HYDRANT FLUSHING

St. Clair Township Residents

Public Works will be undertaking annual flushing of fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township Water Distribution System during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. beginning May, 2017 and continuing into the fall. During this maintenance procedure, you may notice some water discolouration when using taps, flushing toilets, doing laundry, etc. as some sediment may be drawn into your residence. We recommend that you run the cold water tap for a few minutes or until discolouration disappears.

If discolouration of the water continues after 10-15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.



SEWER MAIN FLUSHING

St. Clair Township Residents

Public Works will be flushing sewer mains connected to the St. Clair Township sewer system during the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. beginning April, 2017 and continuing into the fall. During this maintenance procedure, you may notice some gurgling noises in drains.

If conditions persist after 24-48 hours of normal use, please notify Public Works at 519-867-2993.

The children of Courtright have something wonderful to look forward to this summer. The new splash pad is ready to go thanks to the efforts of the Courtright splash pad committee. Through a number of fundraisers, from the New Year's dance in 2015 to barbecues and breakfasts, the group managed to raise \$109,689.76, their half of the cost of the new facility, in just over one year. St. Clair Township contributed half of the total cost and advanced the remainder so that the splash pad project could get underway.

At the May 1 meeting of St. Clair Township Council, the splash pad committee presented council with a cheque for \$47,082.98, the final payment on the loan. During his comments, Mayor Arnold said, "Council appreciates the great work you've

Household Hazardous Waste Days schedule

The annual Household Hazardous Waste Days, hosted by the County of Lambton in conjunction with Clean Harbors Canada Inc., are underway at the Clean Harbors collection site at 4090 Telfer Road in St. Clair Township. Dates for upcoming the *free* Saturday household hazardous waste drop-off opportunities are: June 24; Sept. 30; and Oct. 28.

Materials accepted include: batteries, drain and oven cleaners, pesticides, rat poison, pharmaceuticals, cleaning fluids, pool chemicals, ammonia, bleach, aerosols, gasoline, paints, barbecue starter, oil, solvents, and propane cylinders.

Materials NOT accepted include: expired marine flares, tires, ammuni-

tions, infectious, radioactive, and PCBs. (Sarnia Police Services will accept expired flares at the office, 555 Christina Street North.)



Note: Commercially generated hazardous waste AND containers larger than 20 litres or weighing over 25 kg. (55 lb.) will not be accepted.

Canada - A Country Born in Stages

The Dominion of Canada began in 1867 with four provinces: Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

It took over a century to acquire the other provinces and territories that make up the 13 we have today. They include: Manitoba and Saskatchewan (1870); British Columbia (1871); Prince Edward Island (1873); Yukon (1898); Saskatchewan and Alberta (1905); Newfoundland (1949); and Nunavut (1999).

2017 YARD WASTE/BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

The Township of St. Clair offers a yard waste/brush collection program for defined areas in order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to the landfill site.

"Yard Waste" is collected separately from regular waste on a weekly basis in urbanized areas of the Township (collection begins at 7 am). Yard waste for the balance of the Township is collected with the regular waste collection.

WHAT IS YARD WASTE?

Yard waste includes the following: grass, leaves, garden plants, little hedge trimmings (generally plants with stems smaller than a lead pencil). NOT permitted: woody stems from ornamental grasses and woody plants, kitchen waste, earth, stones, walnuts, pinecones, wood mulch, tree stumps, logs, body wood, large brush and whole shrubs with root ball attached.

Yard waste placed at the roadside for collection must be bagged in clear or transparent plastic bags, paper bags, or open containers clearly marked with an "X" on both sides and must be free of all non-compostable material such as plastic, glass, metal, or other debris. Open containers DOES NOT INCLUDE: blue boxes or cardboard boxes.

Containers must not exceed 23kg/50lb.

Yard waste placed in regular garbage bags will <u>not be collected</u>.

COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Collection will be on Wednesday or Friday each week, depending on the service area.

BRUSH COLLECTION:

Small Brush Bundles will also be collected on June 2nd, June 23rd, and November 3rd with the following guidelines: 4' maximum length, 1" maximum diameter, cut ends all in one direction, neat piles (not tangled) and tied & placed at curb. These bundles can include woody ornamental grasses and woody plants.

LPH urges precautions against tick bites

Lambton Public Health urges everyone to take precautions against tick bites while outdoors this summer. Lyme disease, which can cause serious health problems such as joint, heart, and nerve complications, is spread by infected sesame seed-sized blacklegged ticks which live in wooded areas and fields. They feed on the blood of animals and people who brush against the plants, bushes and tall grasses the ticks inhabit and most people never feel their bite.

However, the most common tick in Lambton County is the larger American dog tick. Lori Lucas, a supervisor with Lambton Public Health, says, "Not all blacklegged ticks carry the bacteria (for Lyme disease). Even if the tick is positive, the risk of getting Lyme disease is low."

Pinery Provincial Park has a confirmed population of blacklegged ticks, but they have been found in other areas of the county. Prompt detection and removal of ticks help Lyme disease. Use tweezers to grasp the tick's head as close to the skin as possible and pull straight out using steady pressure. Don't twist, squeeze or burn the tick.

Lyme disease is easily treated with antibiotics if detected early. Symptoms commonly occur within one to two weeks and include: fever, headache, muscle and joint pains, fatigue, and a red bull's eye skin rash.

HERITAGE CORNER



Heritage St. Clair making invaluable contributions to township's Canada 150 legacy

CANADA

In this sesquicentennial year, you will be learning a lot about the growth of Canada and the evolution of St. Clair Township: how Canada began, how it grew, and what the future may hold for it in the next 150 years. This information didn't just appear out of nowhere; it was preserved through the efforts of history scholars, journalists, diarists, witnesses, and the work

of interested citizens and groups that took the time to document and preserve the information.

Heritage St. Clair, a committee authorized by St. Clair Township Council to identify and promote this municipality's heritage, has been especially busy in the months leading up to the Canada 150 Celebration. Their mission is to ensure that the rich, and often surprising, history of St. Clair Township will be available for everyone to enjoy throughout 2017.

The members of Heritage St. Clair seek out forgotten sites, research the history of the people and places that set St. Clair Township apart from other communities, and reveal the hidden local stories behind pivotal historical events that helped to shape our community and our nation. With this information in hand, they write stories and contribute to the wealth of knowledge that is often used to illuminate the public through interpretive signs and displays such as those on public view in Brander Park, Courtright Riverside Park, or in other locations around the township.

The group's efforts this year will become part of the enduring history of this municipality and their names will be associated with the lasting legacy they are helping to provide for future generations.

Heritage St. Clair Canada 150 prep

As part of its Canada 150 preparations, Heritage St. Clair is busy finalizing a series of eight interpretive story boards - two bronze plaques and six coloured informational boards - that will take their places as integral parts of the new Sesquicentennial Fountain Park project that is now taking shape at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre along Emily Street in Mooretown. The signs will border a horseshoe-shaped walkway, which encloses a custom -designed stone fountain.

The two bronze plaques reveal the genesis of St. Clair Township. The first plaque traces its roots, from the Crown's acquisition of the land from the Chippewa First Nations in 1792 to 1823, when

a site in Corunna was surveyed as a possible location for the capital of the united provinces of Upper and Lower Canada. The second elaborates on the story to provide insights into the historic elements that played a role in creating the modern municipality we now call home.

The six coloured story boards provide captivating illustrations by St. Clair Township artist Paul Smith, as well as details about some of the events and features that make St. Clair Township so unique and appealing. Three of the story boards create a topographical time capsule, displaying heritage maps of Sombra and Moore Townships as they were rendered around 1880, plus a fabulous satellite view of the township that was taken this year. Other story boards highlight famous and noteworthy township residents, past and present, information about the former Sombra and Moore Townships, and *Foundations of Freedom*, a look at the role the Royal Canadian Legion has played in this community. And at the head of the walkway, a plaque commemorating the sesquicentennial year council will be erected.

An added feature that is sure to capture the imagination of those who pass through the new park is the addition of a QR chip (quick response chip) to each story board and plaque. Visitors can scan the chips to acquire additional information pertinent to the subject of each storyboard.

Mayor Arnold has been watching the development of the story boards with great interest. He says Heritage St. Clair has invested a great deal of time and effort into the work and the result is nothing short of remarkable. "The story boards are beautiful," he said, adding they will perpetuate the history of the township well into the future and be a source of pride for those who call St. Clair Township home.

149th Lambton Battalion photo graces Lambton County Council chambers

On March 28, 1917, over 400 men of the 149th Lambton Battalion boarded a ship in Halifax harbour bound for the battlefields of Europe. They endured the horrors of WWI in the service of King and Country, and many did not survive the conflict. To mark the 100th anniversary of this departure, staff from the Lambton County Cultural Services Division prepared a brief presentation of the names of these men, accompanied by a nearly life-sized enlargement of a group photo taken while the men were in training at Camp Borden in September, 2016. The image, which stretches over 50 linear feet, is now on display in the County Council chambers and will remain there until Remembrance Day. Members of the public are invited to view this poignant photograph.

Mr. Hazzard says the statistics for 2016 are remarkable. The event made a \$27,938 profit that directly benefited the St. Clair River Trail. And of the 850 people who participated in the event, a survey revealed that 91 per cent said it compared equal to or better than others they had been in. There were repeat runners, including a couple who now brings their children to participate. Children as young as seven years of age are running in the 5 kilometre event.

Professional timing for each individual runner is handled by a timer from Toronto, which Mr. Hazzard says gives a "big race feel" to the event.

4	1802	1802 John Courtney, Jr. was the first European child born in what would later become Moore Township.
5	1811	Shawanese Township was partially surveyed.
6	1815	Bâby Pointe was established as Shawanese Township's first settlement.
7	1820	Shawanese Township was fully surveyed and renamed Sombra.
8	1820	John MacDonald built the first house in what would later become Port Lambton.
9	1821	The Smith and Burnham families arrived in Sombra Township.

Diabetes Healthy Eating and Keeping Active

We will discuss the basics of healthy eating, what types of food affect your blood sugar levels, reading food labels, when and how much to eat, and how to increase your physical activity level. Sessions led by a Registered Nurse will be held on Monday, June 12, 9:30-11:30; Wednesday, July 26, 1:30-3:30; Wednesday, Sept. 20, 9:30-11:30.

A Guide To Diabetes Prevention

This is a 1.5 hour group session for those who want to learn about diabetes and how to prevent it, or for those who have been told they are at risk of getting diabetes. This session is led by a Registered Nurse and a Registered Dietitian. They will discuss what diabetes is, risk factors for getting diabetes, and how to decrease blood sugar levels through lifestyle changes. The program is open to the public and no physician referral is required. The next sessions will be held on: Wednesday, June 21, 1:30-3:30; Monday, July 24, 1:30-3:30; Friday, Sept. 15, 9:30-11:30.

Healthy Eating and You

This program is a series of four sessions of two hours each. It will help you make permanent changes and is NOT a diet program. You will set your own healthy eating and physical activity goals and learn how to make plans for achieving them. Some topics that will be discussed will include: carbohydrates, protein and fats (good and bad); physical activity; emotional eating strategies; sensible portions and portion control strategies; group discussions to help you learn from the experiences of others. This program is open to the public. No physician referral is required. The next program will begin Thursday, June 1 for four weeks from 9:30-11:30. Patients must attend the first class to attend the final three.

Quit Smoking Workshop

This is a two hour session for those who are thinking about quitting or are ready to quit using tobacco. We will discuss strategies and methods for quitting, such as cutting back, using nicotine replacement therapy, and using prescribed medications. We will also work on finding ways

to overcome barriers to quitting, how to make a quit plan, managing withdrawal symptoms, and how to prevent a relapse. The workshop is open to the public and no physician referral is required. Participants are also welcome to schedule individual appointments to receive further support and information from one of our Nurse Educators. The next Quit Smoking sessions are slated for Wednesdays on: June 14, 1:30-3:30; July 19, 9:30-11:30; and Aug. 9, 1:30-3:30.

Stress Management Workshop

Created by our registered Social Worker, this two-hour seminar, offered monthly, will provide you with information on how to effectively manage stress through: regulating the stress response; goal-setting; problem-solving; challenging unhelpful thinking; and communicating assertively. This seminar is open to the public and no physician referral is required. The next seminars will take place Fridays at 9:30-11:30 on: June 2, July 14, Aug. 11, and Sept. 8.

Happiness 101

Happiness 101 is a four-week group program that focuses on being happy, adapted from the manual Happiness 101 by Dr. Louise Lambert.
