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ATV kids enjoy Emergency Preparedness Day



The 11th annual Emergency Preparedness Day display was held at the Clearwater Arena in Samia on May 6 with 1,300 students from Grades 5 through secondary school from 16 Lambton County schools, their teachers and chaperones, as well as about 700 visitors from the general, in attendance. The display was comprised of almost 100 displays by Samia and Lambton area police forces, fire departments, and EMS responders, as well as provincial and national agencies, utilities, military, marine, Lambton College, and industrial response organizations. The annual event is acknowledged as one of the largest in Ontario.

National Emergency Preparedness Week is held annually to encourage families to think about home preparedness and to assemble a 72-hour emergency supply kit containing enough water, food, and other necessities to be self-sufficient for three days following an emergency.

When households are adequately prepared for emergencies, emergency responders and municipal officials can focus on the most urgent issues posed by the crisis at hand. <u>Above</u>: Among those in attendance were students from Mme. At the Ontario Provincial Police display, the students climbed aboard one of the OPP quad ATVs to act out a mock rescue exercise. HYDRANT FLUSHING

St. Clair Township Residents

Public Works will be undertaking the annual flushing of fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township water distribution system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. until this fall. During this maintenance procedure, you may notice some water discolouration using your taps, flushing toilets, doing laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into your residence. We recommend that you run the cold water tap for a few minutes or until the discolouration disappears. If discolouration of the water continues after 10-15 minutes of normal use please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

St. Clair River Run raising township profile

The St. Clair River Run is fast becoming a recognized event within the running community. St. Clair River Run committee member Ben Hazzard led a deputation to council on May 16 to deliver the good news about the River Run's growing popularity within the avid running community as well as with the leisure running crowd. He noted that the number of participants registering for the run has grown from just 180 in 2010 to 900 in 2014 and continues to grow this year judging from registrations garnered by the beginning of May. Feedback from the 2015 race resulted in 98 per cent of the runners rating their overall experience as excellent or very good. There was also a 98 per cent rating from those who said they would recommend participation to others.

CF Industries is a major supporter of the race again this year; company representatives accompanied race organizers to council to donate a cheque for \$20,000 as part of the company's five-year commitment to the event. As the race thrives from year to year, race organizers are optimistic that the event will be able to contribute substantially to the on-going upkeep and maintenance of the trail. "Our goal is to (eventually) return the amount of this donation to the river trail (each year)," said Mr. Hazzard, who added that the ultimate goal of keeping the trail in good shape is to provide a place where St. Clair Township residents can pursue a healthy active lifestyle.

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16, and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$80.)

Support for LAVIII project honours Afghanistan veterans and casualties

Representatives from the 1st Hussars attended council on May 16 to receive a \$5,000 donation toward the installation of a new memorial which recognizes the service of Canadian forces during the Afghanistan conflict. The memorial will take the form of an LAVIII, a Kodiak 8-wheel light armoured vehicle, which will be installed in Veteran's Park behind the Sarnia library.

According to Ron Prior of the 1st Hussars Association, Samia is the first of 14 communities to receive one of the LAVIII vehicles and only 250 communities in Canada will be able to have one as they become available. He added the Samia memorial should be ready by September. It will be dedicated to the 40,000 service men and women who served in Afghanistan and to the 159 who lost their lives in service. Two special plaques will also be installed on the monument: the first will commemorate Pte. William Cushley of Port Lambton and Cpl. Brent Poland of Camlachie who lost their lives while serving in Afghanistan; the second will honour the members of the 1st Hussars who served there from 2001 to 2014. Mr. Prior noted that 30 per cent of the Canadian forces

that served in Afghanistan were members of the reserve.

Mayor Arnold expressed gratitude for the sacrifices made over the years by the 1st Hussars and the Canadian Armed

Hosting a community special event?

Read on...

Event organizers and food/beverage vendors are urged to contact Lambton Public Health (LPH) in advance of any event they have planned. LPH inspectors and tobacco enforcement officers will provide guidance to ensure compliance with food handling regulations and Smoke-Free Ontario Act regulations.

Lori Lucas, Health Protection supervisor at LPH says this information is crucial to the safe operation of public events. "Whether you're an event organizer or a food and/or beverage vendor, it's your responsibility to minimize the risks of food-borne illness and to ensure the event is Smoke-Free Ontario Act compliant."

Just download and complete the *Community Special Events* Package at <u>www.lambtonhealth.on.ca</u> The package includes all of the required forms for food service. These must be completed and returned to the LPH at least two weeks before the event takes place.

Household Hazardous Waste collection days

The County of Lambton, in conjunction with Clean Harbors Canada Inc., hosts several Household Hazardous Waste collection days each year. The events give Lambton County residents an opportunity to properly dispose of potentially dangerous waste from their homes and protect the environment at the same time. If hazardous products are thrown in with regular waste, they can injure sanitation workers and cause long-term environmental problems.

Materials accepted include: batteries, drain and oven cleaners, pesticides, rat poison, pharmaceuticals, cleaning fluids, pool chemicals, ammonia, bleach, aerosols, gasoline, paints, barbecue starter, oil, solvents, and propane cylinders.

Collection days at the Clean Harbors Canada facility at 4090 Telfer Road (just south of Petrolia Line) are slated for the following Saturdays from 9

a.m. to 2 p.m.: June 25; Sept. 24; and Oct. 29.

This service is intended for household hazardous waste ONLY.



Emergency notification flaws being addressed

Several flaws revealed during the recent Shell emergency are being addressed by emergency system officials. St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walt Anderson says the system's inconsistent performance was caused by several factors.

Chief Anderson summarized the difficulties posed by the event for *The Beacon*.

"On the day of the Shell event, the notification system was activated as a precaution," he said. "Air monitoring was under way but until we could confirm the source and what the readings were, we felt the safest option was to have residents in the south end of Corunna shelter in place."

"Unfortunately, not all of the sirens worked as anticipated. We had purchased a new component for Siren 11 (located near the Royal Canadian Legion hall) and that component did not work. So following the incident, it was replaced and tested, and it is working now."

"We knew that part of Siren 9 (located behind the Corunna fire station) was down because of a bad amplifier, which we had on order. We have received conflicting reports about that siren. It may have been working on the side where a good amplifier was still operating but it stopped working soon after. Feedback on our third siren, located in the Paddock Green area, indicated that it worked. A problem arose when people did what they were supposed to do when there is a 'shelter in place' warning they tuned in to the local radio station. However, the station was not broadcasting live at the time and because of a previous change in protocol, the station had not been notified."

"Official information was posted on the fire department's social media site as well, but the phone number for the CAER information line was incorrect. We apologize for this error."

Chief Anderson says the problems are being taken very seriously and an immediate response was undertaken. Repairs on Siren 9 was slated to be carried out as soon as the parts needed to upgrade the unit were received, and he described a number of other steps that are being taken to prevent a repeat of the event.

"Going forward, we encourage everyone to sign up for the myCNN Emergency Notifications. The township is investigating the options available in portable sirens to use if one of our main sirens is out of service and is also researching air monitoring equipment that our emergency services can utilize quickly, giving us the accurate information we need to make our decisions. We will also be providing more education on what materials are available and how they can be utilized to make sure everyone understands how they are notified and what to do in an emergency."

Chief Anderson explained the emergency protocol that is observed during an emergency event.

St. Clair Township is covered by three different emergency notification systems. The sirens system has been in place for some time and is tied into the emergency sirens located in Sarnia and Point Edward. They are activated by the Sarnia Police dispatch centre at the request of one of the three municipalities.

A few years ago, St. Clair Township, in conjunction with St. Clair County Emergency Management and Homeland Security, entered into an agreement that led to the use of the FM Alert devices. These devices receive a signal activated by authorized township staff and broadcasted through a transmitter located on a local radio transmission tower.

These devices are good but they depend on the radio signal reaching the device to activate it, and the device has to be with you or be checked when you return home. More recently, we began promoting and using the myCNN Notification System. The system utilizes White Page data, which means your name has to be in the phone book so that you will be on the list to receive a call. You can ask to be excluded from the list if you wish.

Residents can also register through the St. Clair Township Website at: stclairtownship.ca or the Community Awareness Emergency Response Website at: caer.ca . This way, you can choose by what method you would like to receive the messages and alerts: mobile phone, text message, email, home or work phone, or all of the above can be used.

County Council supports wildfire relief efforts Lambton County Council has agreed to support wildfire relief efforts currently underway in the Wood Buffalo region of Alberta with a \$100,000 donation to the Canadian Red Cross. The donation was made on behalf of all county municipalities. Funds are expected to be matched by the federal and Alberta governments. As the June Beacon goes to press, the wildfires are still burning and many more lives will be shattered by its effects. Living With Diabetes

This is a two-hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. The session is led by a Nurse Educator. Sessions will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Friday, June 10 and Friday, July 22.

Diabetes - Healthy Eating And Keeping Active

This is a two hour session for people who have already attended our Living With Diabetes class or who have had past education on the basics of diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase our physical activity level. The session will be led by a Registered Dietitian. Sessions will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Friday, June 17 and Friday, June 29.

A Guide To Diabetes Prevention

This is a 1.5 hour group session for those who want to learn about diabetes and how to prevent it, or for those who have been told they are at risk of getting diabetes. This session is led by a Registered Nurse and a Registered Dietitian. They will discuss what diabetes is, risk factors for getting diabetes, and how to decrease blood sugar levels through lifestyle changes. The program is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Sessions will be held on Friday, June 24 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and Wednesday, July 27 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Quit Smoking Workshop

This is a two hour session for those who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. The workshop is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our Nurse Educators. The next Quit Smoking sessions will be held on: Wednesday, June 8 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.; Wednesday, June 22 from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.; and Wednesday, July 27 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

Stress Management Workshop

Created by our registered Social Worker, this two-hour seminar, offered monthly, will provide you with information on how to effectively manage stress through: regulating the stress response; goal-setting; problem-solving; challenging unhelpful thinking; and communicating assertively. This seminar is open to

the public and <u>no physician referral is required</u>. The next roster of workshops will take place Fridays from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on: June 3; July 15; Aug. 12; Sept. 9; Oct. 7; and Dec. 2.

Anxiety Awareness

The Anxiety Awareness Therapy Group is an eight week program for adults 18 and over who are living with and managing anxiety in day-to-day life. The program is facilitated by Registered Social Workers. During the group sessions, participants will learn how to deal with their anxious thoughts, feelings, and behaviours by understanding their anxiety and how to manage their worry. Weekly session will focus on relaxation skills and stress reduction techniques. The group will cover the following topics: an overview of generalized anxiety; challenging negative and positive beliefs about worrying; developing strategies to challenge worries and accept uncertainty; problem solving and decision making; managing the anxious body, mind, and behaviour; exploring and practicing relaxation skills and stress reduction techniques; maintaining the gains and developing a selfmanagement plan. This group program began May 2 and is held on Mondays from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Lambton County Library has launched a new online catalogue designed to enhance the public's browsing and borrowing experience. The layout is more engaging, simple to use, and mobile friendly.

The catalogue, accessible through the library's Website at <u>www.lclibrary.ca</u> or directly at <u>my.lclibrary.ca</u>, features slide shows on its platform page of new items to the library and recently returned books.

When browsing the title of a book, CD, or DVD, users can immediately place a reservation or store it to a Reading List (formerly called Save List). The record details provide a photo of the cover, a summary, other titles in the series, and recommended reads as well as similar authors. Users can also share the item on social media.

Accessing account information is also easier for users to navigate. A new feature is the Loan History option which captures the users borrowing history for their reference. Patrons can also subscribe to a list of interest topics by material, genre, or subject, and then be emailed, on a monthly basis, when new items in these categories have been processed.

The Lambton County Library offers a variety of free materials and services to meet the leisure and informational needs of

Rabies control and prevention featured at recent Rural Game Protection Assoc. event

Rabies control and prevention took centre stage when the Lambton County Rural Game Protective Association held its annual meeting and banquet in May.

The guest speaker was Wildlife Researcher Sarah Fraser from the Ministry of Natural Resources who presented an overview of the methods used to control and prevent outbreaks of rabies in Ontario. The incidence of rabies within the province has been guiet since 2013 thanks to the trap, vaccinate, and release programs used along the St. Lawrence River and in the Niagara region, as well as the air drop program used in rural areas to distribute thousands of small baits containing the rabies vaccine. Rabies was thought to be virtually wiped out, but with the discovery of a racoon infected with the raccoon strain of the disease in the Hamilton area last December, a rejuvenated effort has been in force to identify, control and prevent further outbreaks.

Ms. Fraser pointed out that the border between Canada and the United States provides a natural buffer zone to keep infected animals out of the province, and those who manage to get across are usually transported while hidden aboard vehicles coming into the country. When the first raccoon was diagnosed, the MNR mobilized the rabies team it had all but disbanded and within weeks, over 220,000 vaccine baits had been dropped over the Hamilton area. Since the outbreak, the MNR has hired 14 more people to work with the team.

Pet owners concerned about their pets eating one of the baits should not worry. Ms. Fraser says the baits are harmless for animals, but a doctor should be consulted if humans come in contact with it.

There are three strains of the rabies virus - raccoon, fox, and skunk - that can occur in Ontario, says Ms. Fraser. However, the raccoon strain has been found in all of the 61 raccoons and 29 skunks that have been identified in Hamil-



ton and surrounding area since last December. Ms. Fraser says human contact with a living infected animal has been rare and that most of the animals were already dead when they were discovered. She also assured her audience that the treatment for people bitten by a rabid animal is not nearly as intensive and painful as it was years ago.

Several rabies vaccination clinics have been held in Lambton County this spring.

During the association's annual general meeting that preceded Ms. Fraser's presentation, it was decided that representatives from several local environmental and wildlife organizations would be asked to join the association's executive board. And a draw raised \$734 that was split three ways for donation to the Bluewater Centre for Raptor Rehabilitation, the Bluewater Anglers, and Heaven's Wildlife Rescue.

The Rural Game Protective Association was formed in 1949 to address the encroachment on local rural land by poachers from urban centers. It has since taken an interest in environmental issues that affect Lambton County.



St. Clair River Raids plaque unveiling recalls border clash

The peaceful border St. Clair Township now shares with Michigan hasn't always peaceful, and nothing illustrates this more clearly than what has come to be known as the St. Clair River Raids.

The raids were the result of a rebellion mounted by Canadians who objected to living under British rule. The original rebellion in 1837 was put down by British forces but some of the rebels were able to escape over the border into the U.S.

In 1838, the rebels were joined by American sympathizers and began calling themselves the Patriot Army. The group started making a nuisance of itself, mounting occasional raids into Canada at various border locations including at least three along the St. Clair River. The rebels notched up a total of 13 incursions that year while continuing their fight to achieve victory for their cause.

On the Canadian side of the border, the Moore Militia stood ready to meet invaders but didn't have a chance to that until June 28, 1838. The rebels crossed the river at Sombra aboard a sloop owned by Charles Bowerman with the goal of stealing guns, landed at Sombra, and made their way to the commissariat (the British depot where stocks of food and supplies were kept). They didn't find guns, but they ended up with eight barrels of flour, 15 bushels of oats, and a hostage, the commissariat's keeper, Captain McDonald. With another hostage, the local tanner Angus McDonald, in tow, the rebels hurried back to the sloop and were taken north to Palmer, now known as St. Clair, Michigan.

In response to the rebel raid, a deputy marshal from Michigan crossed the river from Palmer to Sutherland's Landing, located between Courtright and Mooretown. He met with the commander of the Moore Militia and assured him that he would do what he could to preserve the peace. He added that an American steam ship, the *General Gratiot*, was on its way from Detroit and would be sent in pursuit of the raiders.

The commander of the Moore Militia was not willing to wait

and he dispatched 17 Moore Militia volunteers as well as seven Chippewa warriors, who pursued the raiders in log canoes.

Meanwhile, the raiders landed in Michigan and fled. The sloop was abandoned in American waters where it, along with its cargo of arms and munitions, became the property of the U.S. government. The goods were returned to their Canadian owners and the hostages were released and returned to the Sombra side unharmed. The *General Gratiot* towed the sloop back to Detroit and the potential for war between England and the U.S. was averted.

The captain of the rebel ship wasn't so lucky. Charles Bowerman was eventually captured, tried for burglary, and sentenced to hang, but his sentence was commuted.

According to letters written to officials, another group of rebels landed at Nugent's Inn about two miles above Baby Point, now known as Port Lambton. It was said that they hoisted a liberty pole and a tri-coloured flag, then awaited further orders. Local observers reported that 300 pirates had landed and that 400 more were expected to cross the river in small boats and canoes. Lt. Governor Sir George Arthur later issued a report amending that number to less than 100.

Ordered to Nugent's Inn, the Moore Militia arrested six men, including Horace Cooley, who had previously been sent to prison for carrying messages between the patriots in Michigan and discontented residents in Upper Canada. He was tried and sentenced to hang, but his sentence was commuted and he became one of 93 English-speaking rebels who were sent to the penal colony of Van Dieman's Land, now known as Tasmania. The men were classified as political prisoners for their involvement in the Upper Canada Rebellion of 1838.


Plaque dedication planned

Oakland Hotel a luxurious landmark

The Oakland Hotel, a luxurious landmark along the St. Clair River across from Courtright from 1881 to 1911, offered every imaginable amenity to guests from both sides of the border. The hotel, acknowledged as one of America's largest wooden structures at the time, was built at a cost of \$150,000 and offered 115 guest rooms. A number of guest cottages were also built on the property and could be rented for the summer season for just \$225. The hotel burned down in 1915.




The Oakland Hotel as it looked in its glory days.


