Artifacts from sunken freighter REGINA donated to Sombra Museum

When the Great Storm of 1913 howled through the Great Lakes on Nov. 8 to 10 that year, many ships and the lives of those who manned them were lost.

In 1986/7, one of those ships, the Canadian package freighter, *Regina*, was explored by commercial diver Wayne Brusate under a permit from the Michigan Department of State. Ten boxes of artefacts recovered from the vessel, which still rests at the bottom of Lake Huron, were donated to the Great Lakes Maritime Institute (GLMI).

The Sombra Museum recently received a number of these artefacts through the GLMI educational outreach program to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Great Storm of 1913 and in memory of the sailors who were lost on Lake Huron during the storm. The Sombra Museum was one of 10 historical facilities to receive a share of these fascinating items, which will be displayed in the Maritime history room.

Meeting reveals hazards of pedestrian crossing on Lyndoch Street at Beckwith

A group of about 30 people were on hand at the June 16 meeting of council to discuss concerns about the pedestrian crossing on Lyndoch Street at Beckwith. In addition, letters of concern, as well as a petition of support signed by about 50 people, were submitted to council.

The crossing is used by many seniors who say they have no confidence that cars will stop at the crosswalk. Even vehicles that stop are often passed on the right-hand side by other motorists who are impatient to proceed. This creates a dangerous situation because the motorist may not see a pedestrian emerge from in front of the stopped vehicle and the pedestrian may not see the vehicle illegally passing on the right.

The group pointed out that the problem has been going on for some time although Mayor Arnold pointed out it has never been brought before council for action. Four recommendations were submitted to council for its consideration. They include: 1. The installation of a "Stop For Pedestrians" tab sign above the crosswalk. 2. The installation of a red flashing light where the amber lights are currently in service. The rationale for this change is that amber lights usually mean "proceed with caution". 3. The installation of a pedestrian "Walk/Don't Walk" signal that visually instructs pedestrians when it is safe to cross. 4. Installation of curb extensions on the north and south side of Lyndoch Street to prevent passing on the right and to reduce the distance that mobility-limited pedestrians must cover.

Mayor Arnold noted that when the crosswalk was put into service, there was supposed to be an audible alarm that would sound when it was safe to cross, but Corunna Community Policing Committee (CCPC) Chair Shaun Antle said the alarm was not functioning. At the conclusion of the group's presentation, councillors discussed the situation in more detail to get a sense of what measures might be taken to address the hazardous situation.

The cost of installing a recognizable stoplight is one measure that municipal staff will be investigating. In addition, Matt Deline, Director of Public Works, Operations and Engineering, has been instructed to investigate appropriate measures the can be taken to resolve the concerns of those who use the crosswalk.

the OPP to determine the severity of the problem and to continue to develop a strategy to monitor the crosswalk to see how frequently dangerous situations arise.

Reports from municipal staff are expected to be prepared and ready for presentation at the next meeting of council on July 14. The group was invited to attend the meeting to find out the contents of those reports.

Our intention is to help St. Clair Township residents gain a sense of what the prospective candidates stand for and their expectations for their term in office if they are elected.

<u>Candidates registered to date</u> <u>include:</u> Steve Arnold (Mayor); Darrell Randell (Councillor); Peter Gilliland (Deputy Mayor); Steve Miller (Councillor - Ward 2); Tracy Kingston (Councillor -Ward 1); Jeff Agar (Councillor -Ward 1); Carol Bryden (Trustee -St. Clair Catholic District School Board).

Candidate Statements

Incumbent trustee Carol Bryden will run again for that position within the St. Clair Catholic District School Board. Mrs. Bryden believes the biggest challenge facing the board this term will be funding and efficiency. "While we expect to pass a balanced budget for 2014/15, there are some real challenges facing us, particularly in special education and in transportation. Our special education needs are growing and providing our students with services they require with the existing funding model will be challenging. As well, we are currently working with our transportation providers to work out more efficient transportation routes for some of our country students coming into the city for high school. In all areas of operations, we will need to focus on responsibility and efficiency.

Mrs. Bryden has over 35 years of experience in education, both in the classroom and as part of administration. She has also been the chair of the board for the past four years. She has seen education from the perspective of a parent, educator and trustee, and she says this gives her a strong belief in the value of Catholic education. "Over the last several years, the board has worked to downsize costs in administration and we will continue to look for efficiencies wherever we can.

During the next four years, we will be implementing our renewed strategic plan. That will focus on strengthening the faith experience in the schools for both students and staff, committing to a continued excellence in academic achievement and enhancing communications with our parents and the community. We hope to bring strong professional development opportunities to our teachers to complement their skills in the classroom."

St. Clair Township Yard Waste/Brush Collection



The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas, in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

YARD WASTE is collected separately from regular waste on a weekly basis in urbanized areas of the Township (collections begin at 7 a.m.). Yard waste from the balance of the township is collected with the regular waste collection.

COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Collection will be on Wednesday and Friday, each week, depending on the service area.

Wednesday: * Corunna (Including Froomfield area)

*St. Clair Parkway (north of Emily Street, Mooretown)

Friday: * Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte Leeland Gardens

*St. Clair Parkway (south of Emily Street in Mooretown)

Spring yard waste collection has been completed.

During the months of July through September, yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection, subject to the six item limit.

The fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, Oct. 22 and Friday, Oct. 24 and will continue until Wednesday, Nov. 26 and Friday, Nov. 28.

Please note: Fall yard waste collection dates posted in the Township calendar should be the same as above.

Yard waste includes: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs, (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil. Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs

with root ball attached are not permitted. (For Brush collection, see below.)

Yard waste placed at the side of the road for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bag, paper bags, open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris.

The term "open containers" DOES NOT include: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23 kg/50 lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.

Brush collection:

Small brush bundles will be collected again on Oct. 24 with the following guidelines: 4' max. length, 1" max. diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled) and tied and placed at the curb.

Blue Box items include: newspaper; fibre or paper products **except** carbon paper; clear or colour glass **except** light bulbs, mirrors, dishes, ceramics, sheet glass, and broken glass; metal and aluminum cans **except** aluminum foil, metal pots, disposable cooking tins, coat hangars, oil filers, sheet metal, and toys; plastics except plastic bags, toys, containers with no markings on the bottom, no oil containers (cooking or motor); cardboard or boxboard except boxes containing food eg. Pizza box with toppings stuck to lid.

Shell facility notifies community of upcoming dock safeguarding program

The Shell Sarnia Manufacturing Centre north of Corunna has notified council that a two-phase dock safeguarding project will begin in late June or early July of this year.

The company plans to modify existing piping and steel walkways, and add lighting, all of which are associated with the dock facility located just south of LaSalle Line adjacent to the St. Clair Parkway. Phase One will take about three months and is not expected to require any excavation on the west side of the parkway.

Phase Two is be expected to begin in November. It will include additional piping modifications and the conversion of existing manually operated Marine Loading Arms on the north dock to hydraulically operated ones. There will be no work on the west side of the Parkway. This phase is expected to be completed by May 2015.

Work will be limited to weekdays between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., and traffic and noise will be monitored during the course of activities.

Shell has submitted a permit application to the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority due to the proximity of the work to the shoreline. The MNR will also be notified. July 2014

Living with Diabetes

This is a two-hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes.

The session is led by a Diabetes Educator. This session will be held on Tuesday, July 8 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Diabetes Healthy Eating and Physical Activity

This is a two-hour session for people who have already attended the *Living with Diabetes* class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet.

We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level.

The session, led by a Registered Dietitian, will be held on Tuesday, July 15 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Pre-Diabetes class

If you have fasting blood glucose levels of 6.1 to 6.9 mmol/L or A1C of 6.0 to 6.4% and/or twohour PG in 75 OGTT (mmol/L) 7.8 to 11.0 (IGT), this two-hour program is for you. It is taught by a Registered Dietitian and a Registered Nurse, and it will: improve the participant's knowledge of prediabetes and diabetes; help participants understand the risk factors for diabetes; and encourage goals to prevent/delay the onset of Type 2 diabetes.

Quit Smoking Workshop

Fire Chief Anderson cautions against open burning without permit

Are you planning to do any open burning this year? Be sure to obey the regulations that St. Clair Township has in place to prevent damaging fires.

St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walter Anderson has issued the following information that you should know before lighting that fire.

Open burning is regulated under the Fire Protection and Prevention Act as well as a St. Clair Township bylaw.

All fires, including campfires, must not pose a danger to anyone. This includes the smoke that interferes with a neighbour's enjoyment of their property or roadways.

Permits are required for all open burning, with the exception of small campfires.

Permit requirements include:

- Fire must be of manageable size.
- It must be supervised at all times.
- Burning can only take place between 8 a.m. and 6

p.m.

- It must be done in favourable weather conditions. (eg. No high winds)
- The fire chief must be notified.
- Neighbours must be notified.
- The fire must be extinguished if neighbours complain.
- Contraventions to these requirements terminate the permit.
- Only clean wood can be burned.
- The permit holder is solely liable of any and all dangers resulting from the burning.

Penalties vary from a fee for extinguishing the fire to charges under the Provincial Offences Act.

Burn permits are available free of charge from the Fire Administration Office located at 392 Lyndoch Street in Corunna. For more information call 519-481-0111.
