TOWNSHIP OF ST. CLAIR FALL YARD WASTE/BRUSH COLLECTION 2015

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas, in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

"Yard Waste" is collected separately from regular waste, on a weekly basis, in urbanized areas of the Township (collection begins at 7:00 AM). Yard waste from the balance of the Township is collected with the regular waste collection.

COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday, each week, depending on the service area. 'Corunna (including Froomfield area)

Wednesday:

· St. Clair Parkway (North of Emily St., Mooretown)

Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

Friday:

· Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Gardens

· St. Clair Parkway (South of Emily St., Mooretown)

Fall yard waste collection will continue until Wednesday, November 25th and Friday, November 27th. Collection is subject to the 6 item limit.

WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs, (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached are not permitted. (Brush Collection see below)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. Open containers DOES NOT INCLUDE: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg / 50lb and yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.

Mosaic Lambton Project will honour Canada's 150th

The Lambton Mosaic Project (LMP) is now underway in Lambton County. A six-member Need To Read committee, established through Organization For Literacy In Lambton, has developed this as a Confederation project to honour Canada's upcoming 150th anniversary on July 1, 2017. All residents of the 14 communities within Lambton County (11 Municipalities and 3 First Nations Communities) will be encouraged to participate in this project. The objective will be to create a mosaic

map of Lambton County.

The map will show all of the Municipalities and Communities. It will display creations of artistic and literary contributions showing what people love best about their local communities in a creative form that is most comfortable for them; drawings, paintings, photos, poems, crafts, and short stories will be among the creations will be included. It is hoped that the project will inspire and motivate people to better integrate, communicate, and promote cultural arts, literary arts, and education. The mosaic will offer contributors exposure for their completed works, which will be showcased on a special Website. An unveiling event will be held in 2017 to display the Lambton Mosaic Project, recognizing the community partners and contributors, while at the same time, honouring the 150th anniversary of Confederation.

The Organization For Literacy In Lambton has been awarded a 2014 grant from the Lambton County Creative Fund (LCCF) to get the project underway and will be seeking further funding from future LCCF intakes and donations. 



Courtright resident Stewart James left magical legacy

Heritage St. Clair Chair David Pattenden attended St. Clair Township Council on Oct. 5 to propose the installation of a plaque honouring the life and legacy of Stewart James. With Council's approval, the plaque is being prepared and will be located in the Courtright waterfront park.

If you've lived in the Courtright area for any length of time, you will probably know about Stewart James. For those who are unfamiliar with the name, Mr. James was born in 1908 in a house called *Aberystwyth*.

At the age of seven, he learned how to do the Knot of Enchantment from a Sunday School newspaper and his life-long fascination with magic began. He went on to become renowned among his magician peers for the many magic effects he created. He even operated a store in Courtright where magicians could buy special apparatus they could use in their magic performances. His technical developments in magic fill dozens of books, including one huge volume which contains about 1,500 magical inventions in its 1,025 pages. Its contents are trade secrets only available to members of the International Brotherhood of Magicians. Although Mr. James toured all throughout Canada and the U.S. as a young man, he eventually returned to Courtright to care for his aging mother, but he continued to develop new magic tricks while delivering mail for Canada Post until his death in 1996. A small collection of his magic books and items he used in his tricks is currently on display at the Moore Museum.

Flu shots ready

Flu shots are now available at 30 Lambton pharmacies, from health care providers, at 10 community clinics; and at Lambton Public Health, 160 Exmouth Street in Sarnia, Individuals at high risk of influenza complications are urged to get their flu shot as soon as possible. This group includes: adults 65 and over; infants and children six months to under five years of age; individuals with a chronic health condition; healthy pregnant women; individuals of any age who reside in long-term care or other chronic care facilities; and Aboriginal people. Statistics from the 2014-2015 flu season indicate there were 63 lab confirmed cases of influenza and three flu-related deaths recorded in Lambton. "Getting the flu shot is the safest way to prevent spread of the flu and the best way to protect your loved ones," said Erin Courtney, Supervisor with Lambton Public Health. "In Canada, the flu kills more people than any other communicable disease."
