Corunna's Derek Drouin joins pantheon of Olympic heroes



Corunna's Derek Drouin made a triumphant return to his hometown on Aug. 15 after winning a bronze medal in the high jump event at the London Olympic Games. Corunna's Derek Drouin honoured his country and his home town on Aug. 7 when he captured a bronze medal in the high jump during the London Olympic Games.

The 22-year-old Corunna native's name will be forever recorded among the heady pantheon of Olympic heroes, and his feat will hopefully challenge the youth of St. Clair Township to follow his stunning display of determination, discipline, and skill.

To honour the returning hero on Aug. 15, Corunna gave him the red carpet treatment with a procession along Lyndoch Street. About 2,000 proud area well-wishers lined the route to get a glimpse of Derek and to shout their congratulations.

The procession terminated at Antonio's Pizza Restaurant, where Derek took time to sign autographs

Hydrant Flushing

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing the annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$50.)

Concerns over frequent activation of emergency alerting system addressed

This summer, St. Clair Township Fire Department has received several calls concerning the repeated activation of the Bluewater Community Alerting System (BCAN). Due to the extreme heat this season, atmospheric conditions have spawned many severe weather events but fortunately, most of the expected storms have not affected this municipality.

However, Deputy Fire Chief Steve Bicum says the storms have passed close enough to initiate automated *excessive heat* and *storm* warnings on the BCAN. These warnings have often happened overnight, prompting callers to complain, "This thing keeps waking me up for nothing." Deputy Chief Bicum says, "We understand your concerns, but the basic tenet of the BCAN system is that, if you hear the unit go off, you need to react. The nature of weather warnings means that the storms are in the area and are threatening, but the warnings are no guarantee the storm will hit us. These warnings work on a "better safe than sorry" scenario.

The automated weather system for BCAN is operated by the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The NOAA automatically issues weather warnings for the area covered by the BCAN system. Deputy Chief Bicum says the St. Clair Township Fire Department does not have control over when or how often the NOAA issues these warnings, just as it has no control over how often severe weather will threaten the area.

For those who no longer wish to receive NOAA weather warnings, the service can be discontinued by completing the following steps:

- 1. Switch your receiver from "Online" to "Set up".
- 2. Press the "Next" button to highlight "Address" and press the "Alarm Stop" button.
- Press the "Alarm Stop" button a second time and the words "Add/ Remove" will appear at the top of the screen.
- 4. Enter the code 037363 into the unit. Press the "Next" button to move up through the numbers and press the "Alarm Stop" button to move to the next column.
- 5. Once you have completed the code, press the "Alarm Stop" button again and the words "Address removed" should come on the screen.
 - 6. Flip the switch back to "Online" to finish the process.

Once this service is discontinued, your receiver will still register any messages issued by the St. Clair Township Fire Department or industry regarding an emergency.

The BCAN receivers are designed to keep township residents safe during emergency situations, even the ones that occur in the middle of the night. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to call the St. Clair Township Fire Department at 519-481-0111.

Deputy Fire Chief Tom Boon retires

After 10 years with the St. Clair Township Fire Department, Deputy Chief Tom Boon is retiring. In addition to his duties as deputy chief, he has also been a familiar face in St. Clair Township elementary schools, teaching the students about fire safety. He was also responsible for doing fire safety inspections, seeing that fire detection equipment was working properly and that buildings within the municipality met with existing fire code guidelines.

Tom came to St. Clair Township from Forest, where he served for 15 years as a volunteer firefighter. During his last 10 years with the Forest Fire Department, he served as acting chief. He was also an elected member of the Forest town council for nine years and a member of the Lambton Shores council for one.

Fire Chief Roy Dewhirst says the years Tom spent with the fire department were productive ones. "He knew his stuff. He knew what to look for when he did inspections," he said. "He was a great guy to work with." He noted that Deputy Chief Boon's efforts were an integral part of keeping St. Clair Township residents safe from the inherent dangers of fire.

With the luxury of some spare time looming large in Tom's future, he says he and his wife, Peggy, will be moving north, perhaps to the Collingwood area, but will still be coming back to visit their grown children, Randy and Melissa, and their families.

Chief Dewhirst says a succession plan is in place and will be implemented at a future date.



Arnold expressed his pride in Derek's accomplishment and extended congratulations on behalf of the whole community.

At the time of Derek's win, a crowd of well-wishers were gathered at a local eatery to cheer him on. Corunna resident Bob Bossence was part of that crowd and he says everyone was cheering Derek on as he competed in the men's high jump event. And after the win, Bob says Derek's coach, Joel Skinner, called him from the Olympic Stadium to make a heartfelt statement. "Joel wanted to thank everyone from the bottom of his heart for all the support and warm wishes that we

sent their way," said Bob. He added that Coach Skinner was speechless and very emotional about Derek's tremendous accomplishment.

When Derek heard that he was taking a trip to the podium, a Canadian Press photographer snapped an iconic photo of the happy athlete proudly displaying a Canadian flag embellished with writing. Derek's mother, Sheila, who handed her son the flag after his big win, says that flag came from a fundraiser held at the Royal Canadian Legion Corunna branch to benefit the Southwest Track Club where Derek trained. Everyone attending the fundraiser was invited to sign the flag as a token of support for the whole club as club members left to participate in trials that would hopefully lead to the Canadian Olympic track team.

It should be noted that the last time a Canadian high jumper reached the podium was in 1976 at the Montreal Olympic

Games when Greg Joy won silver for his efforts. His jump was not nearly as high as Derek's, which speaks to the Corunna native's admirable achievement.

Sheila Drouin says her son returned to school on Aug. 17 taking his Olympic medal with him. He is studying Exercise Science at Indiana University and is active on the track team. No doubt the coveted medal will be the talk of the locker room for many decades to come.

Intent on getting his science degree, Derek is still unsure about what career path he will take. But Mrs. Drouin says he is very sure that he wants to keep competing for the next few years. He has already received invitations to several prestigious track meets and hopes this trend will continue.


Mrs. Drouin says she and her family are very proud of Derek, but adds that all three of her children are terrific athletes and sources of pride. Daughter Jillian is also a track star, who was an All-American combined events athlete at Syracuse University, and daughter, Alysha, participates in team sports such as hockey. For all three of the Drouin children, sports has been a driving force and Mrs. Drouin says she and her husband, Gaetan, feel it keeps them involved and grounded.

Track coach Joel Skinner credits his star jumper's parents with the composure, focus and winning attitude Derek brings to the sport and says these qualities are what makes him a champion. "I truly think he's able to apply this (focus) wherever he thinks it's needed," he said. "He does a good job of blocking out things he knows could affect his performance. He knows what mental state he has to be in to do his best."

Although Mr. Skinner wasn't able to have much contact with Derek during the actual event, he says he was in the stands nearby and was able to do a bit of coaching just prior to the medal-winning jump. At that time, he says the nerves were all his. "There were nerves playing through my whole body, but he was cool, calm and collected."

When the medal was assured, Mr. Skinner says Derek took pride in holding high the signed flag his track team had been given in Corunna. "It means a lot to him, to his family, and to the community," he said. He added that, in the wake of the winning jump, Derek was also thrilled to receive a phone call from Greg Joy the following day.

In the months leading up to the London Olympics, Mr. Skinner says Derek clearly demonstrated his talents in several high-profile competitions where he went up against professionals. "He went a month prior to the Olympics to compete in the Diamond League (pro league) meet in London and won," he said. "In Monaco, (another Diamond League meet), he got third place. The two people

who beat him there were people he beat during the Olympics."

Aside from Derek's pursuit of a university degree, he now has his eye on professional competition against other athletes of his calibre. Mr. Skinner says the Diamond League circuit will see a lot of Derek, but the Olympic star enjoyed his time in Monaco so much that he is also looking forward to next year's Francophone Games in Nice, France.

Now that things have settled down and Derek Drouin is taking his life and his career to the next level, Mr. Skinner says he expects the world of professional track and field will be seeing a lot of Derek in the future. "He'll be around for a long time," he said.

As for his own career, Joel Skinner says he may never again encounter an athlete as self-possessed and determined as Derek Drouin. "I'll be lucky, for the rest of my life, to coach anyone who has the focus Derek has."

MACLEAN'S magazine called Derek's winning jump "a masterpiece of nerve and skill."


He has achieved a personal triumph and he has done his community proud. Hopes are high that, for Derek Drouin, the best is yet to come.







River Run delivers record times and crowds

This year's 3rd Annual St. Clair River Run boasted a total of 573 participants in the 10K run, 5K run, and the newly-added Minnow Run for children. All of the events registered new course records with fast times being turned in by elite runners. Organizers say the festive atmosphere along the riverside course through Sombra and Port Lambton encouraged runners of all abilities to excel. Spectators not only got to cheer on the participants, but they got to enjoy the sights afforded by the beautiful St. Clair River.

In the 10K, Paul Cochrane from Sarnia won for the third year in a row with a new course record of 33:18. Jill Constantino from Burnaby, B.C. won her first River Run with a new female course record of 42:55. Matthew Sheeler of Strathroy set a new course record of 17:30 for the 5K, nearly three minutes faster than the previous record. And Kim Wood from Chatham defended her 5K title to set a new female course record of 19:32.

When the event was over, organizers say it had grown by over 200 people and is becoming well known well beyond the township's borders. Sue Wammes from Blenheim ran the 10K and had this to say about her experience. "The best and coolest small town run ever! Awesome view along the St. Clair River through Sombra, and getting the opportunity to run through sprinklers and hoses set up by the fire department and residents along the route was exhilarating." The run encouraged many people to achieve their goals and celebrate each step along the way. "It was my first time running in a 5K," said Wendy Daye of Corunna. "I really enjoyed the experience of running along with like-minded people. Super morning and great scenery makes the time fly by."
