The recent Rick Hansen Relay, a nation-wide event celebrating the 25th anniversary of Rick Hansen's *Man In Motion* tour, clearly demonstrated the way ordinary people can achieve extraordinary things. In St. Clair Township, a number of enthusiastic individuals used various modes of transportation to negotiate the route from Port Lambton north to Corunna along the St. Clair Parkway.

The theme of the relay is to acknowledge local residents who are described as "difference makers," having made a positive difference in their own family, in the community, or for people continents away. Relay spokesperson Darrell Randell says, "It was great to see them receive some very much deserved recognition. Of course, the medal bearer participants from St. Clair Township are only a small sample of the people who make a difference here, but it was nice to see them shine in the spotlight briefly, and I am certain they will inspire others to be active in making a difference." ticipated in the St. Clair Township leg of the relay, including township nominees Karla Aarssen, Caitlyn Anderson, Ryan Wilson, Mildred Beggs, Ben Hazzard, Kaitlyn Anderson, Cathy Van Praet, Tom Tremblay, Evangeline Klompstra, Dennis Robinson and Dave Lee. Of note was 95-year-old Mildred Beggs, who walked the final leg of the local relay route which ended at the Corunna clock tower park. Mr. Randell says Mrs. Beggs practiced her part in the relay beforehand and he is hopeful that her record as most senior medal-bearer in the relay to date will hold to the end of the relay.

During the relay, participants enjoyed a welcome stop at the new Sombra Museum building, where they had a chance to meet each other and enjoy lunch.

Commissioner of Oaths fee set for non-residents/non-ratepayers

A fee of \$30 will now be applied for services rendered by the Commissioner of Oaths to non-residents and non-ratepayers of St. Clair Township. The services will still be free of charge to residents and those who pay taxes in the municipality. The Commissioner of Oaths witnesses signatures on affidavits, birth certificates, pension forms, ownership transfer and other legal documents.

Fundraising raffles, bingos must be licensed

All lottery events such as meat raffles and bingos must be licensed. Three elements define a lottery event: consideration or fee to enter, a chance to win, and a prize. Hosting an unlicensed event for any charitable purpose is a criminal offense.

Organizations intending to hold a bingo or raffle, or to sell break-open tickets, should first contact the St. Clair Township Clerk's department at 519-867-2021 to apply for a lottery license.

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truck as far as Sombra. When the relay reached Courtright, medal-bearer Dennis Robinson and his passengers covered one leg of the route aboard a horse-drawn wagon. And when the relay reached Mooretown, medalbearer Dave Lee climbed aboard a tug boat, the Nancy A. Lee, for a voyage up to the Corunna ferry dock. The St. Clair Township leg of the relay marked a number of firsts for this nation-wide event. It is the first time that a fire truck and a horse-drawn wagon have been used as modes of transportation, and the township fielded the most senior medal-bearer to date.

Along the route, hundreds of onlookers and students from Riverview and Sacred Heart Schools cheered as medal-bearers passed their way.

Mr. Randell says some of the \$1,500 budgeted to fund the relay was not used and St. Clair Township Council voted to donate the balance to the Rick Hansen Foundation. He also reported to council that representatives from the Hansen organization were impressed with the enthusiasm of the

Hamper programs brightened Christmas

Organizers of St. Clair Township's two Christmas food and toy hamper programs have expressed warm thanks to everyone who donated food and toys and also to those who volunteered to collect items, sort them, and assemble and distribute the hampers to less fortunate families and individuals in the community.

In the north end of the township, the Optimist Club of Moore was joined by local police, firefighters and many community-minded volunteers to collect and sort food, toys and clothing. Volunteers assembled 132 food hampers with an estimated cost of \$500 per hamper as well as 67 toy hampers with an estimated cost of \$150. They also made sure the hampers were delivered in time for Christmas to 132 families, serving 125 children and 197 adults.

To the south, the St. Vincent De Paul hamper program assembled 120 hampers, serving 110 children and 180 adults. The hampers, valued at \$500 each, were distributed on Dec. 17. St. Vincent De Paul members were joined by local firefighters from the Wilkesport, Becher and Port Lambton fire stations, plus members of local service clubs, churches and other local groups.

It was another successful year of lives made brighter and spirits made lighter thanks to the kindness and generosity of the people of St. Clair Township.

In the weeks leading up to Christmas, the Moore Museum offered an authentic look at what Christmas was like a over a century ago. This year, over 1,000 students enjoyed the *Old -Fashioned Christmas* program by working on age-appropriate crafts and touring the museum, which was adorned with vintage decorations for the holidays.
