Winter parking by-law in effect

The Winter overnight parking by-law is in effect until April. Motorists are advised that it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads <u>overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m.</u> This allows snow plow crews to do their jobs without having to avoid parked cars. Property owners are also reminded

that it is against the law to shovel snow out into public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless automobile collisions.


The fee will be \$5 for township residents and \$8 for non-residents. Applicants must apply in person and multiple licenses will not be issued.

Free smoking cessation classes/NRT

Free nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) to help smokers kick the habit will be offered, if indicated, as part of the Rapids Family Health Team smoking cessation education classes slated for Friday, Jan. 8 at 9 a.m. and Wednesday, Jan. 27 at 2 p.m. Those who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco are urged to attend these informative classes. The class includes a 1.5 hour guit smoking workshop where the discussion will cover strategies and methods for quitting, ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a guit plan and manage withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. After completing the workshop, participants schedule an individual appointment with a nurse educator to receive further support and information. Nicotine Replacement Therapy, if indicated, can be dispensed after enrollment in the STOP study. For more information about the STOP study, please visit www.stopstudy.ca

Living With Diabetes

Living With Diabetes is a two-hour session that pro-

vides a general overview of diabetes. The discussion will include some of the most common myths about diabetes, it will explain what "good control" is, and it will cover some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. The session will be held on Friday, Feb. 5 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Healthy Eating and Keeping Active

This two-hour session is for people who have already attended the Living With Diabetes class. The discussion will include the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, how to read food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session is slated for Friday, Feb. 12 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Diabetes Prevention

This is a 1.5 hour group session for those who: have been told they are at risk of getting diabetes; want to learn about ways to prevent diabetes; or want to learn about diabetes. The session is taught by a Registered Nurse and a Registered Dietitian who will discuss what diabetes is, risk factors for getting it, and how to decrease blood sugar levels through lifestyle changes. The session is slated for Friday, February 26 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Flu shots continue

Flu shots are available at 30 Lambton pharmacies, from health care providers, at 10 community clinics; and at Lambton Public Health, 160 Exmouth Street in Sarnia. Individuals at high risk of influenza complications are urged to get their flu shot as soon as possible. This group includes: adults 65 and over; infants and children six months to under five years of age; individuals with a chronic health condition; healthy pregnant women; individuals of any age who reside in long-

term care or other chronic care facilities; and Aboriginal people. Statistics from the 2014-2015 flu season indicate there were 63 lab confirmed cases of influenza and three flu-related deaths recorded in Lambton. "Getting the flu shot is the safest way to prevent spread of the flu and



the best way to protect your loved ones," said Erin Courtney, Supervisor with Lambton Public Health. "In Canada, the flu kills more people than any other communicable disease." 
Busyville is a curious name for a town, but once upon a time, it was a real place. Unfortunately, the only proof that the hamlet of Busyville ever existed can be found in the form of the school's sturdy cement block outhouse.

The hamlet in what used to be Sombra Township was a post office from 1911-1914. Located on lot 20 of concession 11, the place was named by a local school teacher.

Busyville is just one of several St. Clair Township hamlets that have faded from memory. Others, like Copleston and Kimball, were just post office locations. Some, like Waubuno and Ladysmith, survive in name only on road signs.

Other hamlets once located in St. Clair Township include: Baby's Point; Blecher; Charlemont; Avonry; Bickford; Duthill; Moore Centre; Osborne; Sykeston; Cromar; Thornyhurst; Colinville; Port Seckerton; Vye's Grove; Bradshaw; and West Becher.

Do you want to find out more about the history of St. Clair Township? The Sombra and Moore Museum archives are filled with documents, photos, and other material that bring the past alive for those who care to know more about their community's past.
