

Mayor Arnold first County Warden from St. Clair Townhip

Mayor Steve Arnold has become the first Lambton County Warden ever elected from St. Clair Township. The election took place during a meeting of Lambton County Council on Dec. 1. With 16 county councillors voting by secret ballot, Mayor Arnold was elected from a field of four candidates which included incumbent Jim Burns, Mayor of Enniskillen Township, Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley and Petrolia Mayor John McCharles.

Embarking on a two-year term of office, Warden Arnold expressed gratitude for the opportunity to lead county council through the challenges that lay ahead. "It's very humbling to be elected to lead county council as warden," he said. "I'm grateful to work with all of our county communities to make Lambton County a better, stronger place in the future."

Warden Arnold expressed his appreciation for the community support he has received and says he will be keeping the taxpayers' best interests firmly in mind in the months ahead. He says his top priority will be the responsible use of county taxpayer dollars. "This year will be tough, but I want to be fiscally responsible and prudent with the taxpayer's purse."

Thousands of visitors see Moore Museum

This year has been a great year for the Moore Museum. Curator Laurie Mason reports the facility received about 4,500 visitors this year. In addition, many local school children attended educational programs at the museum. The Moore Museum, which offers 10 such programs, ran 60 educational sessions in 2010. "Highlights of our school programming are first-person interpretation and hands-on activities to engage students in discovering the lives of early settlers," Mrs. Mason explained.

Those who have been to the museum site this year know that the new general store building has been taking shape thanks to the efforts of many museum volunteers. They were able to complete the exterior of the building before the winter weather set in. Also new this year are the special tour booklets and the activity centres geared to the children who visit the facility. And, as always, the Trinity St. Clair Chapel continues to be a popular place to say, "I do."

Mrs. Mason says visitors from as far away as Guatemala and England enjoyed the Moore Museum experience this year. She notes many visitors came to see family artefacts which are included in some of the museum's collections. One visitor wrote in the guest book, "I liked seeing my dad's crib in the nurse's office."

Fury of winter storm brings out Christmas spirit

Chances are that the vicious winter storm that ripped through Lambton County in mid-December will become "the great storm of 2010" in the lore of South-western Ontario. The storm, which closed down Highway 402 and came dangerously close to foiling the efforts of vital emergency crews, presented incredible challenges for those who responded to the crisis.

Here in St. Clair Township, Steve Bicum, Deputy Chief of the St. Clair Township Fire Department, says volunteer firefighters responded to numerous emergency situations across the municipality. The action began on Sunday evening with a twovehicle collision at the intersection of Kimball and Courtright Line. "The Brigden fire station (crew) had to extricate one occupant and two were transported to hospital," he said. "By Monday morning, dozens of cars and transport trucks that were attempting to get around the 402 closure were literally stopped in their tracks on Plank Road and Petrolia Line."

As the storm continued, Deputy Chief Bicum says the OPP teamed up with St. Clair Fire Department staff to use four-wheel drive trucks to effect the rescue of stranded motorists. From his account, it seems the storm brought out the best in the community. As an example, Deputy Chief Bicum says one caring citizen off-loaded the mini-excavator he'd been towing in an effort to dig out trapped occupants of vehicles stopped along Petrolia Line. The man's efforts are barely visible in the photograph at the top of this page.

As the storm continued to rage, rescue workers used snowmobiles to reach stranded motorists. Police say 350 vehicles were affected by the horrendous road conditions. Lambton County Warden Steve Arnold declared a state of emergency and Emergency Management Ontario issued a red alert for Highway 402. Canadian Forces air support, in the form of three rescue helicopters, was summoned to help retrieve those still stranded in immobilized vehicles along the road.

The storm caused power outages in many places in the township. Deputy Chief Bicum says Brigden was without power for over 18 hours and the Brigden fire station provided food and shelter to about 50 people. Chief Roy Dewhirst noted, "It is great to see neighbours helping neighbours in times like these. We had very few issues in the township because people got involved and looked after one another. People took in strangers from the cold; farmers helped to clear roads, and friends checked on elderly neighbours."

All around the township and throughout Lambton County, residents fought the storm by helping complete strangers survive and find shelter. Lambton OPP reports spoke of numerous warming centers being set up for those who were rescued from trapped vehicles and for those left without power. Communities opened their public buildings and offered a place to sleep and nourishment to see everyone through the storm.

The great storm of 2010 challenged many of us to survive its fierce onslaught and, in this scenario, human kindness won out

over Old Man Winter. The storm failed to claim even one life in Lambton County thanks, in no small part, to the efforts of an extended community that was unwilling to abandon those in need.

For many, Christmas came early this year.

Emergency Management Ontario has developed an Emergency Survival Checklist that outlines the basic between life and death. A vehicle emergency kit should items every individual should have at home, including:

- Flashlight
- Radio or a hand-crank radio
- Spare batteries for flashlight and radio
- First aid kit
- Telephone that will function during a power interruption (such as a traditional land line)
- Candles and matches/lighters
- Extra car keys and cash
- Important papers for identification
- Non-perishable food (ready-to-eat and requiring no refrigeration)
- Manual can opener
- Bottled water (four litres per person per day)
- Clothing and footwear
- Blankets or sleeping bags
- Toilet paper and other personal items
- An adequate supply of all necessary medication
- Backpack/duffle bag
- Whistle (to attract attention, if required)
- Playing cards and amusements that do not require power

Families with babies or toddlers will also need to stock items such as diapers, baby food and formula, as

In the car, an emergency kit may mean the difference include:

- Shovel
- Sand, salt or kitty litter for traction
- Traction mats
- Compass
- Cloth or roll of paper towels
- Warning light or road flares
- Extra clothing and footwear
- Non-perishable food and water
- Small tool kit
- Booster cables
- Ice scraper and brush
- Road maps
- Matches or a "survival" candle in a deep can (to warm hands, heat a drink or use as an emergency light)
- Fire extinguisher
- Flashlight and batteries
- First aid kit with seatbelt cutter
- Blanket

Regular check of smoke alarms saves lives

Smoke alarms are required by law in every residence, but they won't do you much good if they don't work properly. Batteries should be replaced at least once per year or whenever the low battery warning is heard. Be sure to test the alarm after installing a new battery and once each month to make sure the alarm is in good working order. If the alarm fails to sound, even when the battery is replaced, replace the smoke alarm. Smoke alarms have a finite lifespan, so the alarm should be replaced with a new one every 10 years. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instruction for installing, testing and maintaining the smoke alarm.

Homeowners who operate wood stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent about the upkeep of smoke alarms and should also be sure to have a carbon monoxide alarm.

Music and merriment fill the air as Santa comes to St. Clair Township



Generous community supports Operation Christmas Tree

The 2010 Operation Christmas Tree program once again received the generous support of the entire community. The statistics speak for themselves.

The Poor Boy lunch kick-off event on Nov. 18 raised \$2,000. On Dec. 11, the Corunna OPP office's annual drive-through donation event garnered cash donations totalling \$1,025, plus 1,014 food items and over 200 toys. This was a marked increase over 2009 donations. which totalled \$506 in cash 682 food items and 168 toys. Volunteers from the Corunna Community Policing Committee, Lambton OPP, Lambton College and the Optimist Club of Moore helped Santa receive the generous donations. OPP Media Relations Officer Cst. Chrystal Jones called the effort, "an overwhelming success" and extended thanks to everyone who supported the event.

Fred Strickland of the Optimist Club of Moore says the total funds raised amounted to about \$24,000. The food collection amounted to 11,982 items - about 13,420 pounds or 6.71 tons. Volunteers were crucial to the success of the program, with 313 people -175 adults and 138 children - helping to sort and box 118 Christmas hampers.
