Halloween starts early as paranormal researchers visit

On Sept. 14, an unusual team of visitors entered the Bury House in Sombra armed with a battery of electronic devices and over 14 years of paranormal study experience.

Members of the Canadian Haunting and Paranormal Society (CHAPS) were there to check out unusual phenomena that have been reported in the former Sombra Museum over the years. The house, which served as the main Sombra Museum building for decades, began as a private home built in 1880 and occupied by John and Sarah Bury. Both died in the house, as did their daughter, Sarah Katherine Jane (Bury) Stokes.

Sombra Museum Curator Shelley Lucier says the team found nothing out of the ordinary downstairs. At one point, investigator Nicole Fritz noticed a slight increase in the reading on her detection device, but the spike was found to be due to interference from electrical wiring that ran under the floor directly below her.

The investigation eventually led upstairs and Mrs. Lucier says she was able to accompany the group. She was asked to address the spirit denizens of the Bury House but there were no immediate results. However, after about 20 minutes, she says two of the investigators, Kevin Davidson and Bryce Giroux, said they heard two women speaking. One of them swatted the air in front of him and said he felt pressure on his arm. Another team member eventually admitted she heard it, too.

Mrs. Lucier says the investigation continued until midnight and no firm findings were revealed at that time. The investigators told her they would have to analyze the information they had collected on their equipment before they would be able to offer any definite results

Hydrant Flushing

Notice to property owners to destroy weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$50.)

Public park firearm by-law upheld

In response to a letter from the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, council considered a request to allow hunters to carry firearms to their boats when using a boat launch located in a public park. A St. Clair Township by-law currently in effect prohibits this.

During the discussion, it was pointed out that there are two boat launches on the St. Clair River within St. Clair Township that are not within a public park. They are located in Corunna at the ferry dock and in Mooretown. Hunters are legally allowed to transport their firearms to their boats at these sites as long as all safety precautions are observed. Council upheld the current by-law, stating that it was a valid way to protect everyone who uses the township's public parks.

Old-Fashioned Christmas school program old-time fun for modern kids

Moore Museum's most popular school program is currently being prepared to usher in the holiday season.

Each year, *An Old-Fashioned Christmas* provides lots of oldtime Yuletide sights and fascinating hands-on fun for about 1,000 elementary school children. The log cabin is decorated for a pioneer family Christmas, while trees and toys in the main building bring the traditions of the Victorian Era to life.

Students also taste history when they participate in a taffy pull and sample the results. A pioneer or Victorian-style decoration is created by each student, giving each one a souvenir to take home with them so they can add something to their own family's Christmas tradition.

Museum Curator Laurie Mason says some adults who visit the museum during this time often recall when they participated in *An Old-*

Fashioned Christmas as children and made decorations that still hang on their Christmas trees today. This year, the program will be available for school groups from Nov. 26 to Dec. 20. Morning and afternoon bookings are offered, and evening bookings for children's groups can be arranged. Programs must be booked in advance and the schedule fills up quickly so teachers should call as soon as possible to ensure the best choice of dates. The cost of the program is

Corunna Minor Baseball teams excel - Mosquitos chalk up season shut-out

Of the Mosquitos' excellent performance, coach Craig Prudom said, "It was such a team effort. Some of our big hitters weren't hitting early on...and some of the other guys that don't normally carry us sort of carried us for the first for games."

Prudom expected his team to be contenders after many of the same players won the rookie ball OBAs two years ago. He says he was also buoyed by a strong showing earlier in the year at an AA and AAA tournament in Ancaster, where they made the final of the AA side. "I thought, if we can compete with these guys, we can compete with anybody," he said. "I just figured if they played to their potential, we would definitely have a chance to win."

The entire coaching staff expressed pride in the way their teams performed during the season.

CHSD warns of West Nile virus in Lambton County

The Lambton County Community Health Services Department is warning all residents to take precautions against West Nile virus. "Now is the time of year when people are most at risk of becoming infected with West Nile virus," said Dr. Christopher Greensmith, acting Medical Officer of Health for Lambton County. There has been one confirmed human case of the virus here so far, three birds have tested positive for it, and 10 mosquito pools have also tested

positive. Dr. Greensmith urges everyone to avoid areas where high mosquito populations are found, take extra precautions from dusk to dawn when mosquitos are most active, wear protective, light-coloured clothing, and use insect repellents containing DEET, being sure to carefully follow the directions on the label. So far in 2012, 116 confirmed and/or probable human cases of the virus have been reported in Ontario.

United Way of Sarnia-Lambton kicks off 2012 campaign

The United Way of Sarnia-Lambton has begun its 2012 fundraising campaign by setting a target goal of \$1,850,000. Campaign Chair Brian Black says it will be a challenge to meet this goal. "We had hoped to increase our goal this year in response to the increasing client loads with the agencies, but with the recent business closings at workplaces such as Hiawatha Slots, NCO, and others, we felt the \$1.85 million is a huge challenge for us."

The campaign kicked off with the annual Day of Caring, which saw 220 volunteers donating time, supplies and manpower to assist individu-

als and non-profit organizations at 37 jobsites throughout Lambton County. In St. Clair Township, the volunteers took on maintenance projects at three sites, including two Lambton County Developmental Services (LCDS) group homes in Corunna and the home of an elderly resident who lives along the St. Clair Parkway in the north end of the township. Some of the industries that gave employees paid time away from their jobs to help with the Day of Caring included Shell Canada, Pembina, Enbridge Gas Storage, NOVA, Suncor Energy, St. Clair Ethanol Plant, and Cargill AgHorizons.

The CHAPS team does not charge for their service and urges the public never to pay for such a service. Kevin Davidson says the team's goal is to disprove the presence of a haunting. "We see mostly homeowners (concerned about odd phenomena that has occurred in their homes). Bryce Giroux added that, if a presence is detected, their goal is mainly to assure the homeowner that it is not a threat.

Mr. Davidson also pointed out that the team likes to return to an investigation site a second time because that is often when a presence will finally reveal itself. "We might go the first time and get

nothing, but the second time we get lots," he said.

The issue of paranormal research is a subject that some groups find unsettling, but Mr. Davidson says the team has never encountered a problem, even from religious groups. "They're very cooperative," he said.

In the Bury House, the most prominent anomaly reported has been upstairs, where a woman reported feeling a force trying to prevent her from entering the second floor area. Mrs. Lucier says the woman was not from this area.

The team will issue a report to the Sombra Museum when all findings have been analyzed.
