Status of Alert FM system reviewed

The status of the Bluewater Community Alerting Network (BCAN), a joint emergency notification venture of St. Clair Township and neighbouring communities across the river in Michigan, was recently reviewed.

Deputy Fire Chief Steve Bicum of the St. Clair Township Fire Department says the first year of the network's operation, which employs small Alert FM receivers currently being distributed throughout St. Clair Township, has proceeded well. There are currently over 950 receivers in local households and all seven township schools are equipped with larger units. The residential units are available at Corunna Home Hardware, the St. Clair Township municipal office at the Civic Center on

Hydrant Flushing

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing the annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. The new centre features an airy new Marine Room, displays of vintage armed forces memorabilia and the Shawanese Room, a multipurpose room outfitted with a kitchen that can be used for both social and business applications. Of special interest is the new fireproof Archive Room, which Sombra Museum Board Chairman David Lee says is an important component of the building. "We now have a good, secure place where we can store our archives," he said. "We've always had a good reputation for our reference material." He notes many people find valuable clues in the archives when researching their family histories.

Mr. Lee says he envisions an additional purpose for the Marine Room sometime in the future. "I want to see dads come here with their kids to build little boats they can take down to the river and use."

During his remarks to the assembled crowd, Mayor Arnold expressed thanks to everyone who helped make the cultural centre a reality, and applauded the efforts of MP Pat Davidson, who announced in 2010 that the Federal government was contributing \$210,000 from the

Notice to property owners to destroy weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$50.)

Yard Waste/Brush Collection 2012

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste program for defined areas in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

Yard waste is collected separately from regular waste on a regular basis in urbanized areas of the Township with collection beginning at 7 a.m. Yard waste from the balance of the Township is collected during regular waste collection.

Collection Schedule

Collection will be on Wednesday and Friday, depending on the service area:

Wednesday: *Corunna (including Froomfield area)

* St. Clair Parkway (north of Emily

Street, Mooretown)

Friday: *Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown,

Port Lambton

*Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Gardens *St. Clair Parkway (south of Emily

Street, Mooretown)

During the months of July through September, yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection subject to the six item limit.

What is yard waste?

Yard waste includes the following items: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). **Not permitted**: Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached.

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides, and must be free of all non-compostable material such as glass, plastic, metal or other debris. The term "open containers" does **not** include: blue boxes or cardboard boxes. Containers must **not** exceed 23 kg/50 lb. Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will **not** be collected.

The fall yard waste collection schedule will be announced at a later date. The Township is currently in contract negotiations for a new waste collection contract. When the contract has been finalized, The Beacon will report any changes to current waste collection guidelines plus fall waste collection dates.

Emily Street in Mooretown, Shaykin Bait Variety in Port Lambton, and Always Quilting in Brigden.

The retail cost of each unit is \$40 but St. Clair Township and several industrial and commercial donors have contributed funding to reduce the cost to \$10 per unit.

Deputy Chief Bicum says the system is being implemented on a five-year plan. This year, he says it is expected that about 1,400 more units will be sold and activated within the township.

The new system is activated by the St. Clair Township Fire Department. A "chief on call" can be reached by pager at any time and is empowered to engage the system if an emergency such as a tornado or other severe weather is imminent. In addition, local industries have access to the BCAN system if a "shelter in place" scenario arises.

The system undergoes regular testing at 12:30 p.m. on the first Monday of each month. It is linked to the NO-AA weather system for St. Clair County, Michigan, and has been automatically activated for four severe weather events to date. Deputy Chief Bicum says that, so far, the system has been

initiated from St. Clair Township during one emergency which occurred last December during the Port Lambton marina fire.

Among those in attendance at the BCAN review were representatives from CF Industries, Shell Canada and NOVA Chemicals, who brought substantial donations that will be used to reduce the cost of the Alert FM units to residents of St. Clair

Township.

Mayor Steve Arnold stressed the importance of keeping the community safe and informed. He also noted the significance of the unique cross-border partnership that allows the system to function so efficiently. "It can't be taken lightly," he said. During his remarks he applauded the community spirit of the companies that contribute to and support the system.

Shell Canada Corunna facility unveils new storm water containment strategy

The grand opening of the new storm water containment pond was held at the Shell Sarnia Manufacturing Centre in Corunna on June 18. General Manager Kerry Margetts says the pond is significant since it will ensure that storm water runoff from the facility does not enter the St. Clair River before it has been tested and, if necessary, treated.

The facility has had a containment pond on-site for 30 years, but Mr. Margetts says that pond was designed to hold the runoff from a "25-year rainfall". Over the years, the pond has proven insufficient, so the new pond has been designed to meet the needs of a "one hundred-year rainfall". The two ponds are now capable of holding a total of 11.5 million gallons of storm water.

Jasjeet Dhupia, Shell's pond project manager, says the pond project began two years ago with the design team trying to determine what size the pond would have to be. The team determined the pond would have to hold 8.9 million Imperial gallons of storm water. The 40-foot deep pond is lined with 45ml thick high density polyethylene. During construction, the project also included upgrades to the sewer system.

Mr. Dhupia says the construction phase of the project presented several challenges. Weather was often an issue and he recalled one occasion when the construction team arrived at the site one morning to find equipment submerged in an ice-covered pool in the bottom of the pond. And since that time was a busy one for local construction, equipment and personnel were sometimes difficult to get.

Mr. Margetts called the project "a significant undertaking" and expressed pride that it was accomplished with no reportable injuries. "We did it safely," he said. "That's pretty amazing performance."

Also in attendance for the grand opening were representatives from the Ministry of the Environment, the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, the Bluewater Community Advisory Panel, St. Clair Township Deputy Mayor Peter Gilliland and MPP Bob Bailey.
