Moore Museum makes room for big donation


The Moore Museum recently welcomed a new addition to its fire station equipment.

Thanks to a very large artifact donation from LanXess, the museum is now the proud owner of a 1946 Ford fire truck that was completely restored by Bayer employees when it was first acquired by the company. This huge acquisition has made it necessary to make a few major changes to the museum's on-suit fire house. The south end of the structure has been altered, with the roof being raised several feet and the rest of the structure renovated to comply with modern building codes. All of the work has been done by enthusiastic museum volunteers, who have toiled long hours to get the fire house ready to accommodate the new truck before the Winter weather closes in.

The museum has an earlier model fire truck, but it is still in need of restoration.

Hydrant flushing underway

St. Clair Township residents should be advised that the Public Works Department is now doing annual flushing of all fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The flushing, which will continue through the fall, may cause discolouration when residents use taps, flush toilets, do laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into the residence. It is recommended that the cold water tap be allowed to run for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears. If discolouration continues after 10 to 15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

Yard Waste is collected separately from regular waste on a weekly basis in urbanized areas of the township, with collection starting at 7 a.m. Yard waste from the balance of the township is collected with the regular waste collection. **COLLECTION SCHEDULE**

WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil).

Items NOT PERMITTED, include: kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached. (*See Brush Collection below.*)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers marked with an "X" on both sides, and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. The term "open containers" does **NOT** include blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23 kg / 50 lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.



An Old-Fashioned Christmas a holiday tradition at the Moore Museum

The Moore Museum's most popular school program is *An Old-Fashioned Christmas*. Approximately 1,000 children attend this program each year, experiencing the traditions and the spirit of Christmases long past.

The log cabin is decorated for a homespun pioneer family Christmas. Trees and toys in the main building bring the traditions and elegance of the Victorian Era to life. Students taste history when they participate in a taffy pull and sample the results. They are able to create a pioneer or Victorian-style decoration, giving each student a souvenir to take home to add to their own family's Christmas traditions.

These decorations often become treasured heirlooms to be enjoyed

by generations yet to be. Adults who visit during this Christmas celebration often recall visiting the museum as children and making the decoration that still hangs on their family tree each year.

An Old-Fashioned Christmas is available for school groups from Nov. 25 to Dec. 19 this year. Morning and afternoon bookings are offered, and evenings for children's groups can be arranged. Programs must be booked in advance. Program dates fill up quickly so teachers are encouraged to call soon to ensure the best time slots. The cost of the program is \$4.05 per student.

Four local schools heralded new philosophy of education

Brigden Public School and Mooretown-Courtright Public School are celebrating their 50th anniversary this year. Other schools of this era include the former East Sombra School which was opened in 1963 and closed in 1999, and Riverview School, opened in 1964. When newlybuilt, these structures and the new philosophy of education that accompanied them replaced the one, two, and three-room schools that were dotted across the township. The concept of small community schools had been the core of public education since pioneer times.


The former Sombra Township was the first to have a publicsupported school. One is believed to have been erected in 1830 on Lot One of Concession 9 and James Henderson was the first teacher there. In the former Moore Township, Thomas Sutherland build the first school in 1835 in Sutherland's Landing between Mooretown and Courtright. It was a two-storey building measuring seven metres by nine metres, with the school on the first floor and the Commissioner's Court on the second. John Pullman was the teacher there.

Captain William Wright, a retired British naval officer, settled with a land grant in the former Moore Township in a home he called Oaklands. He brought his wife and seven daughters with him to Upper Canada, but his wife died of cholera along the way to Corunna. Captain Wright brought a governess, Miss Clark, over from England to look after the children. She ended up teaching the children of several neighbours, who were also British naval officers, in addition to the Wright family.

In this way, Captain Wright was able to offset the cost of employing a governess. Since he and his neighbours were thought of as local aristocracy, the girls' education was no doubt focused on becoming a proper English lady.

The session will cover some of the most common myths about diabetes, what "good control" is, and some of the things you can do to manage your diabetes. The session is led by a diabetes educator.

Diabetes: Healthy Eating and Physical Activity

This two-hour session will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 19 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. for people who have already attended our Living With Diabetes class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet. The session will cover the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session is led by a registered dietitian.

Healthy Weights by Healthy Means

This program begins Wednesday, Nov. 6 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. and is comprised of five sessions lasting two hours each. It aims to help you make permanent lifestyle changes. This is not a 'diet' program. Some topics that will be discussed include: carbohydrates, protein and fats, physical activity and what types and amounts are beneficial, emotional eating strategies, sensible portions and portion control strategies, and more.

Group discussions will help you learn from others' experiences. The

group will work on weekly action plans and problem solving exercises to help you reach your healthy eating and physical activity goals. Each participant will receive a copy of a manual to keep. The session is led by a registered dietitian.

Healthy Weights Support Group

This support group is for people who have previously attended the Healthy Weights by Healthy Means group program or have received individual nutrition counseling with one of our registered dietitians. The group meets the last Wednesday of every month from noon to 1 p.m., and the November meeting is slated for Nov. 27.

The Weight Loss Support Group is a drop-in program offering support, problem solving and the opportunity to ask questions and review strategies for achieving and maintaining a healthy weight. Sessions will be facilitated by a registered dietitian but the format will be casual. Participants will determine what is discussed by bringing forth topics of interest. Participants will also have the opportunity to check their weight, if desired. Participants do not need to register to attend; simply show up for the scheduled time and date, and show your health card at reception.

Quit smoking workshop

This workshop is a two-hour session for people who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, manage withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse.

Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments with one of our nurse educators to receive further support and information. The session is set for Friday, Nov. 15 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

The goal of the village is to help make the children of Lambton County aware of the many safety issues that face them each day. This, in turn, will help them avoid injury and the potentially dangerous situations that cause them. They are taught a wide range of safety lessons, from bike safety, fire safety and farm safety to Internet safety.

Mrs. Strickland says, "Your vote will make a difference and assist the committee in becoming one of the grant prize winners from Aviva Insurance. The grant will help put the shovel in the ground so that our dreams may become a reality for our kids."

The grant is only one way the committee is raising funds toward the building of the new children's village. The committee hopes to raise \$1.5 million with the rest of the projected \$2,050,000 to be raised through "in kind" donations such as supplies, building materials, etc. from businesses, industries and individuals.

Lambton Children's Safety Village Committee Chair Mary Ann Buntrock says several local sports organizations are helping with fundraising events during home games. The Sarnia Legionaires recently held a "pail drop" during their home game against Chatham, and the Mooretown Flags will be holding a "pail drop" at their home game on Saturday, Nov. 2.

The committee has done a feasibility study in the county to find out if there is support for this project and the findings are encouraging. "Ninety-two per cent of the valley companies support the project," said Mrs. Buntrock. "The support is there, we just need to find the funding." A 2.2 acre site for the village has already been secured in Mooretown to the south of the St. Clair Township Civic Centre on Emily Street. This location is ideal since it is within a 30 minute drive of the majority of Lambton County schools.

Today's world can be a dangerous place for children. Parents cannot always be present to prevent their children from falling victim to those dangers, but with the right kind of safety preparation like the kind afforded by the Lambton Children's Safety Village program, children will be better equipped to identify those dangers and give them the skills they need to be safe. Injury prevention experts estimate that 90 to 95 per cent of childhood injuries are preventable and by teaching safety awareness to children and adults alike, overall hospital costs can be vastly reduced. The motto of the safety village program reflects this philosophy: *Tell me and I will forget; Show me and I may re*-



member; Involve me and I will understand.

In addition to the village, which will include a miniature street layout complete with railway crossings, traffic lights and intersections plus kid-sized buildings, there will be a full scale on-site educational centre containing two classrooms, kitchen facilities and the Mooretown branch of the Lambton County Library.

The Moore Museum and the Mooretown Sports Complex are located across the street from the proposed site, providing additional teaching opportunities for the students that visit.

The facilities will be built to accommodate people with disabilities and special needs, and other structures will be built according to the wishes of financial supporters as long as they meet the requirements of the safety village. Contributors that make substantial monetary donations to the project will have the opportunity to name the structure or feature they fund.
