Development charge will help fund public projects Council recently held a public meeting pursuant to The Development Charge Act, 1997, regarding proposed development charge rates and policies. At the Feb. 22 meeting of council, Jason Bevon of Hemson Consulting Ltd. presented the Development Charges Background Study for council's consideration and the new development charge by

-law was approved.

Development charges are levied against new development and are a primary source of funding for development-related capital expenditures such as sewers, roads, municipal buildings and equipment. St. Clair Township Clerk John DeMars points out this is not a tax.

## River pipeline project well underway

The Enbridge pipeline replacement project, which will see a new pipeline installed under the St. Clair River using a process called horizontal directional drilling (HDD), is well on the way to completion.

Since the beginning of February, on a site just north of Froomfield, the construction team has been assembling segments of the pipeline in preparation for it to be pulled through a tunnel that has been bored underneath the St. Clair River. Before the pipeline is installed, it will undergo hydrostatic testing which will reveal any leaks that may be present so that they can be addressed. Enbridge Pipelines Inc. spokesman Ken Hall says the tunnel under the river, which was originally to be drilled from the American side was, in fact, drilled from both sides to increase the accuracy of the tunnelling process. A pilot hole measuring nine inches in diameter was drilled first, then a larger tunnel was reamed to accommodate the newly-assembled 42-inch pipeline. Mr. Hall added the new pipeline will be pulled through the tunnel

in early March. It is hoped the pipeline "pull-back" will be completed by the end of March. This will be followed by the installation of new valves and the connection of the new pipeline to the existing pipeline.

Mr. Hall says the pipe-

line assembly is being done on some land owned by the adjacent Shell Canada facility. To accommodate the project, some trees had to be cut down, but Mr. Hall says the site is to be cleaned up and restored at the conclusion of the project. "For every tree taken down, five will be planted," he said.

It is hoped that the project will be completed by this spring.

## Christ Anglican in Corunna amalgamates to become All Saints

Christ Anglican Church, a familiar sight at the corner of Lyndoch and Hill Streets in Corunna, has amalgamated with two Sarnia churches, St. John's Anglican and St. George Anglican. The difficult decision to take this action has been attributed to dwindling membership. Spokesperson Gitte Montieth says this amalgamation will see St. George Anglican Church closed,

while St. John's and Corunna's Christ Church Anglican will take the name All Saints as part of the new All Saints parish. This is a stellar year for the Corunna church, which will celebrate its 150th anniversary this May. It is expected the Primate of Canada will attend the May 12 service as part of the anniversary celebration.

It is a one-time charge levied when a building permit for a new building is purchased.

The study calculated the maximum rate St. Clair Township can charge is \$11,518 per residential unit. The increase from the current \$1,750 to the new \$3,500 will only apply to the traditional sewer-serviced areas of Courtright, Mooretown and Corunna. The rest of the township will see the charge go from \$0 to \$1,828 per new residential unit. Until May 1, when the new by-law comes into effect, the current charges, protocols and policies will prevail. This will allow time for those who already have a quote on a project to purchase a building permit that does not include the new development charge.

Mayor Steve Arnold says the new charge will support on-going municipal projects and infrastructure. "We felt it was time to increase our development charge to reflect what's going on in the community," he said. "We have some major things happening. For instance, we need to replace a ladder truck and the sewer system still has to be completed."
