Cost recovery for property standards work discussed

Owners of properties that do not comply with accepted property standards set by the municipality may soon feel a pain in the pocket book. A recent visit to council by Corrine Nauta, Chief Building Official for Lambton County, revealed new protocols developed by other Lambton County municipalities regarding cost recoveries for property standards costs. Ms. Nauta noted that Plympton-Wyoming and the Town of Warwick have developed relatively new property standards



Sewer and hydrant flushing begins

The St. Clair Township Department of Public Works will begin flushing all sewer mains and fire hydrants beginning in May between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

During work on the sewer mains, residents may notice some gurgling noise in drains. If this condition persists after 24 to 48 hours, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

During work on the fire hydrants, residents may notice some discolouration while using taps, flushing toilets, doing laundry, etc. If this occurs, run the cold water tap for a few minutes or until the discolouration disappears. If discolouration continues after 10 to 15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

Coordinator of Operations Water/Wastewater by-laws that provide for the recovery of municipal and county administration costs from the owners of properties that do not comply with accepted property standards. The by-laws also extend property standards provisions to property in all zones of the township, including residential, agricultural, commercial and industrial. After further discussion and consideration, a motion by council instructing staff to draft a new comprehensive property standards by-law was carried. The proposed by-law will provide for administration cost recovery and extend property standards requirements on all zoning classes of property within the municipality. Once the by-law is developed, it will be returned to council for review and discussion.

New facility will enhance Sombra Museum's role in sustaining local history

A new Sombra Museum facility, made possible by the Federal Government's *Cultural Spaces Fund* as well as generous donations made over the years by individual and corporate members of the community, will be built at the corner of Smith Street and St. Clair Parkway across from the current familiar blue Sombra Museum.

The original museum building, known as the Bury House, has been in operation since 1959. Once the new facility is open, the Bury House will be devoted to its original purpose of demonstrating life in a Victorian home dating back to between 1880 and 1920. The new facility, which will have the distinctive look of a general store that once stood on the site, will house the museum's extensive Marine collection, as well as the growing archival collection. The new building will also house a modern meeting room and will be equipped with state-of-the-art technology that will be able to meet the needs of any group that uses it, including service clubs, school groups, organizations and interested citizens.

A start date for the facility has been set for May of this

year, and it is hoped that the Marine and Reference/ Research Collection will be relocated to the new building by this coming November.

The Sombra Museum Board has expressed great excitement over this project, which demonstrates the vibrant strength and commitment of the community support it continues to receive. Mayor Arnold says this project has been eagerly anticipated for a long time. "This has been worked on and talked about for the 20 or 30 years I've been involved with council," he said.

Moore Museum volunteer receives Cultural Heritage award

Moore Museum volunteer Joyce Brock was presented with the Ontario Heritage Trust Certificate of Achievement in the Cultural Heritage category at the April 18 meeting of St. Clair Township Council. Mayor Arnold noted that, over the 13 years Joyce has volunteered with the museum, she has demonstrated her commitment to the preservation and promotion of local heritage.

Joyce helps make the history of the former Moore Township accessible to local residents and visitors through her involvement with the museum's public programming. She assists at special events such as the Victorian Tea, Heritage Festival and Christmas event. Over the years, Joyce has also provided offsite demonstrations of butter-making at the Brigden Fall Fair, giving hundreds of local school children a glimpse of pioneer life.

In addition, Joyce is active with the museum's fund-raising efforts. She helps behind the counter of the food booth, as well as at dinners and the annual Downriver Craft Sale, all of which contribute to the

Brigden Fair receives Award of Excellence for promotional initiative

The Brigden Fair has been one of Ontario's premier fall fairs for over 160 years, and it continues to be a leader in the promotion of agriculture and food.

This commitment recently garnered the fair the prestigious Award of Excellence for the Promotion of Agriculture and Food, presented by Ontario Agri-Food Education Inc. The award was presented during the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OASS) annual convention in Toronto. The award was accepted by Mona May Thompson, coordinator of the *Agriculture In The Classroom* program, which takes place each year on the opening day of the Brigden Fair and teaches hundreds of local school children the importance of maintaining a robust agricultural community through the use of displays, demonstrations and activities.

At the same event, the OASS Poster Competition for students from Grade 9 to 12 was won by LCCVI Grade 9 student Courtlyn Fiddler of Oil Springs.

Sombra Museum volunteer receives provincial honour

A Sombra Museum volunteer recently received provincial recognition for devoting 26 years to the preservation of the heritage of the former Sombra Township area. Allan Anderson was presented with the Lieutenant Governor's Ontario Heritage Award for Lifetime Achievement. The certificate bears this acknowledgement: "...in appreciation of a lifetime of volunteer work to identify, preserve, protect and promote our province's rich heritage."

Just a few of Allan's valuable contributions to the museum include: the preservation of historical knowledge and artifacts; involvement in the raising of the Bury House (the current Sombra Museum building) to install a new foundation and in the "plaster disaster," where deteriorating plaster on interior walls was replaced with dry wall; and offering advice on structural problems attendant to the historical buildings during yearly maintenance checks. He was also the driving force behind obtaining the grant to create the *Old General Store Park* in Sombra and was instrumental in the placement of the Templeton Book, a *Pictorial History of the Former Sombra Township*, in surrounding schools and museums, an idea that helped to promote the Sombra Museum.

Allan is a mentor to summer students at the museum in the creation of discovery boxes that educate people about the history of the area. These are then requested for use by schools and various organiza-

tions. He is currently on the Sombra Museum Vision Committee, a group that has been working toward the building of a new museum space. This project will soon be underway.

Allan was previously honoured by the Ontario Minister of Citizenship and Immigration with the 2010 Volunteer Service Award for 25 years of service to the museum and to the community.

Joel Hookey memorial garden will honour first responders

The sudden death of OPP Cst. Joel Hookey last summer has sparked a community-wide initiative that will eventually honour the community's first responders. Plans for the Joel Hookey Memorial Garden, which will be located at the corner of Hill and Lyndoch Streets in front of the St. Clair Township Emergency Services building, are being finalized.
