ST. CLAIR'S GOILD MIEDAIL MAN ~ DEREK DROUIN ~

It's been a month since Gold medal Olympian Derek Drouin received a red-hot hometown hero's welcome from the estimated 15,000 fans that watched his motorcade

pass by on Lyndoch Street. Many of them had been glued to their televisions and computer screens during the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio as Drouin flawlessly executed a series of high jumps that culminated in an unmatched 2.38 metre gold medal-winning performance.

One of Drouin's young fans was quite definite about the high jumper's status in his field. "I think he's the best high jumper I've ever seen," said 10-year-old Riley. Her dad, Tim Heath of Corunna, acknowledged the level of achievement it took to capture the gold medal. "It's amazing just to go to the Olympics but to win gold is really special," he said.

Now that Derek Drouin has demonstrated what is possible with hard work and commitment, his message is getting through to the youth of St. Clair Township. Ten-year-old Rachel O'Donnell says Drouin's gold medal win makes her feel like she can do it, too. "I would like to be in the Olympics...maybe track and field or swimming," she said. Her aunt, Diana Lavers of Corunna, believes Drouin is a perfect role model for future local athletes. "I think he's amazing," she said. "He's really good for the kids. He shows them what can be done with hard work."

During the ceremony, held on the patio at Antonio's Pizza, Mayor Steve Arnold presented

Derek Drouin with an engraved crystal memento to commemorate his achievement and the pride he has inspired in his community. "We're very proud of Derek and what he's done," said Mayor Arnold. "He's a role model for our community and an inspiration for every one of us. I'm also proud of this community for being here today and supporting our home town hero." Also on hand for the ceremony were MP Marilyn Gladu and MPP Bob Bailey, who praised Drouin for his commitment to his sport and to his stellar achievement.

MUNICIPAL NOTES

A public meeting to discuss the future of a medical marihuana grow op that had been established in the former Murray Street School attracted about 20 concerned residents and many more written objections to the facility.

The meeting was set to consider a temporary rezoning request from Ontario Inc. 2199178 to allow the grow op to operate with the intention of supplying two people from Sarnia with a supply of marihuana for medical purposes. When questioned, the applicant's planning consultant, Dave Hannaman, admitted the marihuana had already been planted in a section of the old school which houses the former gymnasium, change rooms, and foyer without the benefit of rezoning but that the grower was licensed.

Mayor Arnold clarified that the grow op had not been invited by council to set up in the building and council pointed out that the temporary rezoning request should have preceded any action taken at the facility. Further, municipal planner Barry Uitvlugt remarked that, after reviewing the nature of the operation and the current zoning applicable to the subject building, the grow op did not qualify as a "compatible use" for the building. In his report to council, he noted, "The medical marihuana facility or the application's "existing use" is not compliant with the zoning, site plan agreement, fire and building code, and would

place conflict within the intended use of the building...would not be appropriate in a residential area."

Mr. Hannam assured council that the temporary use of the building was a way of using the "underutilized" building until the property owner decides what will ultimately be done with the property and the temporary use designation would not be carried on past the requested three-year term without review. He said the intention of the grower was to harvest a crop and replant every six months, and that there would be no regular traffic to the building aside from the grower checking his plants and the clients picking up their supply.

Comments from the residents in attendance revealed that an unpleasant "skunk smell" had been emanating from the facility, spoiling backyard activities for many of them. Complaints were also heard regarding the state of the former school yard, which is currently overgrown with tall weeds which were said to be harbouring deer ticks, the carriers of Lyme disease.

John Flesher, a retired OPP officer and long-time resident of Corunna, remarked that the only trouble that had ever occurred in his neigh-

TOWNSHIP OF ST. CLAIR FALL YARD WASTE/BRUSH COLLECTION 2016

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas, in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

"Yard Waste" is collected separately from regular waste, on a weekly basis, in urbanized areas of the Township (collection begins at 7:00 AM). Yard waste from the balance of the Township is collected with the regular waste collection.

COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday, each week, depending on the service area.

Wednesday: • Corunna (including Froomfield area)

• St. Clair Parkway (North of Emily St., Mooretown)

Friday: • Brigden, Courtright, Mooretown, Port Lambton

 Sombra Village, Wilkesport, Chenal Ecarte, Leeland Garden

• St. Clair Parkway (South of Emily St., Mooretown)

Fall yard waste collection will begin Wednesday, October 19th and Friday, October 21st, and will continue until Wednesday, November 23rd and Friday, November 25th.

WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, hedge trimmings, and twigs, (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). Kitchen waste, earth, stones, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush, and whole shrubs with root ball attached are not permitted. (Brush Collection see below)

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. Open containers DOES NOT INCLUDE: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg / 50lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will not be collected.

BRUSH COLLECTION:

Small **Brush Bundles** will also be collected on **October 28**th with the following guidelines: 4' maximum length, 1" maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled) and tied & placed at curb. Loose sticks and twigs too small for bundling can be placed in **open containers clearly marked with an "X"** on both sides. **NO BAGS**

bourhood had been drug-related. He said the facility's outside lights had not been functioning and that only two were currently lit at night.

The possibility of break-ins at the facility was raised by Councillor Agar when Mr. Hannam said there would be no money kept on the premises and that security measures were in place. "There is money in that building - marihuana is money," said Councillor Agar. He added that the cost of securing the building would ultimately fall on the township in the form of police response costs every time they attended the building for an alarm.

A motion to deny the temporary rezoning of the facility was carried, at which time Mayor Amold remarked, "In order to have a license (to grow medical marihuana), you have to have a by-law in place. This was a fraudulent attempt (to get the facility rezoned)."

A second motion by Deputy Mayor Gilliland required that the operation cease immediately and that the plants be removed from the facility. The motion was carried.

Further, the property standards complaints registered by neighbours of the facility will be investigated.

Living With Diabetes

This is a two hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. The session is led by a Nurse Educator. Sessions will be held on 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on the following Wednesdays: Oct. 12 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Nov. 9 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; and Dec. 7 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.

Diabetes Healthy Eating and Keeping Active

This is a two hour session for people who have already attended our Living with Diabetes class or who have had past education on the basics of Diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. The session is led by a Registered Nurse. Sessions will be held on: Wednesdays on Oct. 19 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Nov. 16 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; and Dec. 14 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.

A Guide To Diabetes Prevention

This is a 1.5 hour group session for those who want to learn about diabetes and how to prevent it, or for those who have been told they are at risk of getting diabetes. This session is led by a Registered Nurse and a Registered Dietitian. They will discuss what diabetes is, risk factors for getting diabetes, and how to decrease blood sugar levels through lifestyle changes. The program is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Sessions will be held on: Monday, Oct. 24 from 1:30-3:30 p.m. and Wednesday, Nov. 23 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

Quit Smoking Workshop

This is a two hour session for those who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nico-

tine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. The workshop is open to the public and <u>no physician referral is required</u>. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our Nurse Educators. The next Quit Smoking sessions will be held on Wednesdays on Oct. 26 from 1:30-3:30 p.m. and Nov. 30 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

Stress Management Workshop

Created by our registered Social Worker, this two-hour seminar, offered monthly, will provide you with information on how to effectively manage stress through: regulating the stress response; goal-setting; problem-solving; challenging unhelpful thinking; and communicating assertively. This seminar is open to the public and <u>no physician referral is required</u>. The next workshops will take place Fridays from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Oct. 7 and Dec. 2.

Note: Class date, times and locations within Corunna are subject to change or cancelation depending upon the number of patient registrants.

New historical plaque reveals the wild side of Wilkesport

The story of Wilkesport is a remarkable tale of fearless exploration and foresight. It has now been revealed through the placement of a new historical plaque at the front of the Wilkesport Community Centre. The plaque was dedicated on Sept. 17 during a ceremony that featured two descendants of Paul Sturdevant, the first pioneer to arrive in the area. His fourth-great-grandson, Paul Sturdevant, and his wife, Shirley, along with Diane Rose, attended the dedication. Shirley Sturdevant, a historian who has researched the Sturdevant family, was able to reveal the genesis of the Wilkesport area.

Around 1827, Sturdevant, a lumber man from New York State, traveled to this area and was met by a dense, foreboding forest and swampy, inhospitable land that had discouraged other explorers of the day. After building himself a log cabin, he stayed the winter and went home, only to return with his four sons to help him open up the land. It was a difficult task with only Indian trails to follow until the late 1840s. As timber was cleared and drainage ditches were dug, the land eventually dried up to allow further settlement and the development of agriculture in the area.

At that time, the Sydenham River was about 16 feet wide and 24 feet deep; it was wide enough to allow ocean vessels to travel to Wilkesport. The availability of lumber also gave way to a thriving boat-building industry and Wilkesport became the only inland port in Lambton. Ships built in Wilkesport include: the schooner Blackbird; the scow Elijah Windsor; the tug Harvey; the ferry Marion; and the schooner Relief. The complete record of boats built in the town runs from 1867 to 1888. Families that helped to




