

# Behemoths roam the river once again



The 1,000 foot long *Walter J. McCarthy, Jr.* made a pit stop at the Shell Canada docks north of Corunna in early April to take on fuel. It's hard to believe how huge this vessel really is until you consider that the ill -fated *RMS Titanic*, the iconic ship that sank beneath the waters of the icy North Atlantic 100 years ago, was a mere 882 feet, nine inches long.

The *McCarthy*, owned by the American Steamship Co., has been a familiar sight along the St. Clair River since it was launched in 1977 under the name *Belle River*. The ship was renamed in 1990 in honour of the newly-retired chairman of the board of Detroit Edison.

The *Belle* was the very first thousand-footer built by the Bay Shipbuilding Co. of Wisconsin. The design used for her construction has since been used to build other enormous ships like the Burns Harbor, the Indiana Harbor, the Oglebay Norton and the Columbia Star, and there is currently a total of 13 of these behemoths in service.

Whether you are a hard-core Boat Nerd or just someone who appreciates raw power, you have to be impressed by the *McCarthy's* stats. This selfunloader carries up to 78,850 tons of cargo such as coal, limestone and grain, and is powered by four V-20 3,600 horsepower diesel engines, developing a whopping 14,000 horsepower!

The next time you see one of these mega-ships glide majestically past you on the river, give a thought for the technical miracle you're looking at. And next time you pull up to the gas pump, thank your lucky stars that you don't have to fill up *that* gas tank.

Charles Quenneville, treasurer of St. Clair Township, reports that council recently approved the 2012 budget. The 2012 operating budget will amount to \$9.4 million in net property tax levy. This represents a budget increase of approximately .73 per cent or \$15 for an average assessment of \$174,533, assuming there is no assessment growth or County budget increase. The major increase in 2012 was caused by the need for an additional \$267,262 to be spent on capital projects and a financing loss of \$120,800 in the Provincial operating grant.



### Second 2012 interim tax payment due date May 2, 2012

The interim property tax bills were mailed out the week of Feb. 6, 2012 and the second installment is due on May 2. Most chartered banks and financial institutions will accept payment of your current taxes on or before the due date. (Any bank charges will be the responsibility of the ratepayer.)

St. Clair Township Tax Department 519-867-2024 Fax: 519-867-5509 In the capital budget, there are 70 projects slated with a gross cost of \$10.5 million and a net taxation of \$2.1 million. In this budget, there is a record \$4 million worth of road and bridge work, with the biggest road projects seeing two segments of Brigden Road done at an estimated cost of \$1.25 million and Rokeby Line at a cost of \$590,000. Mr. Quenneville explained that this year, Council decided to take advantage of the low interest rate, 2.8 per cent, being offered by the Province of Ontario over ten years, and debenture \$2.5 million of the road projects.

The 2012 budget presented many challenges for council and Mayor Steve Arnold says deliberations were difficult. "Council laboured over the budget this year and we are hoping to take advantage of good capital costs that may be available from our local contractors," he said.

With many projects waiting to be done, Mayor Arnold says action has already been taken to get them underway. "We have authorized staff to tender out a number of projects such as 3rd and 4th Streets in Courtright, and the Rokeby Line water line and road reconstruction, as well as the Brigden Sideroad," he said. "With the completion of these projects and many previous projects, we will have rectified many of the long-standing issues that council has identified as priorities over the last few years."

The need for care and restraint when setting the budgets was a primary concern for council, according to Mayor Arnold. As residents of St. Clair Township themselves, they are all too aware of the effect they have on every municipal household, including their own. "We continue to strive for the best possible value for the taxes that are collected and, as always, we value input from our ratepayers," he said.



# **Diabetes education events offered by WLCHC**


A series of free diabetes education programs will be offered by the West Lambton Community Health Centre (WLCHC) in the next few months.

Diabetes Conversations is a four-week series that will include: Living with Diabetes; How Diabetes Works; Healthy Eating and Keeping Active; and a Grocery Store Tour. This program will run on Tuesdays on May 8, 15, 22 and 29. It is led by a certified diabetes educators, either a registered nurse or a registered dietician. Master Your Health for chronic disease management is a six-week series focusing on managing difficult emotions, coping with pain and fatigue, communication strategies, goal-setting and problem-solving, making informed decisions, and positive partnerships with health care professionals. This program is led by a registered nurse or a social worker. Craving Change is a six-week series for people struggling with their eating habits and their relationship with food. The course will focus on why we eat the way we do, not what and how much. Participants will explore the various factors that could be triggering food cravings and they can learn practical strategies that can be used to change eating habits for life. The course is led by dieticians.

*Diabetes Cooking Classes* will touch on various topics that will interest all cooks, both novice and experienced. They will be held monthly as follows: Vegetarian Cooking, Wednesday, May 9, 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.; Summer Salads, Thursday, June 14, 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. These classes will be led by a certified diabetes educator and a registered dietician. They are offered on a first-come, first-served basis with priority given to those who have not recently been to a cooking class.

In addition, a **support group** is held monthly at 10 a.m. on the last Wednesday of each month and is facilitated by a certified diabetes educator.
