## MUNICIPAL NOTES

The 2018 municipal elections are still many months away, but decisions about how to carry them out were on the agenda at the Nov. 21 meeting of St. Clair Township Council.

The "vote by mail" method, which has been used twice before, was approved for use again. In his recommendation to council, Clerk Jeff Baranek pointed out that those elections ran smoothly in partnership with *Datafix* and *Dominion Voting*. These two companies have once again been contracted to oversee the process.

The "ranked ballot" was also discussed. In June, 2016, the Provincial government passed legislation that would allow municipal voters to rank the candidates in order of preference. For instance, in the process of a ranked ballot for the mayor's

position, a candidate must receive 50 per cent plus one to be declared winner. After each round of voting, the candidate with the lowest number of votes would be dropped from the ballot and their votes would be redistributed according to their next choice. Mr. Baranek noted there are no municipal elections in Canada that currently use ranked ballots. This optional voting method was rejected by council in favour of the voting method currently used, which is known as the "first past the post" election model.

## Winter parking by-law - Dec. 1

THE WINTER PARKING BY-LAW IS NOW IN EFFECT. Motorists are advised that it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This by-law ensures that snow plow crews can do their jobs without having to avoid parked cars.

Property owners are also reminded that it is against the law to shovel snow out into pub-

lic streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless automobile collisions.





# Ship damage to shoreline being addressed by Transport Canada

Damage to the St. Clair River shoreline has become a matter of concern for Transport Canada Marine Safety and Security. A document from Transport Canada notes that "During recent years there has been a marked increase in damage to wharves, boat-houses, small boats, moored ships, and erosion to the shoreline caused by draw-off and wave disturbance created by the passage of ships and boats." The document also cautions that people, and especially children, are also vulnerable to this hazard.

High water levels are expected to increase and extend the damaging effects of a vessel's passage. The document also indicates that masters, pilots, operators and owners of vessels may be subject to court actions for damages sustained by injured parties as a result of damage or injury caused by the passage of their vessels.

## Four new doctors set up practices with Rapids Family Health Team

Corunna now has four new doctors accepting new patients in the 233 Cameron Street Shell Health clinic building. Drs. Marc Austin, Dan Vouriot, Adnan Chaudry and Brett Mountain all have family medicine backgrounds with a sub-specialty in emergency medicine. When not at the new clinic, they help staff the emergency department at Bluewater Health, and Dr. Vouriot also works as an ICU physician there. This association with other physicians gives them an enhanced ability to help their patients. "We can call on our colleagues to consult on patients and get them to emergency if we need to," said Dr. Austin.

The family nature of the new clinic practice addresses the needs of all patients, from newborns to seniors. "There is no patient, regardless of complexity, that we would not consider taking on," said Dr. Vouriot.

Patients have the distinct advantage of having immediate access to a number of diagnostic modalities which help speed up many diagnoses. "We're part of the Rapids Family Health Team, so we have access to electrocardiograms, bloodwork, a diabetes educator and social worker," said Dr. Austin.

The team approach is a benefit to the community, giving patients convenient treatment options. "If your doctor is not available, there will always be another to see," said Dr. Austin.

Evening hours are also a plus, acknowledging that ill-

ness doesn't always observe business hours. The clinic is open on Wednesdays until 8 p.m.

The need for timely, focused health care is a need that is now being met. Dr. Mountain says the team is hopeful that, in time, the clinic will continue to grow with new technologies and equipment to offer the residents of St. Clair Township the best in health care.

Dr. Chaudhry summed up their hope for the future. "Our overarching theme is to keep people out of the hospital. We have all the necessary resources."

#### Living With Diabetes

This is a two hour session that provides a general overview of diabetes. We will discuss some of the most common myths about diabetes, learn what "good control" is, and discuss some of the things you can do to manage diabetes. Sessions led by a Nurse Educator, be held on the following dates: Wednesday, Dec. 7 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Wednesday, Jan. 11 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Friday, Feb. 17 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Wednesday, March 22 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; and Monday, May 1 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

#### **Diabetes Healthy Eating and Keeping Active**

This is a two hour session for people who have already attended our Living with Diabetes class or who have had past education on the basics of Diabetes and want more information on diet. We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. Sessions led by a Registered Nurse will be held on the following dates: Wednesday, Dec. 14 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Wednesday, Jan. 18 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Friday, Feb. 24 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Wednesday, March 29 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; and Monday, May 8 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

#### A Guide To Diabetes Prevention

This is a 1.5 hour group session for those who want to learn about diabetes and how to prevent it, or for those who have been told they are at risk of getting diabetes. This session is led by a Registered Nurse and a Registered Dietitian. They will discuss what diabetes is, risk factors for getting diabetes, and how to decrease blood sugar levels through lifestyle changes. The program is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Sessions will be held on the following dates: Wednesday, Jan. 18 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; Wednesday, Feb. 22 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Monday, March 20 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; and Friday, April 28 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.

#### Healthy Eating and You

This is a series of four sessions lasting two hours each. The program will help you make permanent lifestyle changes; it is NOT a diet program. You will set your own healthy eating and physical activity goals and learn how to make plans for achieving them. Some topics to be discussed include: carbohydrates, protein and fats (good and bad); physical activity; emotional eating strategies; sensible portions and portion control strategies; group discussions that will help you learn from others' experiences. The next series will begin Monday, Jan. 9 for four weeks from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Note: Patient must attend the first session to attend the final three. The program is open to the public and no physician referral is required.

#### **Quit Smoking Workshop**

This is a two hour session for those who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. The workshop is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our Nurse Educators. The next Quit Smoking sessions are slated for: Friday, Jan. 6 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; Monday, Feb. 6 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.; Wednesday, March 8 from 9:30-11:30 a.m.; and Wednesday, April 5 from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

#### Stress Management Workshop

Created by our registered Social Worker, this two-hour seminar, offered monthly, will provide you with information on how to effectively manage stress through: regulating the stress response; goal-setting; problem-solving; challenging unhelpful thinking; and communicating assertively. This seminar is open to the public and no physician referral is required. The next seminars will take place from 9:30-11:30 a.m. on the following dates: Friday, Dec. 2; Friday, Feb. 10; Friday, March 10; and Friday, April 7.

## World War I Honour Roll plaques revealed after decades in storage

The Moore Museum has yet another historical treasure onsite. A poignant set of World War I memorial plaques which have been in storage for decades is now housed in a purpose built shelter on the museum grounds. The new display was unveiled on Nov. 6 with a solemn dedication service, led by Padre Fr. Paul Woolley. The service included the Kohima Epitaph, a fitting prayer written by combatants during the Battle of Burma during WWII. It reads, "When you go home, tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today.

The 11 carved marble plaques documenting the names of Moore Township men who died in World War I were originally displayed in the first Moore Township office at the corner of Moore Line and Kimball Road, which later became the Moore Centre Women's Institute hall. The marble plaques were left in place until the building was vacated, when they were given for safekeeping to the Watson family, owners of the farmland adjacent to the hall. Soldiers commemorated on the plaques include: Sergt. Peter Gauld; Flt. Lieut. Thos. Wilfred Duncan; Pte. Samuel Brigden; Pte. Walter R. Browning; Pte. Frederick Arthur Keene; Pte. Harold M. Phillips; Pte. Frederick Robinson; Pte. Clarence Shaw; Pte. Charles N. Taylor; and Pte. Harry R. Tuddenham.

Given the historical value of the plaques, the Watson family kind-

ly donated them to the Moore Museum so that they could once again be viewed by the public. But their size and weight made them impossible to place within the museum building and they were stored away.

It wasn't until Chemfab Industries Inc., after consultation with Mayor Steve Arnold, donated funds to enable the building of a special shelter for the plaques. Museum volunteers took on the project, which required a careful design strategy to accommodate the heavy marble plaques. "A lot of planning went into making sure the bracing was in the right place," said museum curator Laurie Mason.

The volunteer construction team included: Dave Beer,

Sports Complex and will include a large children's play area, a day to reconnect with family and old friends.



## Fire truck restoration project 40 years in the making

~Based on documents researched by the restoration team~

A 1925 Lafrance pumper fire truck will finally receive its long-awaited makeover after 40 years of waiting.

The truck was purchased by the Corunna Firemen's Association in 1977 from the Chemical Valley Region (Sarnia) branch of the Antique and Classic Car Club of Canada. During its service days, the truck was equipped with a 1,000 gallon-per-minute triple combination screw pump. Its cost, when purchased by the Sarnia Fire Department in 1926, was \$15,750.

The truck was not restored after purchase because of lack of funds, and it was donated to the Moore Museum in 1981, where it later became one of the exhibits housed in the fire hall. Funds for the truck's restoration have been generated by the firefighters through the annual Firefighter's Field Day. Project Chair Joe Rodrigues says the \$10,000 currently available for the project will be used to restore

the engine to good working order. Ongoing fundraising efforts will be used to restore the truck to its former glory as they are received. The total project cost is estimated between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

The truck attended some spectacular fires during its years of service in Sarnia, but without doubt, the most dramatic of the lot was the destruction of the *Harmonic*, a passenger liner that burned at the C.S.L. dock in Point Edward in 1945. The truck was especially effective due to its ability to increase water pressure that could send a flow of water up to the highest deck of the ship. Under less heroic circumstances, the pumper was used to pump water out of flooded homes, but the practice was discontinued after there were too many incidents of flood debris clogging the pump.


