# New Brigden Fair Ambassador crowned

A beaming Kaitlynn Anderson donned her ambassador's tiara for the first time on Aug. 14 after being chosen as the new Brigden Fair Ambassador for 2013-14. Four candidates vied for the title, with Taylor Myers taking the title of runner-up. The two also excelled during the speeches competition, with Taylor Myers' speech taking top honours and Kaitlynn Anderson's speech taking the second place 'reserve' designation.

The 18-year-old Ambassador will take on a host of duties during this year's 163rd Brigden Fair on Thanksgiving weekend, but she will also be busy throughout the

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## Continued growth within St. Clair Township bodes well for a good year

The second quarter building permit figures for 2013 continue to indicate healthy growth in St. Clair Township. As of June, 2013 permits for new residential construction stand at 24, far ahead of the meager 3 registered by this time in 2012. The current value of this construction stands at \$5,562,000 compared to last year's total value of \$625,000.

The overall picture looks much the

same. Total permits issued in the first six months stand at 91 compared to last year's total of 82, with the total value of construction to date standing at \$9,498,400 compared to the yearly 2012 total of \$6,896,200.

Mayor Steve Arnold says this trend bodes well for sustained future growth. He also noted community infrastructure improvements are also adding to the overall quality of life within the municipality.

## Notice to property owners to destroy weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Section 3, 16, and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$50.)

## Hydrant flushing underway

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. If discolouration continues after 10 to 15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

# **Township of St. Clair** Yard Waste/Brush Collection 2013

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

Yard Waste is collected separately from regular waste on a weekly basis in urbanized areas of the township, with collection starting at 7 a.m. Yard waste from the balance of the township is collected with the regular waste collection.

## **COLLECTION SCHEDULE**

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday of each week depending on the service area.

During the month of September, yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection, subject to the six (6) item limit.

## Fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, Oct. 9 and Friday, Oct. 11 and will continue until Wednesday, Nov. 13 and Friday, Nov. 15.

## WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil).

Items NOT PERMITTED, include: kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached. (See Brush Collection below.)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers marked with an "X" on both sides, and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. The term "open containers" does **NOT** include blue boxes or cardboard boxes.


Containers must not exceed 23 kg / 50 lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.

## **BRUSH COLLECTION**

Small brush bundles will also be collected on Oct. 18 with the following guidelines: 4 feet maximum length, 1 inch maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled), tied and placed at curb.


## Brigden Fair News - new contest, new Ag In The Classroom format 163rd Brigden Fair - October 11, 12, 13 & 14

## Marine mishaps part of Quality control = great eats at volunteer dinner life on the St. Clair River

Life on the St. Clair River runs smoothly most of the time thanks to modern day navigational devices, dependable water craft and constant vigilance on the part of Coast Guard units from both sides of the river

But at the turn of the century, river mariners had their share of trials and tribulations to endure. Take this example submitted by history buff, Mr. A. Ander

He writes this account of an incident that illustrates how dicey things could get. "100 years ago, Aug. 17, 1913, the steamer Atikokan, a whale-back freighter down bound in the St. Clair River, suddenly lost steering control."


"With a whistle blowing danger, the freighter was headed for Marine City, Michigan, directly opposite Sombra. With a crash, bang, and boom, the freighter ran right out of the water, wiping out several waterfront buildings. Fortunately, no one was hurt or killed, but the Atikokan was high and dry, and in need of help."

"The Sombra shore proved a great viewing ground for this spectacle. Three tugs arrived later in the day to provide assistance in towing her (the Atikokan) from her dry land perch. Members of the Sarnia Yacht Club made a trip downriver to view this spectacle. When they arrived in Sombra, they docked at the Whitely ferry dock opposite the Grand Union Hotel and had a front row seat to the action."

Mr. Ander says the Atikokan was freed later in the afternoon and was deemed safe enough to continue on its way, and with the drama resolved, the Sarnia yachtsmen headed back upriver to the club.

The photo below records that exciting afternoon in 1913. Here is the Atikokan grounded and awaiting rescue.

## **Information sessions offered by Rapids Family Health Team**

The following information sessions are being offered starting in September at the Rapids Family Health Team clinic at 233 Cameron Street in Corunna. There is no charge for these sessions and they are open to anyone living in St. Clair Township, however, registration is required. Please note that space is limited.

#### Living with diabetes

This two-hour session, set for Tuesday, Sept. 10 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., provides a general overview of diabetes. The most common myths about diabetes and things that can be done to manage diabetes will be discussed, and you will also learn what "good control" really is. The discussion is led by a diabetes educator.

#### **Diabetes Healthy Eating and Physical Activity**

This two-hour session, set for Tuesday, Sept. 17 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., is for people who have already attended the *Living With Dia-*

*betes* class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session will be led by a registered dietitian.

## Healthy Weights by Healthy Means

This five-session program, slated to begin on Sept. 11 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., aims to help you make permanent lifestyle changes. It is not a diet program. Some topics that will be discussed include: carbohydrate, protein and fats; physical activity and what types and amounts are beneficial; emotional eating strategies; sensible portions and portion control strategies, and more.

Group discussions will help you learn from others' experiences. The group will work on weekly actions plans and problem-solving exercises to help you reach your healthy eating and physical activity goals. Each participant will receive a copy of a manual to keep. The session will be led by a registered dietitian.

#### **Healthy Weights Support Group**

This support group is for persons who have previously attended the Healthy Weights by Healthy Means group program or have received individual nutrition counseling with one of our registered dietitians. It will be held the last Wednesday of every

month from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. with the first session starting on Sept. 25.

The Weight Loss Support Group is a drop-in program offering support, problem solving and the opportunity to ask questions and review strategies for achieving and maintaining a healthy weight. Sessions will be facilitated by a registered dietitian but the format will be casual.

Participants will determine what is discussed by bringing forth topics of interest. They will also have the opportunity to check their weight, if desired. Participants do not need to register to attend. Just show up for the scheduled time and date, and show your health card at reception.

## Master Your Health: Managing Chronic Conditions

Master Your Health is a six-week workshop series designed to help clients living with chronic conditions such as diabetes or heart disease to build confidence to manage their own health

care. The ultimate goal is to assist clients in becoming better advocates of their own health. Emphasis is placed on goal-setting. These goals may be as simple as making the bed in the morning.

As clients succeed in obtaining their goals, it builds on their self-confidence and they proceed to take on larger challenges. Many of the daily challenges that clients living with chronic conditions deal with are discussed during the six weeks. These may include: depression, breathing exercises, physical activity, healthy eating, pain, fatigue, treatment decisions, goal-setting, action planning, etc. Clients are invited to bring friends, pars, a paighbour or loyad one



family members, a neighbour or loved one.
