Winter parking by-law in effect

The winter parking by-law is now in effect. Motorists are advised that it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This by-law ensures that snow plow crews can do their job efficiently without having to slow down to avoid parked vehicles.

Property owners are also reminded that it is against the law to shovel snow out onto public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless vehicle collisions.





Pheasant/Rabbit **Hunting Licenses**

The Township of St. Clair pheasant/rabbit hunting licenses are now on sale until February 28, 2018. They will be available at the following locations: Pic-N-Pay Variety, Sombra; Courtright Variety Store, Courtright; Corunna Home Hardware, Corunna; Agris Co-operative Ltd, Brigden; St. Clair Civic Centre, Mooretown.

The fees will be \$5.00 for a resident license and \$8.00 for a non-resident license.

Applicants must apply in person and multiple licenses will not be issued.

Township increases number of emergency shelters

Locations throughout St. Clair Township have been designated as emergency shelters.

Mayor Steve Arnold says all fire halls currently carry that designation, and other locations such as the Brigden fairgrounds exhibition hall and local communi-

ty centres have been outfitted with emergency gas-fire generators to ensure the safety and comfort of all township residents should an emergency arise.

The latest addition to the roster of shelters is now being developed at the Royal Canadian Legion Corun-

na Branch 447 hall.

In a letter to council, Branch 447 President John Cormier offered the Corunna Legion hall as a prospective emergency shelter. Mayor Arnold says council is now waiting for a report from Fire Chief Walt Anderson to determine what will be required to outfit the hall for use.

He noted that the new shelter will be a welcome addition to the network of municipal shelters. "Corunna is our weak spot," he said. "We don't have one in that area.

In his letter to council, Mr. Cormier explained the

reason for the Legion's generous offer.

"Branch 447 Corunna is very appreciative of the cooperation and support we receive from the municipality and the community in hosting our many events and programs," he wrote. "We wanted to show our appreciation by being there to help whenever the need may arise and people become stranded, perhaps by a weather event or are just in need of temporary shelter due to unforeseen circumstances.

While there is no way to anticipate what challenges any community may be called upon to meet, the creation of adequate emergency accommodations will ensure that municipal residents will have somewhere to take shelter until emergencies, natural or man-made,

have been dealt with.

"Our goal is to have emergency shelters, equipped with emergency generators, equally distributed throughout the township," said Mayor Arnold.

Prevent frozen pipes during persistent low temperatures

The long intervals of below normal temperatures this winter have presented serious and costly problems for some homeowners this winter.

Prevention is the key to avoiding these problems, which often occur along outside walls, near doors or windows. If a water line is already frozen, open the faucet closest to the frozen pipe to allow water to trickle out to stop the line from bursting when water begins to flow again. Where there are cabinets or vanities, leave the doors open to allow warm room air to heat the interior space.

If possible, shut off water to outside lines and leave the outside valve slightly open. Faucets fed by any inside lines that might freeze should also be left slightly open.

If pipes freeze, shut off the water as soon as the problem is identified. Heat the air around them using a blow dryer or portable heater, ensuring that no flammable materials are nearby.

NEVER use a blowtorch or open flame to thaw a frozen pipe. It only takes a moment for the flame to ignite surrounding supports and walls.

And when turning the water on again, do it slowly and check for any leaks in the pipe connections or cracks in the lines.

HERITAGE CORNER

Ghost of the hamlet of Logierait lives on in grand old buildings

By Ian Mason and Bonnie Stevenson When you're driving along Kimball Road, you will come to a beautiful brick house at the corner of LaSalle Line.

The house marks the location of the former hamlet of Logierait. Built in 1880, the house was originally the manse for Burns Presby-terian Church, which can be seen adjacent to the house on the south side of LaSalle Line.

Originally known as Hossie Settlement, after the founding family of the community, the hamlet's post office was named Logierait in 1863. At least three buildings in the hamlet survived from the 1880s; the house and church building, now a private residence, are still in use.

The church and manse were used by the congregation until 1985.

by the congregation until 1985, when the congregation amalgamated with Mooreline United Church to form Burns-Mooreline United Church in the Mooreline church at LaSalle

Line and Brigden Road.
Interestingly, Burns Presbyterian
Church was situated within the
boundaries of Moore Township, while the manse across the road

was in Sarnia Township.

The wire fence in the photograph is long gone, but it bears decorative maple leaf embellishments along its top edge. (See inset, top right) One such fence is still known to ex-

Remembering S.S.#15 Moore (Kimball School)

Kimball School stood along Kimball Road between Courtright and Moore Lines and housed generations of students from 1870 to 1959, when it became a private residence. The residence burned down in March, 2015 and new private residence stands in its place today.

Early records from its opening until 1879 are not available, but teachers who taught there when the school was new included: Miss Harkness, Mr. Pierce, Miss Milligan, Mr. Trapp, Mr. Brown, Mrs. James, Mrs. Thompson, and Mrs. Kerr.

Four generations of the Miller family attended the school, and there were three generations of Blackmans, Leapers, Nicholsons, Grays, Courtneys, Robbins, and Eyres.
