Don't clog sewers with FOG! (fats, oils, and grease)

Avoid sewer backups by observing the following Do's and Do Not's.

**DO:** put used grease and cooking oil in container and dispose of it in garbage; wipe out visible fats, oil, grease and food residue from dishes, pots, pans with disposable paper towels; put solid waste and food scraps in garage; be aware of hidden fat, oil and grease in salad dressings, gravies, cheese and desserts; use a strainer in the sink to remove excess food debris; encourage neighbours to keep fat, oil and grease out of the sewer system.

**DO NOT:** pour oil and grease, liquid food, or scrape food scraps down sink, drain or toilet; run hot water over greasy dishes (it will cool and grease will stick to inside of pipes); use a food waste grinder to get rid of food and grease; use washable cloths to wipe greasy dishes clean.

# Property owners urged to call Ontario **One Call** before digging

Spring and summer present homeowners with opportunities to make changes spring and summer present nomeowners with opportunities to make changes and improvements to their property. And in the rush to get their projects fin-ished by the time the snow flies, they are often tempted to not bother finding out the locations of buried lines and pipes before they start digging. Big mistake! Severing buried infrastructure can be an expensive problem for you and/or your neighbours. It can also be dangerous if you hit a live power line. One call can prevent costly repairs or even save your life. Before you dig, call **Ontario One Call at 1-800-400-2255**. Locators from local utilities will be called out to your property to find and mark buried lines.

Materials accepted include: batteries, drain and oven clean-ers, pesticides, rat poison, pharmaceuticals, cleaning fluids, pool chemicals, ammonia, bleach, aerosols, gasoline, paints, barbecue starter, oil, solvents, and propane cylinders. Materials <u>not</u> accepted include: PCBs, commercial, infec-tious, radioactive, tires, explosives/ammunitions including flares

flares. Please note, commercially generated hazardous waste and containers larger than 20 litres or weighing more than 25 kg (55 lb) will <u>NOT</u> be accepted. For more information, call the Household hazardous waste phone line at 519-845-0809, option 6.

#### Disposal of expired marine flares

Flares (pyrotechnics) are valid only for four years from their date of manufacture, which is printed on each flare. To dispose of flares, take them to Sarnia Police Services, 555 Christina Street North in Sarnia.

### Air monitoring website now available



The Clean Air Sarnia and Area website is now available for those who want to stay informed about the air quality in their communities.

The website, <u>cleanairsarniaandarea.com</u>, allows public access to government and industrial air monitoring information. Seven air

monitoring stations distributed throughout the Sarnia area are refreshed hourly to indicate whether air quality is good, moderate or poor when compared to provincial standards. The site also provides information about the monitoring stations, technology being used, and contaminants being monitored.

The Clean Air Sarnia and Area community advisory panel (CASA) began investigating the creation of the site in 2015 and it has been under development since 2017. The site's aim is to improve the transparency of air monitoring data and serve as an educational tool, but it is not meant to provide health or emergency information.

The Air Quality Health Index can be found at the Air Quality Ontario website and emergency notifications in Lambton County can be found through My Community Notification Network (MyCNN).



### Lambton Public Health issues mental health profile of Lambton County

Lambton Public Health recently issued a report on the overall mental health and incidence of mental illness in Lambton County.

Mental Health Profile Lambton County 2018, compiled using infor-mation from national and local surveys, health care services, community partners, and residents, offers clues about how the system is working and what requires improvement.

Findings reveal one in five Lambton County adults reports being diagnonsed with a mential health condition at some time in their lives. People from low-income households or living with chronic illnesses, as well as young people, were less likely to report good mental health, and

emergency room visits due to mental illness were highest in youth ages 15 to 24. In addition, one in five employed residents felt their workplace did not promote positive mental health.

In school-aged children, three stressors stood out: 52 per cent experienced school-related stressors; 28 per cent had parent and family issues; and 12 per cent had difficulty with friends and "fitting in".

The overall tone of the report was optimistic, with seven out of 10 Lambton residents describing their mental health as excellent or very good. "Information in the report paints a picture of a mostly resilient, mentally healthy community, howev-

er, as with other communities, we have pockets of vulnerability," said Lambton Medical Officer of Health Dr. Sudit Ranade.

It is hoped a better understanding of local mental health will inform future discussions, promote public involvement, and help develop appropriate ways to further improve mental health within the community. "There is more work to be done to improve and maintain positive mental health for all Lambton residents," said Dr. Ranade.

Hope's work, Assistant Curator Sonya Blazek of the JNAAG says, "Inspired by nature and the material itself, Hope Martin produces rhythmic expressions of her memories and experiences in the landscape.

At 21, Hope is relatively new to the art world, having taken up art in her teens as a form of therapy after a brain injury. "It gives me the ability to accept what is happening, what emotion I'm feeling, and it helps me move through it," she said. "I always did art in school, but I didn't take it seriously. After the injury, I picked up a paintbrush one day and got good feedback from it (the picture she created) so I did another one and kept paint-ing " ìng.

As Hope's love of the artistic process grew, she knew she was on to something important. Since then, art has helped her embrace the differences that allow her to see the world in a unique and empowering way. Her love of the work she does can be seen in the wide grin on her face and the sparkle in her eyes as she says, "It took me a while to accept it, but I realize this is the path I want to be on. I don't know who I would be without my art.

Through the use of colour and varied mediums from oil and watercolour to marker and pencil, Hope inter-prets the sights and emotions she feels, setting them out as abstract visuals that help her make sense of the world. "I like to simplify things. What would a sound look like? How can I represent water with a shape or a line?" she said. "When I'm out in nature, I use my senses to see how I'm feeling, then put those feelings into my artwork.

Finding public spaces unsettling, Hope prefers the peace and inspiration she finds in nature. "There's something about being able to go on a hike and be sub-mersed in it," she said. "I feel there is nothing wrong with me.<sup>1</sup>

As she struggles with cognitive impairments, Hope uses art to come to terms with the challenges she faces. "It's hard for me to go into a store, but I see the world

in a way other people can't and I love it." During her journey of artistic discovery, Hope says she has met people who understand what she is trying to achieve. A London artist she knows as Vanessa has been especially helpful. "Vanessa is an artist with a brain inju-ry who has taught me a lot," she said. "In Sarnia, Madi Reynolds (owner of Ingonish Trading Company) has also taught me a lot.'

She believes her interpretation of what she experiences is better served when seen from her own special perspective than from the conventional study of the masters and contemporary artists. "I've learned more from (Vanessa and Madi) than I think I would from art history," she said.

Hope's entry in the JNAAG competition was done at the suggestion of her father, but she hesitated to apply because she feels her work is still in a formative state. "I'm in an exploration phase with my work," she said. "I'm using anything I can get my hands on to see what happens.

Nappens. With just two days left to apply, Hope says she decid-ed to take a chance. "I didn't apply until two days be-fore the deadline," she said. "I was surprised when I got a call about a studio visit." As one of five finalists in the competition, gallery staff members visited Hope at her studio, which completely dominates her parents' garage. After viewing more of her work and gathering more information about her process, the judges were so im-pressed that Hope made the final cut. "I didn't expect to be chosen. I was pretty surprised," she said.

She is hopeful those who visit the exhibition will al-low the artwork to speak to them personally. "People can make up their own mind. Mood has a lot to do with what the viewer will take away from a painting," she said

Hope Martin's exhibition, slated to run from June 1 to 17 at the Judith and Norman Alix Art Gallery, located at the corner of Lochiel and Christina Streets in Sarnia, will be the first of the three exhibits in the Look and See pop-up art exhibit.

By Bonnie Stevenson As the people of St. Clair Township already know, winter was not kind to some riverside structures. Downriver at the Walpole Island ferry dock, there was also cause for concern. Fortunately, the coming of spring is being accompanied by positive changes for the ferry company

Lorne Loulas, general manager for the Walpole Is-land ferry, says winter ice had the entire operation down for about two months and the dock itself sus-tained some ice damage. "The dock got a bit twisted and some of the boards got lifted," he said. However, the adverse weather conditions and man-made disruption on the river created a scenario that could have had a catastrophic effect on the company's main ferry.

Mr. Loulas explained the 82-ton City of Algonac (COA), the largest of the two ferries that operate from the Walpole Island facility, was iced in while berthed in the dock's north slip. Part of the ferry's hull became frozen to the dock while the rest remained free. "The ice breakers would go through and the water level would drop eight inches," he said, adding the unfrozen part of the COA's hull dropped along with the water level while the frozen section remained attached to the dock. "We luckily avoided ruin, but (at first) it looked like the boat twisted as the water level dropped," he said, adding that type of damage would have been disastrous for the company.

Upon closer inspection, the hull was shown to be undamaged. One side of the hull was completely frozen in place, allowing the opposite side to drop freely without deforming or damaging the hull.

Many residents who live along the St. Clair River believe winter shipping has caused damage since it be-gan a few years ago and Mr. Loulas believes the winter problems experienced at the ferry dock can be traced to shipping activities. "We don't receive any benefit from it, but we get damage," he said. "They should be covering the damage, not us." Mr. Loulas fears last winter's ice damage was not a full line Duty Free cher

Mr. Loulas fears last winter's ice damage was not a fluke and that future winters will bring costly repairs the company will have to absorb. "We fortunately escaped disaster last winter, but what about the next ice breaking season when we are parked. The irony is that Transport Canada charges the ferry line yearly ice breaking fees to cover costs for the cutters to come through. This adds insult to injury by added financial strains on the business during the winter when no reve-nue is coming in," he said. In past years, ice build-up has also been responsible for breaking windows on the COA and taking its toll on

the dock, even though ice mitigation formations on its north and south sides have done

much to defend against more se-vere damage. "The dock is fortified on the north and south sides with arbor stone that creates a cover," he said.

Mr. Loulas says the dock is due to be replaced this year, but soon, a redesign of the dock area will be undertaken to streamline the operation and allow for a faster turn -around time for ferry service. The original design of the dock area requires that vehicles board the ferries from the south along a double lane access road that takes a 90-degree turn as it approaches the ferry. Vehicles debarking from the ferry have to wait while customs agents process visitors at the exit gate just a few metres from the fer-ry slip. The slow exit of the vehicles from the ferry impedes the smooth progress of the next sailing.

However, Mr. Loulas says steps are being taken to speed up the turnaround. "Canada Customs has com-mitted to doubling up the staff to accommodate two lanes of departure traffic which has greatly improved


speed and efficiency," he said. "The redesign of the Canadian side is now under negotiations with Transport Canada," said Mr. Loulas. "The preliminary work is done." The new layout of the dock area calls for the double lane road to be converted to an entry and an exit lane, with the Canada Cus-toms building located at the end of the exit lane far enough from the ferry slips to clear vehicles off the dock and allow arriving vehicles to board smoothly. "As soon as the boat lands we can reload instantly, and the customs officers will be less rushed and more efficient by utilizing modern technology," he said. A more streamlined way of processing traffic is es-


pecially important to the ferry now, while the Sombra ferry is unavailable to handle overflow from the Bluewater Bridges. Mr. Loulas expects the summer will bring an unusually high volume of traffic to the Walpole Island ferry dock.

To handle the increase in customers, he says it's crucial that more captains be hired. "We have four captains right now, although one is currently on leave," he said. "We're looking for one or two more permanent ones and maybe some casual call-ins." The goal is to be able to run both ferries all day. Under the


