Q105 warship's helm standing by for action

Landlubbers and old salts alike are going to enjoy the newest addition to the Sombra Museum's marine display. Artifacts from the Q105 sub chaser, a sleek ocean-worthy war ship built in 1943 by Mac-Craft Company Limited in Sarnia, are now on display there

Not only can you look, but you can touch as well thanks to an interactive mock helm built with actual Q105 components, including the ship's wheel, the chadburn (speed control device located to the right of the wheel in this photo), the voice pipe/speaking tube, located directly behind wheel, and the ship's compass, not seen here, is now located to the left of the wheel.

Visitors are encouraged to take the wheel and embark on a perilous patrol with one of the many supply convoys that risked submarine attack while navigating the shipping

Council approves 2014 operating/capital budget

The 2014 operating and capital budget for St. Clair Township, approved by council on April 28, will maintain the same level of service. The net budget increase, after factoring the assessment growth, is 2.39 per cent. This translates into \$12.33 in additional taxes per \$100,000 residential assessment for the Township portion of the property tax bill.

On a yearly basis, since 2009, the Province of Ontario has been reducing the Township operating grant. This translates into a 1 per cent loss of revenue on the overall budget. The closure of Lambton Generating Station south of Courtright has resulted in lower property tax revenues of 1.7 per cent of the overall budget, and more loss revenues are expected in future years.

Council has approved 73 capital projects with a gross cost

of \$10,109,000. Some of the major projects include \$250,000 for the replacement of a fire tanker for the Wilkesport fire station and \$280,000 for a tandem axle dump truck for the public works department. Road resurfacing and water main replacement in the amount of \$1,235,000 for work on the St. Clair Parkway between Frog Point and Courtright Line is planned. The budget includes \$800,000 for the replacement of 1,230 high pressure lamps with LED lights. This will result in an energy saving of 65 per cent, with an expected payback in 4.5 years. There is \$1,100,000 planned for use on the water main loop on LaSalle Line, with a 66 per cent grant being received.

Road crews help monitor indigenous species

Lambton County road crews recently received a crash course in how to identify native snake and turtle species, and the important role reptiles play in the environment.

The presentation was made by St. Clair Region Conservation Authority staff, assisted by Jenny Pearce of Sciensational Sssnakes. It is hoped that by teaching the crews how to identify specific species during their daily tasks they will be able to provide valuable information about specie sightings, including road kills, to gain a better understanding of the population of reptiles, especially those at risk.

The Q105 was classified as a Fairmile, a small war ship that could be built in a relatively small shipyard. It was one of 456 merchant ships and about 300 naval vessels designed by Canadian ship yards on the Great Lakes, 14 were built in B.C. and seven were built in Nova Scotia during WWII. HERITAGE CORNER



Oh, how times have changed in Corunna!

For present-day Corunna residents, it's difficult to visualize the Corunna of a century ago. Even residents born and raised in the town will not remember it as it was in February, 1879. But thanks to vintage Sarnia Observer files transcribed and submitted to Heritage Corner by Allan Anderson of the Heritage St. Clair Committee, The Beacon will now give you a glimpse into the Corunna of yesteryear.

It is an average day in the bustling town of Corunna, its tree-lined streets shaded from the summer sun by thick green foliage. Horse-drawn wagons and carriages ply the rough dirt streets moving people and goods to their respective destinations. The blacksmith's hammer can be heard ringing with a steady rhythm within the smithy's shop as it beats a rod of molten iron into a new horse shoe or a sturdy gate latch. A group of ladies dressed in ankle-length skirts and starched white shirtwaist blouses hurry along the sidewalk on the way to Mr. Proctor's shop to buy new hats for the upcoming Methodist church social, while another group enters Mr. McGuire's store to pick up some baking supplies to make pastries for the same social.

From the east, a large passenger wagon carrying some finely-dressed oil executives enters the townon the way to the Fitzgibbon Hotel for a meeting with the local reeve and councillors. The cheap land and handy river transport holds promise for new petroleum-based business ventures. Along the way, they are impressed to see a thriving community that boasts three harness makers, two shoemakers, and a tinsmith. One of the men comments that such a town, located in such a beautiful river setting, might be a lovely place to build a summer home, a respite from the hustle and bustle of the oil business.

Meanwhile, at the Tobin Hotel, the local constable is reading the riot act to a pair of slightly inebriated sailors who have come to blows over the affections of the winsome miss who serves up lunch and wanton smiles in the hotel restaurant.

In the belfry of the Roman Catholic Church, a mournful funeral chime

reminds the town that one of their own has fallen victim to the merciless passage of time, while in another part of town, the angelic voices of the Presbyterian church choir can be heard practicing for Sunday service. And down the road, the Episcopal church is the scene of much activity as traps are set to foil an invasion of field mice that have been nibbling holes in the bellows of the church's pump organ.

At four o'clock, the raucous squeals of children newly liberated from their desks in the large, commodious schoolhouse spread throughout the town. Their studies are now forgotten in favour of hide-and-go-seek or cops and robbers. They have a whole summer ahead of them and not a minute of play must be missed.

In front of the post office, a young woman quickly opens a letter that bears a Toronto postmark. She smiles as she reads of the birth of her first niece and of her sister's first days of motherhood.

From the river comes the sound of men shouting as they set the sails on a river barge bound downriver for Sombra to pick up a load of lumber.

At dusk, the warm glow of kerosene lamps shine their welcoming light from every household and the setting sun adorns the river with a wide ribbon of sparkling gold. Corunna settles down for another day, all commerce ceased, all labours ended until the rising sun brings it one step closer to the future.

It is a future that will see combustion engine-powered vehicles glide along paved streets past computerized businesses, stores that offer an unimaginable selection of food and flowers regardless of the season, restaurants that offer exotic fare from faraway places like Greece, China, and Italy, and people who talk into tiny electronic devices while they walk along the street.

It is the Corunna that over 6,000 people will call home in a new municipality that will blend Moore and Sombra Townships into one beautiful place called St. Clair Township.

Century-old Wurlitzer military band organ opens Sombra Museum summer season

If you were anywhere near the St. Clair Parkway between Corunna and Port Lambton on May 17, you may have thought there was a carnival nearby. The music was actually coming from a Wurlitzer military band organ owned by Gerry and Cathy Koolen of Port Franks. The couple traversed the route to draw attention to the summer season opening of the Sombra Museum. The Koolen's bought the merry music maker in August, 2013, but the organ was built in 1916 by C.W. Parker of Kansas. Originally steam-driven, the organ spent years setting a jolly mood for a carousel. It was restored in 1986 and is one of only six Model 147 organs known to have been made. Gerry and Cathy enjoy taking the organ to special events and meeting other vintage band organ enthusiasts.

TOWNSHIP OF ST. CLAIR YARD WASTE/BRUSH COLLECTION 2014

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas, in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

"Yard Waste" is collected separately from regular waste, on a weekly basis, in urbanized areas of the Township (collection begins at 7:00 AM). Yard waste from the balance of the Township is collected with the regular waste collection.

COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday, each week, depending on the service area.

Wednesday: • Corunna (including Froomfield area)

• St. Clair Parkway (North of Emily St., Mooretown)

Friday: • Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

• Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Gardens

• St. Clair Parkway (South of Emily St., Mooretown)

Spring yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, April 30th and Friday May 2nd, and will continue until Wednesday, June 18th and Friday June 20th.

During the months of **July** through **September** yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection, subject to the 6 item limit.

Fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, October 22nd and Friday, October 24th, and will continue until Wednesday, November 26th and Friday, November 28th.

(Note: Fall yard waste collection dates posted in the Township calendar should be the same as above)

WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs, (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached are not permitted. (Brush Collection see below)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in **clear or transparent plastic bags**, **paper bags**, **or open containers clearly marked with an "X"** on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. Open containers DOES NOT INCLUDE: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg / 50lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will **not be collected**.

BRUSH COLLECTION:

Small Brush Bundles will also be collected on May 23rd, June 13th, and October 24th with the following guidelines: 4' maximum length, 1" maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled) and tied & placed at curb.

RECYCLING ST. CLAIR TOWNSHIP 2014

Please ensure that materials are placed at the curb by 7:00 AM. The Township now offers Single stream (also known as "fully commingled" or "single-sort") recycling. Single stream refers to a system in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a collection truck, instead of being sorted by the resident into separate commodities (newpaper, paperboard, corrugated fiberboard, plastic, glass, etc.) and handled separately throughout the collection process.

In single stream, both the collection and processing systems are designed to handle this fully commingled mixture of recyclables, with materials being separated for reuse at a materials recovery facility.

The use of a blue box is the most efficient way to assist in the collection of recycling materials. Blue Boxes are

Leaper Farm among locations showcased on Doors Open Lambton County tour

When the *Doors Open Lambton County* tour takes place on June 21 and 22, the fascinating farm of Gord and Barb Leaper will be among the St. Clair Township sites showcased. Located at 2566 Moore Line east of the intersection of Moore Line and Brigden Road, the farm has undergone many changes and additions during its lengthy existence.

The little house at the front of the property was moved from Maxwell Street in Sarnia in March of 1956 and cost a fortune - \$1,500 to be exact. It currently serves as the Leaper's home. The blue farm home originally located 1/4 mile east of the farm burned to the ground in 1941.

In 1970, the Leapers bought the former Imperial Oil gun range clubhouse and moved it from the McGregor Side Road in Sarnia. It was restored and is now the Texaco gas station and the gas pumps have been restored. The couple occasionally holds drive-in movies on a screen in front of the station.

The red horse barn was originally the Birkhall cheese factory. It was moved onto the property and converted to a stable. The windmill was moved from Courtright Line in 1995 as a wedding present from Barb to Gord. It was painted to match the one they had on the farm. Inside the buildings, there are many other sights to enjoy, including:

- Stools from the dairy bar in Brigden.
- The marble ice cream parlour from a barber shop on Christina Street in Sarnia. The Leapers saved if when the entire block it was located on was being demolished.
- Original enamel signs.
- The original enamel and neon sign from the Dairy Queen on

Colborne Road in Sarnia.

- Petroliana such as original gas signs.
- ♦ An auto collection including a 1931 Auburn once owned by the Lawrence family of Sarnia (Lawrence House Centre for the Arts is on the Open Doors tour as well.)
- ♦ Collection of three tractors originally used on the Leaper farm.
- Current restoration of a 1936 Ford convertible is located in the red shed.

This is just a sample of the sights and artifacts to be found at the Leaper Farm and it's a great example of the fun and informative time you'll have on *Open Doors Lambton County* tour, June 21 and 22.




