St. Clair Township Mayor Steve Arnold is nearing the end of his two-year term as Warden of Lambton County. At the recent Warden's Banquet held at the Wilkesport Community Centre, Warden Arnold had an opportunity to thank all of the people who assisted him during this time, to reminisce about his term in office, and to share his hopes for the

Partnership will benefit health of township residents

A new partnership between the Mooretown Sports Complex and the Rapids Family Health Team (RFHT) will benefit the health of many township residents. The complex will host informational sessions offered by the RFHT to help those with specific health problems to better cope with them.

The first health initiative being undertaken will be a free COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) Education and Exercise program. The 10-week program will begin in January, 2013 and will take place twice weekly on Mondays and Thursdays. The first class of each week will include a combination of information and exercise, and the entire second class will feature exercises that will benefit the special needs of the COPD sufferer.

The program will be presented by Certified Respiratory Specialist Candace Arsenault, R.N., assisted by another nurse. Ms. Arsenault says those attending the program will be monitored at all times to ensure their oxygen levels are good, and they will also be evaluated before and after the program to monitor improvement.

"We do spirometry (lung function test) and a six-minute walking test before and after the program to evaluate how they have done

with the exercise," said Ms. Arsenault. "We also send a letter to their physicians to let them know they (the participants) are registered and to give them updates." She added that physicians do not have to be members of the RFHT for their patients to be able to attend the program.

Participants are helped to develop action plans so that they can advocate for themselves in the event of what Ms. Arsenault refers to as a "lung attack". "They can get help faster," she said. "Those who have had

COPD for a while know when they are getting sick."

Hydrant Flushing

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing the annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. If discolouration continues after 10 to 15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519 -867-2993.

Public meeting held on proposed Port Lambton subdivision project

On Nov. 17, about 50 people attended a public meeting concerning a new subdivision proposed for a parcel of land south of Port Lambton. The land is bordered by the St. Clair Parkway, Brander Park Road, and Old River Road. The subdivision plans call for the construction of a total of 167 units - 32 single detached homes and 135 townhouses/semi-detached units.

A representative for the developer explained that the units were being built to appeal to Baby Boomers looking for an attractive area in which to live. However, residents who currently live near the area under discussion were on hand to express multiple concerns regarding the wisdom of building a relatively high-density development in an area that many have chosen because of its quiet, rural charm. Resident Don Myers read a statement in which he said the building of the development was "neither necessary or wise", arguing that many already available lots in the area remain unpurchased. He noted the increased traffic that would put a strain on the undeveloped roads that border the development. Resident Dick Primo, a real estate broker, pointed out that 170 people had signed a petition opposing the development. Drawing on his experience in real estate, he expressed doubts whether the multi-family units proposed for the development would ever be sold and that unsold units could become rentals. He hinted that such an action would likely lead to decreased property values. Resident Bob Murphy expressed concern over the potential impact of renters taking occupancy of the units and asked if there was evidence of the need for such a large development when population in that area had decreased in recent years. Other issues regarding the inclusion of the multi-family dwellings included the need for increased policing and fire service coverage.

At the meeting's conclusion, moderator Dave Posliff, secretary-treasurer of the Lambton Land Division Committee, thanked the residents for their input. He explained that a minimum of 14 days would be needed to gather all information and input pertinent to the project before any decisions could be made. Another public meeting will be required to address any rezoning matters that may arise if the project discussion continues.

Overnight parking on streets prohibited

Motorists are reminded that overnight parking on all municipal streets is now prohibited until April 1, 2013. This ensures that snow plow crews will be able to clear the roads safely and efficiently. Vehicles left parked on the streets will be ticketed.

Residents are also asked to refrain from shoveling snow out onto public roadways. The Ontario Highway Traffic Act prohibits this practice and penalties will be

levied on those who break this law. Unexpected quantities of snow on public roads are hazardous to vehicle traffic.

Program often results in friendships

Illnesses such as pneumonia are especially serious for those with COPD and help needs to be sought quickly. "People often wait (to get help) because they don't want to wait in an emergency room or a doctor's office," she said. "If they have their own medication they can start it as soon as they know they are getting sick."

Program participants are taught how to lessen the difficulties that arise because of their COPD. Since smoking accounts for 95 per cent of COPD cases, participants who are still smoking are urged to give up the habit. And the next most helpful thing they can do for their condition is to be more active. "Aside from quitting smoking, exercise is the next best thing they can do to improve it," said Ms. Arsenault. Exercises taught during the program include COPD-specific breathing and resistance exercises,

cardio and stretching.

During the program, participants will also hear from a dietician, a psychologist, a pharmacist and a respiratory therapist, who come in to offer information from their special fields of expertise. Family members are invited to attend the educational portion of the program to become informed about the disease.

When the program is finished, participants will not be on their own. "We do case management," said Ms. Arsenault. "We follow up with them (participants), either by telephone or through an appointment, and they are always free to contact us."

One of the unexpected benefits of the program is the number of friendships that are often made over the course of 10 weeks. "Friendships have developed while classes were in progress," said Ms. Arsenault, who notes that these friendships allow the new friends to share experiences and offer support.

The St. Clair Raids brought rebel conflict close to home

The St. Clair Raids of 1838 belong to a time in Canadian history when rebellion against British rule shattered the peace of Upper and Lower Canada.

When the initial rebellions were put down in 1837, many of the rebels fled to American border states, including Michigan. There, American sympathizers augmented their numbers and, convinced of support for a popular uprising against what was perceived as British oppression and tyranny, patriotic forces banded together to renew their efforts to "liberate" the Canadas from British rule.


Between January and December, 1838, at least 13 incidents of armed invasion and rebellious acts occurred, and at least three of these took place along the St. Clair River. The first alarm on June 22, 1838 resulted in the Moore Militia being called out, but no rebel action occurred. But on the morning of June 28, 1838, a sloop belonging to Charles (Bourman) Bowerman landed an armed party in Sombra near a general store kept by Claude Gouin. Stock was plundered and the patriots proceeded to the commissariat under charge of Captain McDonald. Eight barrels of flour and 15 bushels of oats were stolen, and Captain McDonald and Angus McDonald were taken prisoner. When the booty and captives were stowed aboard the sloop, the rebels sailed northward up the river to Palmer, now known as St. Clair.

A Michigan deputy marshal crossed the river from Palmer to Sutherland's Landing, between Courtright and Mooretown, to assure the commander of the Moore Militia that he would do all he could to preserve the peace. He revealed that the American steamer *General Gratiot* would soon arrive from Detroit and it would be sent in pursuit of the invaders.

But the deputy marshal's words were not heeded, and 17 Moore Militia volunteers plus seven Chippewa warriors boarded log canoes and pursued the rebels. The patriots landed on the Michigan shore and fled, and the sloop was abandoned in American waters where it became the property of the United States government along with arms and munitions found aboard.

The stolen goods were returned to their rightful owners in Canada, the McDonalds were freed, and the sloop was hitched to the *General Gratiot* to be towed back to Detroit. The potential for war between England and the United States had been averted.

Letters written to officials on June 27 indicated that another group of rebels had landed at Nugent's Inn about two miles above Baby Point, now know as Port Lambton, where they hoisted a liberty pole and a tri-coloured flag, then awaited further orders. They had been ferried across the St. Clair River on the U.S. steamer *Macomb*. Local observers reported that 300 pirates had landed, and that 400 more were expected to cross the river in small boats and canoes. In a report issued by Lt. Governor Sir George Arthur, this number was later reduced to less than 100. The Moore Militia marched to Nugent's Inn and arrested six men, including Horace Cooley, who had previously been in prison on a charge of carrying messages between the patriots in Michigan and discontented residents in Upper Canada. And in another action on the same day, four patriots invaded the house of Mrs. Lick on Bear Creek and shot Captain William Kerry to death before making their escape.

In all, 11 captured patriots were eventually tried before the Court of the King's Bench in Sandwich at the end of September. Charles Bowerman and Horace Cooley were found guilty of burglary and were sentenced to hang on Oct. 2. Their death sentences were commuted and only Cooley was sentenced to transportation. He became one of 93 English speaking rebels who were sent to the penal colony of Van Dieman's Land, now known as Tasmania, as political prisoners for their involvement in the Upper Canada Rebellion of 1838.

As we mark the 175th anniversary of these events, it is with interest that residents of Lambton County can include the St. Clair Raids as part of this important chapter in Canada's history.

Brigden Fair honours Dave Robinson for 50 years of volunteer service

Who would have thought that the need for a dog tag would result in Dave Robinson volunteering 50 years of service to the Brigden Fair? Those who know Dave know he can strike up a conversation with anyone. It was this friendly nature that lead to his discussion about the fair with the dog catcher, who recruited him in 1962 while getting the tag for Dave's dog, *Butch*.

Dave recalls that, at that time, the fair was quite small. When he started working the entry gates, the fairgrounds covered only about three acres. Parking for the fair was outside of the gates and on the streets of Brigden. But in the mid-60s, the grounds expanded to five acres and cars were allowed to park on-site. Further expansions led to 10, then to 50 acres until today, the fairgrounds cover about 100 acres and the main parking entrance is on Courtright Line. It is at this main entrance that Dave has greeted tens of thousands of visitors over the years.

Dave's commitment to volunteering at the gate has been unbroken for 50 years. He has endured heat, cold, dust and rain with no complaints. A few years ago, he accepted another job at the fair with expectations that he would still cover at least two hours each day on the gate. That year, he kept the washrooms clean, which surprised his wife, Marian. The following year, he declined the job, and that *didn't* surprise Marian. However, he did donate the money he earned back to the fair board so that the pipes in the washrooms could be upgraded to keep up with the pressure needs for the busy facility. As usual, Dave recognized a need and met it.

Dave Robinson enjoys a lot of stories and his life is rich with them. One involves some lads, a few watchdogs, and the OPP. The fellows didn't want to enter through the gate in the traditional manner. Apparently, they didn't want to pay the entrance fees. So they decided to hop the fence about 300 feet from the south gate but landed in the midst of three German shepherds who belonged to one of the midway workers.

The dogs cornered the youths and Dave thought the dogs had the situation under control, so he left them there and went to call the police so the lads could explain to the authorities what had happened. Dave thinks they deserved what they got.

While working the gate at the fair, Dave has warmly greeted generations of friends and neighbours while enjoying the camaraderie and companionship of his fellow volunteers. Fifty consecutive years at the gate is an outstanding achievement and a challenge to today's generation.

This year has been a year of recognition for Dave. In addition to his 50 years at the Brigden Fair, he was recently acknowledged for his 40

years of canvassing for the Canadian Cancer Society, 17 years of of volunteering at the Stones and Bones Museum, 20 years as a volunteer at the Moore Museum, and 50 years at the Lambton United Church Centre. For all his time, effort and commitment, he was recently awarded the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal.

Dave's father taught him, "If you can't help your neighbour, you can't help yourself." Dave lives by these words and has offered countless hours of volunteering throughout Lambton County.

Legion Dominion President asks for increased funeral support for veterans

In a recent generally-released Letter to the Editor from Royal Canadian Legion Dominion President Gordon Moore, it was pointed out that veterans receive only \$3,600 to help cover the cost of funeral expenses, with funeral directors obliged by law to cover any remaining costs when the veteran's family cannot. Mr. Moore argues veterans should be eligible for \$12,700, the amount already established for Canadian Forces and RCMP personnel.

Mr. Moore writes, "...these funds should be made available, without complex eligibility requirements, to all those Veterans


who have insufficient financial means. Complex eligibility requirements are contrary to the "need principles" enshrined in the Canadian Forces Military and Veterans Re-Establishment and Compensation Act (CFMVRCA). Veterans were willing to give their lives for this country, honouring them properly in the last final act is the least the country can do for them."

On behalf of the Royal Canadian Legion, Mr. Moore writes, "...we fully support the efforts of the funeral directors to see an increase in funding for Veterans funeral services and we will continue to press the Federal government on this issue."

The sound of a solitary bugle gave notice that the time of remembrance was at hand as millions of Canadians paid their respects to the fallen at 11 a.m. on Nov. 11. In Corunna, a sober crowd gathered at the clock tower cenotaph to hear Padre Paul Woolley speak of courage, loss and hope. When wreaths were placed, Mayor Steve Arnold placed one in memory of Private William Cushley of Port Lambton who died in the line of duty on Sept. 3, 2006, and another for Corporal Brent Poland of Camlachie, who died in the line of duty on April 8, 2007.

40th annual Juvenile International Silver Stick Tournament comes to Mooretown

Don't let the NHL strike get you down. 2013 is going to start with some exciting hockey action right here in St. Clair Township.

The 40th annual Juvenile International Silver Stick Tournament rolls into the Mooretown Sports Complex Jan. 3 through 6.

Teams that will be vying for top honours in each division are:

AAA Division: Ajax, East Enders, Humberview, Mississauga, Stouffville, and Whitby.

A Division: East Gwillimbury, Erie North Shore, Glanbrook, Quinte West.

B Division: Mooretown, Delhi, Lincoln, Walkerton.

C Division: Arthur, Beverly, Campbellford, East Lambton, Lambton Shores, Norwood, Seaforth, Stayner, Teeswater, Wainfleet.

Daily admission to the tournament will be \$5 per adult, \$3 per student or senior, and \$14 for a full weekend of great sports action.

International Silver Stick hockey was the idea of Jack Kinsella, who conceived of the tournament as a way to promote the game of hockey while fostering goodwill between Canada and the United States. According to the official International Silver Stick Hockey Association Inc. Website, tournament philosophy is aimed at helping players develop citizenship and international goodwill through hockey.

The first tournament was held in February, 1958 between Bantam and Peewee teams from Potsdam, New York and South Carleton, Ontario. These tournaments gradually expanded throughout Canada, the United States, and even into Canadian Forces bases in Europe.

By 1961, Port Huron, Michigan, assisted by Sarnia, Ontario, became the site of the Silver Stick Tournament in the U.S. In 1963, the McMorran Arena in Port Huron became the Silver Stick's new official home.
