Cathcart Park shoreline to be made accessible

Over the next four years, the shoreline at Cathcart Park north of Sombra is going to become more accessible to visitors as well as wildlife.

The St. Clair Region Conservation Authority has begun work on a project that will see the removal the steel retaining wall that currently runs along the shoreline. The wall will be replaced by armor stone, which will stabilize the shoreline and allow easy access to the water.

St. Clair Township Mayor Steve Arnold notes the Cathcart Park project will take about four years and is part of a long-term initiative to upgrade about 460 kilometres of shoreline. He added the Cathcart Park portion is important because the current steel wall is causing safety issues for boaters and making the river bank unstable. "This replacement will be with armor stone that will provide erosion protection along Cathcart Park for generations to come," he said. Mayor Arnold says about \$700,000 will be spent on the armor stone this year alone.

Girish Sankar, a water resources engineer, says the armor stone is also environmentally friendly. "It provides shelter for the fish, and a habitat," he said. He added the wall will also include habitat pods - areas for plants to provide shade for fish and other small water creatures.

"Fish need a lot of shade to breed, and the small cracks and holes in the stone become a breeding ground as opposed to a straight (steel) sheet which has no holes, is corrosive, and is corroding into the water."

Mr. Sankar says the metal retaining walls are inspected every five years to see how stable they are based on their condition. "Based on how bad they are, they are replaced, and when they're replaced, we're using an environmentally-friendly method," he said.

According to Mr. Sankar, this process has been underway for about 15 to 20 years. Several benefits of the ongoing shoreline stabilization program have been put forward. It is necessary to prevent further erosion and river sedimentation, and to control the loss of land. It will also eliminate hazards associated with the existing deteriorating structures and reduce future maintenance costs.

Just as noteworthy are the environmental and esthetic benefits. The creation of aquatic habitats in the river will be a positive environmental by-product of this ambitious project, which will also facilitate easy public access to the river and beautify the shoreline.

It is proposed that the shoreline work will be implemented in phases subject to available funding. A 130-metre section of retaining wall at the north end of Cathcart Park is the most damaged, so it has been designated as Phase One. Construction has already begun there and it is anticipated that work will be completed by mid-February.

Armor stone has previously been used on projects such as the Guthrie Park shoreline rehabilitation project north of Corunna.

All lottery events such as meat raffles and bingos must be licensed. Three elements define a lottery event: consideration or fee to enter, a chance to win, and a prize. Hosting an unlicensed event for any charitable purpose is a criminal offense. Organizations intending to hold a bingo or raffle, or to sell break-open tickets, should first contact the St. Clair Township Clerk's department at 519-867-2021 to apply for a lottery license.
