OPG representative briefs council on future of the Lambton Generating Station site

The future of the Lambton Generating Station site south of Courtright was on the agenda as Dan Roorda, OPG project manager for the decommissioning and demolition of the plant, attended the regular meeting of council on Sept. 18.

Mr. Roorda told council the Request for Proposals for the

Mr. Roorda told council the Request for Proposals for the demolition was issued June 19 of this year. Bids for the demolition of the plant have been received and are now being evaluated. He assured council that OPG will work closely with the chosen contractor to ensure the demolition plan minimizes impact to the local community. This will include mitigation of dust and noise from the site.

Asbestos abatement is expected to begin in mid-2018, with the removal of equipment and buildings to be done throughout 2019 and 2020. Site remediation is expected to

Notice to property owners to destroy noxious weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 13, 16, and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$80.)

The cooperation of all land owners is earnestly solicited.

be done by the end of 2021.

The disposition of the site and structures have been determined. "OPG will retain ownership of the site," said Mr. Roorda. "The office building, guard shack, (the dock, some maintenance shops and warehouses) have a potential for future use. He assured council that the dock and retained structures would be maintained.

The switch yard and towers, which are owned by Hydro One, will remain and be disconnected from the station. The retained buildings will be connected to local power distribution.

Gas lines that are not required will be disconnected and the domestic water to the powerhouse will be modified with a fire hydrant added at the recommendation of St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walter Anderson.

Landfills at the plant will be properly closed but the land will not be available for agricultural use. Future environmental work will include the closing of the gypsum reclamation site, sewage lagoons, and acid ponds, as well as the maintenance of the landfill caps. Mr. Roorda said "The site will be left in a brown field condition." The ash landfill has already been capped.

Mr. Roorda says OPG is also working with Walpole First Nation to connect the converted sludge rainwater pond to Hawkins Drain. The St. Clair Region Conservation Authority approval expires on Nov. 10, 2017 and the Walpole First Nation is still not satisfied with this solution.

Public safety and security are also being reviewed. Contract security is currently on-site on weekends and off-hours, and the need for this measure will be reassessed and revised as the work continues.

When the extensive preparation for the demolition has been completed, the plant will be leveled. "The current scope of the project is to bring the structure down to grade and make it attractive from the St. Clair Parkway," said Mr. Roorda.

The future appearance of the site is being considered in the overall plan for the site. "Berm appearance will be maintained in a properly mowed conditions," said Mr. Roorda, adding the site will not become an eye sore.

Council expressed concern over the uncertain future of the Lambton G. S. site. "It has always been our hope that the site would be returned to its natural state," said Mayor Arnold.

But Mr. Roorda says the future of the site is still in question and potential uses for the buildings and the dock are currently unknown. "We need to determine what is the best value for OPG," he said.

OPG made the decision to decommission and demolish Lambton G.S. in Nov. 2016.

As the project progresses, Mr. Roorda says OPG will return to council to make quarterly reports or if there is a new development.

The final date for the free annual Household Hazardous Waste Days, hosted by the County of Lambton in conjunction with Clean Harbors Canada Inc., will be held on **Saturday, Oct. 28** at the Clean Harbors collection site at 4090 Telfer Road in St. Clair Township. *Domestic waste ONLY*.

Materials accepted include: batteries, drain and oven cleaners, pesticides, rat poison, pharmaceuticals, cleaning fluids, pool chemicals, ammonia, bleach, aerosols, gasoline, paints, barbecue starter, oil, solvents, and propane cylinders. Materials NOT accepted include: expired marine flares, tires, ammunitions, infectious, radioactive, and PCBs. (Sarnia Police Services will accept expired flares at the office, 555 Christina Street North.)

Downriver Craft Sale chalks up near record crowds

After over a week of summer-like weather, the Moore Museum's annual Downriver Craft Sale attracted a large crowd of shoppers to the outdoor event. In the first hour of operation, over 200 people had already

come through the gates.

Right: Business is buzzin' in Brigden - Jeremy and Erin MacDonald of M & J Sweet Acres in Brigden were at the craft sale with honey and other products they have garnered from their apiary. Jeremy says this side business is a hobby that grew because of his interest in bees. The farm machinery mechanic explained that the queen bee can lay as many as 1,000 eggs every day during the summer, although in winter, that number falls to about 50 since there are no sources of pollen to fuel the hive. Her productive life span is about four to five years.

Erin MacDonald, a part-time veterinary assistant, creates products such as lip balms and lotions, as well has honey, from the fruits of Jeremy's efforts. She says most of the honey produced is clover honey, which is sweeter than some other varieties. The MacDonald's brought an observation hive to the Downriver Craft Sale so that visitors to the event could see the queen and her worker bees at work. The queen had a tiny yellow dot on her back to make her visible. Jeremy says there are five colours of dots, each one representing a specific year. The yellow dot represents 2017. After four to five years, the bee keeper "requeens" the hive to ensure that production is maintained.

Jeremy says statistics indicate that one in three bites you eat rely on pollination and the drastic global decline of bees, the primary pollinator, has been identified as an imminent threat to our food supply if it cannot

be halted.



She added that wetlands are a critical habitat for native plants and animals, and they also reduce flooding and improve water quality, ultimately improving the health of the watershed.

Geocaching a high-tech treasure hunt catching on locally

A high-tech version of the traditional treasure hunt is catching on in Lambton County and around the world.

Geocaching, also known as *gpsstashing*, has been growing in popularity since 2000, after the removal of selective availability from the Global Positioning System (GPS) gave anyone with a GPS unit or a GPS equipped mobile device the ability to use satellite coordinates (exact longitude and latitude) to accurately locate small hidden targets called geocaches.

Here in the Lambton County Area, there are hundreds of geocaches stashed in parks, including Lorne C. Henderson Conservation Area near Petrolia, where a geocaching event was held at the on Sept. 17.

Sharon Nethercott, St. Clair Region Conservation Authority (SCRCA) Conservation Education Coordinator, says this was the seventh event since the geocaching targets were located in the park. "It's a good way to meet other geocachers," she said. "It also attracts people to the area."

The targets consist of small waterproof containers like film canisters and small Tupperware-type containers that contain small items.

The traditional geocaches contained a log book and pen or pencil in which geocachers who found the target could write about their experiences.

As the geocaching craze grows, there are now geocaching apps for smart phones. Reasonably priced handheld GPS units can be bought at Canadian Tire and other electronics outlets, and Sharon notes people of all ages are getting hooked on this healthy outdoor pursuit. "My 12-year-old son likes geocaching better than the Xbox," she said.
