

St. Clair Township youth receives Queen's Jubilee Medal

St. Clair Township resident Kaitlyn Anderson was one of several township citizens to receive the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012. What makes her stand out from the other recipients is the fact that Kaitlyn is only 18 years old. After starting her charity efforts at age 12, she has already become a driving force behind a number of fundraising efforts aimed at easing the lives of people around the world. For instance, she has raised over \$20,000 toward clean water projects in Africa and, closer to home, she helps provide prom dresses for girls who would otherwise be unable to afford them through the *Cinderella Story* program.

On hand for the presentation was Sarnia -Lambton M.P. Pat Davidson, who commented that youth is our future but "Kaitlyn isn't waiting for the future." Kaitlyn was also commended for her compassion and concern for others.

Mayor Steve Arnold noted Kaitlyn was a role model for youth who wanted to make a difference. "Kaitlyn is a fantastic example of what our young men and women are, and what they continue to do to make our world a better place," he said. In addition to her important work on the African clean water

project, Mayor Arnold applauded her efforts with community projects like the Cinderella Story and her work with the 4-H Club, caring for the environment through efforts such as park and community cleanups. "We are very proud of her and pleased she has been recognized by receiving the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal."

Kaitlyn is currently studying at the University of Western Ontario, Brescia campus, and would eventually like to work in a children's hospital researching dietary/ nutritional needs.

St. Clair River Trail receives significant funding boost

The St. Clair River Trail recently received a significant grant that will be used to construct the southern section of trail from Brander Park in Port Lambton to the Chatham-Kent border at Whitebread Line.

The \$135,000 grant was obtained by applying to the Feddev Ontario Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund, a process that was handled by trail committee member Rose Atkins. The official announcement of this funding was slated to be made during a ceremony held at Brander Park on Jan. 25.

The funding will allow for the expansion of the existing 30 kilometre trail by about 2.44 kilometres. With this section of trail in place, the St. Clair River Trail will connect with the municipality of Chatham-Kent and, ultimately, to the Trans-Canada Trail.

It is hoped that the trail's completion and its subsequent connection to the Trans -Canada Trail will promote increased cycling tourism, forming an international cycling loop with Michigan's Bridge to Bay Trail. Increased tourism is expected to have a positive impact on local businesses as well as the Sombra and Walpole Island ferries, Sombra and Moore Museums, and other amenities.

It should be noted that a 10 kilometre segment of the river trail is certified by Athletics Canada and is used for the annual St. Clair River Run which attracted an estimated 600 participants in 2012 and continues to gain popularity within the running/fitness community.

St. Clair Township property owners who have questions about their assessments (taxation years 2013 - 2016) will soon have two opportunities to discuss them with an MPAC representative. St. Clair Township has scheduled two dates for these meetings: Thursday, Feb. 21 and Tuesday, March 5. The meetings will be held in the Council Chambers at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre, 1155 Emily Street in Mooretown, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. both days.

An appointment is required to meet with the MPAC representative. Anyone wishing to schedule a meeting can call MPAC directly at 1-866-296-6722. Property owners must indicate they are calling to set up an appointment and specify the date they want it slated for. On the day of the meeting, property owners must bring their Property Assessment Notice to the appointment.

The Ontario Highway Traffic Act prohibits this practice and penalties will be levied on those who break this law. Unexpected quantities of snow on public roads are hazardous to vehicle traffic. This snow also hampers the efforts of municipal road crews that often work long hours to keep the roads clear and safe for public use.

Bentpath Women's Institute celebrates 100th anniversary this year

The Bentpath Women's Institute was organized on Thursday, Feb. 11, 1913 and since that time, its members have brought about positive changes in the health and welfare of local children, and in the community in general.

At the time of its creation, the men of the community held regular meetings through the Farmer's Institute. The women's equivalent of this group came about when the Department of Agriculture asked the men if they would like to have a lady speaker address one of their meetings. Mrs. Norman was sent out from the department and was responsible for organizing the Bentpath W.I.

According to current member Alice Langstaff, since the group's creation, it has hosted many courses, conferences, and special speakers on subjects ranging from nursing, canning, and sewing to cooking and education in all branches of home economics. The group also kept the community scene lively with parties, plays, socials, suppers and picnics.

During World War I, the women used their crafting skills in support 11. See page 7 for more information.

of the war effort, canning, knitting, sewing and making bandages to be shipped overseas, as well as raising large sums of money to fund soldier comforts as well as Belgian relief and other war-related concerns. They worked with the local Red Cross as well. Through the years, the Bentpath W. I. was instrumental in promoting health inspections in the schools, and also launched a lending library. It also sponsored the Girls Homemaking Clubs, or 4-H Clubs as they are now called. Many girls have received county and provincial honours through this effort.

One of the group's important contributions to the heritage of the area is the Tweedsmuir History Book, which has taken on an almost legendary reputation within the community. It is a carefully kept record of local events, many illustrated with historical photos and data.

The members of the Bentpath W. I., past and present, have always lived up to the Institute Motto, *For Home and Country*.

The group will celebrate its 100th anniversary on Monday, Feb. 11. See page 7 for more information.

Council approves creation of Heritage St. Clair Committee

It's official. At the Jan. 7 meeting of Clair Township council, approval was given to a new heritage committee to be know as Heritage St. Clair. A group of dedicated volunteers will now begin to identify projects that will preserve and sustain the municipality's heritage sites and lore for future generations. Councillor Jeff Agar will represent council on the committee, acting as a liaison to provide an efficient line of communication between the two parties.

Committee spokesperson Ian Mason says the committee recently discussed several potential projects, but recognizes that little gets done when too many projects are attempted at one time. "We have to be careful not to get too scattered among too many projects," he said. "Our challenge will be to pick just one or two projects, then proceed to completion with the ones we choose." A new group of officers was slated to be elected during the month of January, after which the group can proceed with their work. A volunteer application form has been drafted for those who would like to join the group.

Mayor Steve Arnold welcomes the committee's initiatives. "From my point of view, it is a great step in recognizing places, people and events that are part of our community's heritage and part of what we are," he said.
