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Corunna Legion named for first Moore Township casualty of WWII



During the New Year's Day levee at the Royal Canadian Legion Corunna Branch 447 hall, a special photo album provided a poignant glimpse into the life of WO2 Leslie G. Sutherland, a Moore Township resident who joined the Canadian Air Force in 1941 to fight overseas during World War II.

His distinction lies not only with his service to his country, but with the terrible sacrifice he made while serving. Leslie G. Sutherland, for whom the Corunna branch is named, was the first known serviceman from Moore Township to be killed in battle.

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Summer construction on bridge project

A source of concern for council, and of frustration for motorists, will be addressed this summer. The project to replace the Stanley Line bridge, which has been out of service for several years to ensure the safety of those who use the bridge, has finally been granted the permissions that were necessary to allow the project to proceed.

Mayor Steve Arnold says the township had to wait for government and environmental inquiries and permissions to be resolved before the project could go ahead. "We have been working on this project for a number of years with both the Ministry of Natural Resources and the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, as well as the Ministry of Fisheries and Oceans," he said.

With the necessary investigations and documents in hand, council has been able to allocate funding for the project as part of this year's budget.

Matt Deline, St. Clair Township Director of Public Works, says the bridge project has presented challenges that are now resolved. "The Township has been committed to this replacement and has been working through the necessary approvals since the closure," he said. "The financial commitment for the replacement has been tentatively approved in the 2015 Draft Capital Budget. It is anticipated that construction will take place this summer."

Proposed development discussed at public meeting

A rezoning amendment discussed at the Jan. 19 meeting of council will allow for the development of land north of Bunker Avenue (No Frills store) south of Corunna. The zoning amendment from "highway commercial" to "residential" will allow for the development of a residential cluster of dwelling units that will accommodate seniors.

The public meeting revealed that the community is generally in favour of the development, which calls for a four-storey, 132 unit building as its first phase. The second phase will see the construction of 15 one-storey buildings, each containing four bungalow units.

Senior Planner Barry Uitvlugt told the group that the subject lands fall within the "Urban Centre" designation. In summary, he said the amendment to the Official Plan and to the Comprehensive Zoning By-law has planning merit.

The meeting was attended by Peter Gregor, Director of Development for the project developer, Nautical Lands Group. Mr. Gregor told the meeting his company currently has many seniors developments in Ontario communities, including Alliston, Tilsonburg, Paris, Goderich, and Picton. The Corunna facility will be the second to use a spacious enhanced design which incorporates a medical component and other added features. Unlike many seniors developments, Mr. Gregor says that in addition to suites and kitchenette units, the phase one Corunna facility will offer one- and two-bedroom apartments geared to the active older adult who doesn't necessarily require assistance.

The overall reception to the project was positive. Several concerns regarding noise and the project's proximity to the railway tracks were voiced. However, Mr. Gregor and council pointed

Moore Museum volunteer receives cultural heritage award

Moore Museum volunteer Dave Taylor was recently honoured for his outstanding contributions to the museum and for his demonstrated commitment to the preservation and promotion of built and natural heritage.

At the Jan. 5 meeting of St. Clair Township Council, Mr. Taylor was presented with an Ontario Heritage Trust *Heritage Community Recognition Program* cultural heritage award by Mayor Steve Arnold.


Since Nov. 2009, Mr. Taylor has served on the Moore Museum Advisory Committee. The following spring, he joined the museum's volunteer crew, affectionately known as The Tuesday Group. This group of about 10 volunteers assembles at the museum every Tuesday throughout the year to carry out large projects such as the construction of buildings and the ongoing maintenance of the museum's 13 existing buildings. Over the past five years, Mr. Taylor has helped to build the early twentieth century-style general store building, which provides an exhibit space for a large collection of artifacts. He has also helped on other projects such as: the insulation and drywalling of a new exhibit area; the construction of a storage shed; and a wide range of building maintenance and painting projects. He also assists with the museum's programming, helping with tour groups and special events.

Maple Leaf Forever!

"The Maple Leaf / Our Emblem Dear, / The Maple Leaf Forever! / God save our Queen and heaven bless, / The Maple Leaf Forever."

- Alexander Muir, 1867

It may not be politically correct now and you may be showing your age if you admit to singing it at school assemblies, but the pride and the patriotism inspired by the chorus to *The Maple Leaf Forever* is a fitting way to wish Happy Birthday to our iconic and immediately recognizable national flag.

Our red-and-white maple leaf flag has presided over some of the most noble, as well as some of the most heart-breaking, events our country has ever witnessed. Its genesis was controversial but its legacy thus far has been one that millions have taken solace from during times of emergency and conflict, and millions more have cheered for during times of achievement and victory.

On Feb. 14, 50 years will have passed since Canada officially adopted the

red maple leaf as its national flag. Today, it is one of the most recognized and respected flags and Canadian symbols in the world - a tremendous source of pride, identity and national unity.

Until it was adopted, the Red Ensign had been Canada's unofficial flag. It represented our British heritage incorporating a unique crest to represent the Canadian identity. But many Canadians felt the Ensign was not truly representative of Canada's heritage and cultural identity. The rationale that Prime Minister Lester Pearson used to justify a new design was that a new flag was necessary to keep Quebec's separatist aspirations at bay. The presence of the British Ensign on the existing flag was also problematic for some foreign countries that did not have an amicable relationship with England.

The new flag was chosen from amongst hundreds of submitted designs, most of which featured a maple leaf somewhere in the design. The winning design was developed by George Stanley, a Canadian civil servant and history professor. It was selected by a House of Commons committee and presented to the house for consideration, passing by a vote of 163 to 78.

Moore Museum volunteers busy in 2014

Shaw Exhibition Hall has been upgraded and the toyshop exhibit has been expanded. In 2015, the museum will continue to welcome new volunteers. Marg Emery, 1st Vice-president of the Leslie B. Sutherland Branch 447 Legion, assembled the book as a labour of love after one of WO2 Sutherland's relatives donated a box full of photos and other items.

While compiling the book, Marg says she realized there was no visible acknowledgment of WO2 Sutherland's connection to the branch and she took steps to correct that oversight. She had a commemorative plaque made to hang in the Legion hall. It bears a photo of WO2 Sutherland standing in front of his WWII fighter plane along with a dedication. The plaque reads: Leslie G. Sutherland was the first known "killed in action" serviceman from Moore Township during WWII. (He was affiliated with the)RCAF London, Ontario base. He was born Nov. 26, 1918, enlisted March 13, 1941, and was killed in action May 24, 1943. See plaque at left.

Reminder: Previous service in the Canadian military is not required to become a member of the Royal Canadian Legion. All that is required is a desire to meet new friends and to make a positive difference in the community.


Smoking prohibitions expanded

As of Jan. 1, 2015, county smoking prohibitions have been

expanded to include: smoking on bar and restaurant patios; smoking within 20 metres of playgrounds, and public sport fields and surfaces such as soccer pitches, outdoor rinks, splash pads, playground equipment; and selling tobacco on university and college campuses. These prohibitions have been added to reduce second-hand smoke exposure and to make it more difficult for young people to buy tobacco.

Stay active but be seen after dark

It's important to stay active during the winter months, but when enjoying outdoor activities, be sure that you are visible to motorists. Cyclists and pedestrians who wear dark clothing are virtually invisible to oncoming traffic. Statistics from 2010 revealed that 60 per cent of pedestrians who were killed at night or during dim light conditions were not seen by the drivers who hit them. Lambton Public Health advises that fluorescent colours like yellow, orange, and red, as well as reflective clothing, be worn to improve visibility.

Living with Diabetes

This is a two-hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. The session is led by a diabetes educator. A session will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 10 from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Diabetes Healthy Eating and Physical Activity

This is a two-hour session for people who have already attended the *Living with Diabetes* class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session is led by a registered dietitian. A session will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 17 from 1:30 to 3:30

p.m.

Quit Smoking workshop

A two-hour session for people who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our nurse educators. Session is set for Friday, Feb. 20 from 10 a.m. to noon.

Adult cooking classes

These hands-on classes will be facilitated by a Registered Dietitian. They will help you build familiarity with kitchen tools and ingredients that support a balanced diet. At **St. Andrew's Church, Corunna**, on Wednesday, Feb. 4 from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., learn about *Superfoods*. And on Wednesday, March 4 from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., it's *Meatless Mondays*.
