Municipal Notes

New streetlights to yield significant savings

An environmentally-friendly cost-saving measure is underway in St. Clair Township. This measure, recently discussed at the Nov. 2 meeting of council, will see the replacement of all of the township's streetlights. It is expected to result in \$124,000 in savings on the township's electricity bill.

"We will be replacing approximately 1,400 light fixtures with LED units," said Mayor Steve Arnold. "We will be using half of the annual savings to pay for the project (and) the balance will be used to offset taxes."

Director of Public Works Matt Deline says an order has been placed with the manufacturer/supplier and the new LED fixtures should arrive soon. The contractor is due to begin the conversion shortly after delivery. The installation will depend on the weather but it is hoped that 40 to 50 per cent of the lights will be in place by the end of the year. He notes that about 40 decorative light standards/ fixtures in the downtown Corunna area are not part of this LED conversion plan.

The project, has been carefully studied and Mayor Arnold says "It's been a worthwhile journey."

Winter parking by-law in effect

The Winter overnight parking by-law is now in effect until April. Motorists are advised that it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This allows snow plow crews to do their jobs without having to avoid parked cars. Property owners are also reminded that it is against

the law to shovel snow out into public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless automobile collisions.





The Lambton Mosaic Project (LMP) is now underway in Lambton County. A six-member Need To Read committee, established through Organization For Literacy In Lambton, has developed this as a Confederation project to honour Canada's upcoming 150th anniversary on July 1, 2017. All residents of the 14 communities within Lambton County (11 Municipalities and 3 First Nations Communities) will be encouraged to participate in this project. The objective will be to create a mosaic map of Lambton County.

The map will show all of the Municipalities and Communities. It will display creations of artistic and literary contributions showing what people love best about their local communities in a creative form that is most comfortable for them; drawings, paintings, photos, poems, crafts, and short stories will be among the creations will be included. It is hoped that the project will inspire and motivate people to better integrate, communicate, and promote cultural arts, literary arts, and education. The mosaic will offer contributors exposure for their completed works, which will be showcased on a special Website. An unveiling event will be held in 2017 to display the Lambton Mosaic Project, recognizing the community partners and contributors, while at the same time, honouring the 150th anniversary of Confederation.

CKNX Barn Dance Show sets toes tappin' in Brigden



The early days of radio came alive in Brigden on Nov. 15 in the form of the CKNX Bam Dance Show. The Barn Dance evolved from a live radio show at CKNX in Wingham and kept listeners in southwestern Ontario entertained for over 25 years. The show eventually became a traveling act, broadcasting from cities and towns in the area. It is backed by the Barn Dance Historical Society and is Canada's largest traveling barn dance show.



New wall mural conveys the power and peril of the Q105 in battle



As you turn off the St. Clair Parkway onto Smith Street in Sombra, there is a large work of art waiting for you on the north side at the Sombra Museum. A new wall mural, a conceptual work by artist Danny Alexander, drives home the dangerous and often violent wartime environment that was faced by the Samia-built Q105 Fairmile class motor launch. The Q105 was fitted as a sub chaser charged with patrolling the Atlantic on guard for Nazi submarines. In more peaceful times, it took passengers cruising along the St. Clair River under the name Duc d'Orleans. Alexander's use of reds, dark burgundy, greys and whites as well as the turbulence of his sea scape, create a narrative that speaks to the peril faced by the relatively small craft and of the courage shown by those who sailed aboard her. The Sombra Museum Cultural Centre on the south side of the street features a marine room where visitors can view and get the feel of the actual wheel that guided the ship on its many patrols. Several other artifacts of the ship are also on display. Plaque to commemorate 1837/8 Rebellion skirmishes in St. Clair Township

Heritage St. Clair recently approached St. Clair Township proposing the installation of an educational plaque to be installed in Courtright Park along the shoreline. This would be the second plaque, with the first commemorating the incredible achievements of Courtright native and inventor of approximately 1,500 magic effects and techniques, Stewart James.

The second plaque will recognize the 1837/1838 Rebellion skirmishes that took place in what is now St. Clair Township. The rebellion was a series of conflicts between one group opposed to British rule versus another group loyal to Britain. Many local citizens joined the fight to oppose the rebels who, with the support of the U.S., staged river crossings in the areas now known as Port Lambton and Sombra. The conflict ultimately led to the Act of Union, which joined Upper and Lower Canada, forming the Province of Canada in 1841. (For those who don't already know, Corunna was the official capital of Canada for one day around this time.) The conflict is recognized in many other areas of the province and Heritage St. Clair believes St. Clair Township should be proud of its part in the rebellion and the ultimate formation of Canada.

The value of placing informative signs along the St. Clair River shoreline has caught on in Michigan, where interpretive signs are being developed for several shoreline locations in Port Huron.

Flu shots ready

Flu shots are available at 30 Lambton pharmacies, from health care providers, at 10 community clinics; and at Lambton Public Health, 160 Exmouth Street in Sarnia. Individuals at high risk of influenza complications are urged to get their flu shot as soon as possible. This group includes: adults 65 and over; infants and children six months to under five years of age; individuals with a chronic health condition; healthy pregnant women; individuals of any age who reside in long-term care or other chronic care facilities; and Abo-

riginal people. Statistics from the 2014-2015 flu season indicate there were 63 lab confirmed cases of influenza and three flurelated deaths recorded in Lambton. "Getting the flu shot is the safest way to prevent spread of the flu and the best way to

protect your loved ones," said Erin Courtney, Supervisor with Lambton Public Health. "In Canada, the flu kills more people than any other communicable disease."
