Bullies beware the awesome power of pink



The students at Mooretown-Courtright Public School are fed up with bullying and they aren't going to tolerate it any more. They made their point recently by celebrating the Day of Pink, a concept introduced to the Grade 7/8 class by teacher Shelley Swan.

Ms. Swan had her students work on art projects to show the rest of the school what the Day of Pink represents. The projects took a number of forms, including posters, announcements, slide shows, a skit, a banner, a dance, a song and a rap, engaging the whole school in a united campaign against bullying. Most of the students, shown here in a group photo with their teachers, wore pink and a *Bullying Stops Here* badge to show their support.

Ms. Swan noted that April 10 marked the International Day of Pink, a time when communities across Canada and around the world can unite to celebrate diversity and raise awareness to stop all forms of bullying. This day got its start in Nova Scotia when two high school students saw a student wearing a pink shirt being bullied. The two students not only intervened, but they decided to buy pink shirts and a few days later, they got everyone at the school to arrive wearing pink shirts. The message they wished to convey was this: anyone can bully and anyone can be victimized by bullying but together, we can stop it. Each year on the second Wednesday of April, millions of people wear pink to remember that positive actions make a difference. Change begins with each one of us.

St. Clair Township council has opted to become a member of the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative, a coalition of mayors and other local officials advocating for the protection and restoration of the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River. The organization, founded in 2003, currently includes 71 member cities in Canada and the United States that demonstrate stewardship and a responsibility at the local level to enhance and sustain the lakes and rivers.

Mayor Arnold said membership was a good way "to ensure the interests of the township are being served" since the St. Clair River is such an integral part of the municipality's environment.

The Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River comprise the world's largest freshwater resource and are considered an international treasure, essential to the continued vitality of the cities, townships, villages and counties along their shores. This waterway supports critical aquatic and costal ecosystems, provides fresh drinking water for millions of people, allow the development of valuable tourism opportunities, and supports agricultural and industrial activities. The coalition gives mayors an active voice in the development and implementation of policies and programs that impact these waterways, plus a network for restoration and protection best practices sharing between cities.

Veterans honoured with street name

An initiative is currently underway to honour veterans who fought and often made the supreme sacrifice in defence of their country. A local request from the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 447 in Corunna has been submitted to council, asking that Hill Street between Highway 40 and Lyndoch Street be recognized as Veterans' Way. The letter pointed out that the Town of Petrolia has already received permission from the county to have Petrolia Line from the town to Highway 40 recognized in this way.

Since Hill Street and Petrolia Line are county roads, the county must be consulted on this matter. St. Clair Township council has endorsed the Legion's letter and forwarded it to the County of Lambton for consideration.

In the Legion's letter, the road's designation as Veterans' Way "would help perpetuate remembrance and foster a continued reminder that 'We Will Remember Them'."

Power line upgrade of concern

Council expressed concern over information submitted by Hydro One regarding the upgrade of Hydro One's Lambton Generating Station to Longwood Transmission Station. Seventy kilometres of high voltage transmission line will be replaced during this upgrade. The power line runs overhead through Brigden very close to Brigden Public School and council is concerned about the safety and noise issues that will need to be addressed during the upgrade process.

Proposal to remove Grade 7/8 students causes concern

Parents and other concerned residents of the Port Lambton/Sombra area fear the relocation of Grade 7/8 students from Riverview Public School to the Wallaceburg District Secondary School will have far reaching negative repercussions on the school and local families. On behalf of council, St. Clair Township Councillor Darrell Randell has been monitoring the situation since it began. He says the Accommodation Review Committee (ARC) recommendation to include Riverview in the Wallaceburg group of schools is "flawed." Riverview is considered a feeder school for the Wallaceburg high school even though many of the Riverview students end up attending other high schools instead.

Councillor Randell said, "I hope the board will not accept that part of the recommendation." He says relocating the Riverview students to Wallaceburg will be expensive and present a hardship for many of the affected families, and he expressed hope that everyone concerned about this proposed move will let the board know how they feel. The board is due to vote on this matter at its June 11 meeting, but there are still two meetings left at which concerned residents voice their opinions of the proposal.

Lambton Creative County Fund supports 12 projects

Sombra Museum speaker relates the incredible facts surrounding the Storm of 1913

Painter James Clary was a wealth of information on how a perfect storm can devastate ships and tear apart families long before the movie, *The Perfect Storm*, and the events that inspired it ever happened.


Mr. Clary spoke to an enthusiastic audience when he presented *The Storm of 1913*, one of the six fall and winter lectures presented by the Sombra Museum this season. He noted it was the most destructive storm to grip the Great Lakes since the beginning of commercial shipping. It began on Nov. 7, 1913 and raged for four days.

He says the greatest force of the storm was felt on Lake Huron, where eight freighters were lost with no survivors and over a dozen vessels were blown ashore. The blinding snowstorm and gigantic waves whipped up by 70 mile-an-hour winds assaulted every ship on the Great Lakes, damaging vessels and forcing them to seek safety.

The Sombra Museum's exhibition on the *Storm of 1913*, currently being displayed in the Sydenham/St. Clair Room, draws the visitor into that desperate time through the use of newspaper front pages and news reports of the storm. Unlike today, when we experience immediate news coverage, the news of the disaster was slow to reach the eyes and ears of a concerned public. Sombra Museum Curator Shelley Lucier notes, "It must have been unbelievably agonising for family and loved ones as they waited for what must have

seemed an eternity to learn the fate of the ships and their crews."

The display also demonstrates the effect of the storm within our own community. A number of prints by James Clary are also on display to illustrate the fury, the violence and the horror inspired by the storm of 1913, as

well as the valiant effort of ships as they fought for their survival against the fury of the storm.

The Sombra Museum opens for the 2013 season on Victoria Day Weekend from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and will be open daily from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in June, July and August.

The Storm of 1913 display will be on exhibit all season.
