### Regional Optimist Club oratorical winners head for provincials

The Courtright Community Centre was the scene of the Optimist Club Regional Oratorical Contest on April 11, with 16 talented young speakers vying for a chance to go on to the District level.

Their challenge was to speak for four to five minutes on the topic of "How My Optimism Will Help Me Press On To The Greater Achievements Of The Future".

The Optimist Club of Moore's speaker, Saba Siddiqui, was one of the six speakers chosen to move on to the District level, where they competed for the chance to win one of two \$2,500 scholarships. The District results were unavailable at publication time. Judges Steve Inglis, Past Lieutenant Governor of Zone 6, and Optimist Club of Moore member, Dan Van Nice, an Optimist Club of Point Edward member and Scouting leader for over 52 years, as well as Bonnie Stevenson, journalist, author, and editor of the St. Clair Township Beacon, were given the difficult task of choosing the speakers who continued on to the District competition in Windsor on April 25.

In their closing remarks, the judges all agreed that the calibre of the speeches and the manner in which they were presented have improved remarkably from year to year. Some of the speakers exhibited a stage presence that is usually found in seasoned broadcasting veterans while others brought a sense of theatricality to their presentation; all 16 brought their individual ideas, opinions, and enthusiasm to the task.

The Moore Optimist Club has been holding its oratorical competition for over 40 years with students under the age of 19 (who have not yet graduated from secondary school or the equivalent) speaking on an assigned topic.

Tracy Kingston, Current Oratorical Chair for the Moore Optimist Club, says an enthusiastic person is being sought to take over her duty. "We need new ideas on how to attract more young people to speak out about their views and goals," she said.

### Attention: Ratepayers of the Marsh Creek Drain

Due to the many changes in the watershed since 1950 (Corunna expansion, industrial lands, etc.), a new assessment schedule was required to allow for future maintenance work on the Marsh Creek Drain. This drain consists of an "open ditch" with its upper end located between Corunna and the CN Railway. The drain flows northerly, crossing Hill Street and then crossing farmland to LaSalle Line. The drain then crosses LaSalle Line to outlet into a "natural watercourse" within the Aamjiwnaang First Nations Reserve.

The St. Clair Township Council appointed Spriet Associates to prepare a reassessment report. This report is now complete and can be found on the township Website at: twp.stclair.on.ca



### New book documents local WWI servicemen

World War I was fought far away, but the toll it exacted in human life and suffering was profoundly felt here in what was then Moore and Sombra Townships. In recognition of the Great War's centenary year, Heritage St. Clair has published a book entitled, "St. Clair Allies In Arms: The Men of Sombra and Moore in World War I, 1914-1918". The book honours the memory of the men from Moore and Sombra Townships who served, often under unfathomably horrific conditions. The book is the

result of over two years of researching local family connections, scouring archives for further information, writing and creating.

The book is sponsored by St. Clair Township Council, the Lambton County Creative Fund, Moore Optimists, Sombra Optimists, and Corunna United Church Seniors.

Heritage St. Clair Chair Dave Pattenden says 38 copies of the book have already been distributed to township schools, secondary schools, public libraries in the township, Legions, and the Lambton

## TOWNSHIP OF ST. CLAIR YARD WASTE/BRUSH COLLECTION 2015

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas, in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

"Yard Waste" is collected separately from regular waste, on a weekly basis, in urbanized areas of the Township (collection begins at 7:00 AM). Yard waste from the balance of the Township is collected with the regular waste collection.

#### **COLLECTION SCHEDULE:**

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday, each week, depending on the service area.


Wednesday: Corunna (including Froomfield area)

· St. Clair Parkway (North of Emily St., Mooretown)

Friday: Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

· Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Gardens

· St. Clair Parkway (South of Emily St., Mooretown)



During the months of July through September yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection, subject to the 6 item limit.

Fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, October 21st and Friday, October 23rd, and will continue until Wednesday, November 25th and Friday, November 27th.

#### WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs, (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached are not permitted. (Brush Collection see below)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. Open containers DOES NOT INCLUDE: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg / 50lb and yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.

#### **BRUSH COLLECTION:**


Small Brush Bundles will also be collected on May 22nd, June 12th, and October 23rd with the following guidelines: 4' maximum length, 1" maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled) and tied & placed at curb.



he says Gail Moran researched relentlessly on Ancestry.com to discover many names, and she worked hard to set the information and pictures into the book template. "The goal of the committee was to publish the work within the time frame of the centenary to fit with many memorials that were planned over the course of 2014 to 2018," said Mr. Anderson.

Research revealed that close to 500 local men served in WWI and 40 were killed in action or as a result of their war-related injuries. Men included in the book were either born in Moore or Sombra Township, or lived here at some point in their lives.

Heritage St. Clair plans to publish a paperback edition of the book that will be available for purchase.

If the team is unable to accommodate you for the day of your choice, you will be put on a waiting list for future sessions.

### ~Temporary lab relocation required~

From May 4 to late June, the lab will be temporarily relocated to Thompson Gardens at 198 Beckwith Street in Corunna while extensive internal renovations are made to the Cameron Street facility. The lab will operate Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The renovations are possible thanks to a generous donation from Pembina.

### **Living with Diabetes**

This is a two-hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. The session is led by a diabetes educator.

A session will be held Tuesday, May 5 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

### Diabetes Healthy Eating and Physical Activity

This is a two-hour session for people who have already attended the *Living with Diabetes* class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session is led by a Registered Dietitian.

A session will be held on Monday, May 11 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

#### Quit Smoking workshop

A two-hour session for people who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our nurse educators.

The next session is set for Friday, May 29 from 10 a.m. to Noon.

#### Healthy Weights by Healthy Means

These hands-on classes will be facilitated by a Registered Dietitian. They will help you build familiarity with kitchen tools and ingredients that support a balanced diet.

### **Boosting Balance and Bone Health**





### Text with 9-1-1 made available to local residents

Text with 9-1-1 (T9-1-1) was slated to be available across Lambton County beginning on April 15. Cell phone users whose phones have the capability to send and receive text messages, and are compatible with the T9-1-1 program, must register for the service on their cell phone provider's Web-

In general, text messages send to the digits 9-1-1 do not reach emergency services. Users registered with the T9-1-1 program can verify their service through their respective cell phone providers.

#### County seeking vintage film

Based on the popularity of the recent screening of film footage showing Alvinston in the 1940s, the Lambton County Archives is seeking other vintage footage to be converted to digital format so that a copy can be housed in the Archives. Any film loaned to the Archives for digitization will be screened by the Archivist and a digital copy of suitable footage will be kept on file. Archivist Dana Thorne says, "Not only does old film footage offer unique insight into the past, it is also important to create digital copies of this material before the fragile film becomes unviewable."
