocate against bullying.

Harmony Haven's mandate is to provide safe havens within communities where individuals can go when needed. Community volunteers are being sought and will be supplied with signs that can be put in residence windows so that children can recognize the house as a safe haven. Each household that hosts a sign will be checked by a police officer and all adults in the residence will undergo a police check.

The project is being sponsored by Libro Financial and the OPP. Since bullying has become such a significant problem, it is hoped the program will get underway as soon as possible.
