The Algocen is of special interest to Mr. Docherty, who had the distinction of having been part of the construction crew that built the actual ship in the Collingwood Shipyards. It was during this time that he says he fell in love with the "lakers".

Hydrant Flushing

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing the annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. If discolouration continues after 10 to 15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

Notice to property owners to destroy weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$50.)

Emergency alert system discussed

St. Clair Township Fire Chief Roy Dewhirst attended council to report on a recent series of intrusive overnight alerts issued by the new Alert FM system. In early July, the system was activated by emergency personnel from St. Clair County, Michigan to issue weather and dangerous heat warnings, which disturbed the sleep of many residents who found the warnings unnecessary. Chief Dewhirst told council steps are being taken to prevent a repeat of this situation.

At the Moore Museum, the main museum building, a former schoolhouse, contains myriad wonderful treasures from the area's pioneer past as well as a wide variety of other remarkable artefacts. Out on the museum site, 12 buildings wait to be explored. The Shaw building holds many interesting displays of implements and items our pioneers used to build the community we know today. It also contains a fascinating selection of vehicles, from small wagons to large vintage farm machinery. Some of the other buildings are historic structures that have been moved to the site from all around the former Moore Township. Currently showing is the special Diamond Jubilee exhibit honouring Queen Elizabeth II's 60-year reign.

Visitors will enjoy touring the site using the *I Spy* tour booklet developed especially for children. For older visitors, a self-guiding tour booklet and 12-minute DVD presentation, St. Clair: Discover Its Heritage, ensure an informative and enjoyable visit for all. The

Moore Museum, 94 Moore Line in Mooretown, is open 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily throughout July and August.

At the Sombra Museum, a new Sombra Museum Cultural Centre is already garnering rave reviews. The new facility, which was recently dedicated, contains an up-to-date archives room that was especially built to protect and preserve the hundreds of photos and archival material the museum has collected over the years. The original museum building, the historically-significant Bury House, will be restored to its original state to reveal the stunning Victorian house it once was. The Sombra Museum, 3470 St. Clair Parkway in Sombra Village, is open daily from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. throughout the summer.

Sombra poet finds inspiration flows from the St. Clair River

The beauty of the St. Clair River has, no doubt, provided inspiration for many an artist and writer over the centuries, from the arrival of the First Nations people to the landing of the first settlers and beyond, the river has held the creative mind in thrall. From the stunning blue-green of the water on a glorious summer's day to the angry pewter gray flow that precedes a winter storm, the St. Clair River presents an ever-changing palette of colour and mood.

For Sombra poet Bill Ansell, the river has been the object of a love affair that has continued over a period of decades. Mr. Ansell worked aboard the ferry *Daldean* for over 40 years, so he is personally acquainted with every facet of the river's personality. His passion for this watery muse has, time and time again, been expressed through poetry, his memories and emotions set down on paper in compelling verse.

Mr. Ansell comes by his love of the river honestly, having grown up along its grassy shore. His father, Fred, tended the stationary lights along the river from the south end of Stag Island to Lake St. Clair. When shipping season opened in the spring, he serviced the lights, making sure they were all operating well and that they had sufficient fuel to be able to provide a beacon for the many vessels that plied the river channel through darkness and storms.

Fred Ansell was also called out in all kinds of weather to service lights that had failed or had been vandalized. His quick response was crucial to ensure that ships in the immediate vicinity would have the navigational tools they needed to avoid disaster. And when the shipping season ended, he serviced each light to see it through the punishing icy blast of winter.

From just after WWII to 1970, Fred Ansell could be seen motoring along the river using a converted life boat equipped with a four-cylinder inboard engine. His regular patrols served to keep the navigational beacons in good order.

The job of the light tender does not exist today owing to the advent of modern technology such as GPS location equipment. But the light tender lives on through the poetry of Bill Ansell, who drew on his memories of his father's occupation to pen touching poems like this:

Long, so long ago, when the sailors had to go Setting sail in early spring, staying to winter's snow Long before radios and radar, a compass got them there. The ship was their lifeline, so always they showed care. Along the St. Clair River, always markers could be seen Red on the channel's left side, the right side being green. They know not of storms, to meet them all along the way Bonding with Nature's tall tales which met them every day.

Each ship has so many stories waiting to be told Leaving special feelings to be not bought or sold Those ships have names just like you and I I'll hold those golden memories; never will they die. By Bill Ansell

Stolen stop signs pose danger to all: OPP report

The Ontario Provincial Police has issued a warning to all motorists to beware of intersections where stop signs have been stolen. In late June, the OPP issued this warning after seven *stop* signs and one *stop ahead* sign were reported removed or stolen from various locations in the Township of Enniskillen.

OPP Cst. Chrystal Jones says, "We are fortunate that there have not been crashes at the intersections where the stop signs are missing." The dangerous nature of having stop signs removed from any intersection cannot be stressed strongly enough. Cst. Jones says this is not a harmless prank. This kind of theft can have devastating results on the lives of those who use the affected roads and severe consequences for those who perpetrate the thefts.




