



Sewage Service Line Warranty **Protection Mail-Out**

The Township of St. Clair Council endorses the Service Line Warranties of Canada Inc. (SLWC), an independent organization to offer the National Service Line Warranty Program to homeowners located in our municipality. The Service Line Warranty program offers voluntary warranty protection at an affordable price for sewage lines in the event of a failure. This new optional warranty service mail-out began the first week of August, 2018. Homeowners should have received a letter in the mail from SLWC.

The SLWC Warranty Program offers protection against normal wear and tear, which is not covered under most traditional homeowners' policies. If lines break, leak or clog - SLWC will repair the line using local, licensed contractors who are familiar with local code and can ensure a timely response. This sewage program provides up to \$8,000 in coverage per incident. Additionally, the program has no annual or lifetime limits, service fees or deductibles - just protection when you need it most. SLWC provides first-class customer service with a 24/7 repair line and the use of licensed and thoroughly researched local contractors - keeping dollars in the local economy. Public Information Project Summary Courtright WWTP Odour Control Project and Final Effluent Reuse System

St. Clair Township is in the process of upgrading the odour control system and installing a final effluent reuse system at the Courtright WWTP. The Township has applied for funding through the FCM (Federation of Canadian Municipalities) grant to assist with the costs. Some of the benefits from these projects include:

- Improvement to public health
- Improvement to the community's
- quality of life
- Reduction of off-site odours
- Positive impact on nearby land and
- residents
- Increase in home value on neighbouring proper-
- Reduction in water consumption (estimated to be reduced by up to 80%)
- Decrease in facility operating and maintenance
- Operational improvements from the
- newly installed systems

The Courtright WWTP Odour Control Project is projected to be completed by Spring 2019. Tours of the facility are expected to be planned for late Spring

Township volunteer firefighter training receives financial support from Enbridge

St. Clair Township volunteer firefighters train diligently to ensure they can do their jobs safely, but obtaining the proper

training, skills and knowledge comes at a cost.
Enbridge Gas Distribution's St. Clair Township facility, in keeping with its *Project Assist* educational initiative, recently donated \$5,000 to the St. Clair Township Fire Department. Project Assist helps local fire departments purchase educational materials to help further firefighter training. This is the company's second Project Assist donation the township's fire

department has received.

Fire Chief Walt Anderson says the fire department's training regimen is extensive and the welcome donation will help support its operation. "The Township of St. Clair has a very proactive training program, including the start this year of own training academy, where our recruits will be fully trained and certified before responding as part of our firefighting crew," he said. "We have a large area to cover and a diverse set of hazards that we must be prepared to deal with. One of the ways we do that is by consistent and standard training throughout our six stations, coordinated by our Deputy Chief Steve Bicum. These additional funds from Enbridge will be put

Steve Bicum. These additional funds from Enbridge will be put to excellent use in training our firefighters to protect our families, homes and businesses in St. Clair Township."

Ross Nichols, Ontario Fire Marshall and Chair of the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council, expressed appreciation for Enbridge's support of local fire departments. "Ongoing firefighter training enables fire departments to deliver emergency services efficiently and to ensure firefighter safety is maintained," he said. "The support that Project Assist provides is very helpful to the fire departments who receive it, and the volunteer firefighters who benefit from these educational resources. I very much appreciate Enbridge partnering with the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council to make this program possible."

The St. Clair Fire Department covers approximately 600 square kilometres. protecting a population of about 15 000.

The St. Clair Fire Department covers approximately 600 square kilometres, protecting a population of about 15,000. The fire company is comprised of a chief, deputy chief, and about 170 volunteer firefighters who staff six stations across the township. In addition to responding to residential and commercial emergencies, township firefighters must also respond to emergencies in a portion of "Chemical Valley". Facilities within their coverage area include heavy petrochemical refineries, polyethylene and polypropylene manufacturing, a high-pressure gas storage facility, an ammonia plant, and three co-generation power plants.

The happy hum of 14 sewing machines and the quiet murmur of light-hearted conversation filled the Sombra Community Centre on July 23 as 22 volunteers gathered to finish off 48 quilts for donation to various charities.

The quilting bee was organized to bind the edges of the quilts which had been made over the winter by award-winning quilter Evelyn Evers, Sharon Dechene, and Jane McGill. "We made quilts every Monday but we didn't take a day to bind them," said Evelyn. Lambton G. S. demolition project now underway

JMX representative Jason McGuire said JMX has worked across Canada to bring down large structures such as city high rises and large industrial buildings, including some structures in 'Chemical Valley'

Asbestos removal efforts are slated to begin in early September. Once the facility is clear, equipment will be removed and selected buildings are slated to be demolished between 2019 and 2020. The two west-most chimneys will be brought down in mid-2019, with the east chimney following in early $20\overline{20}$.

Mr. Roorda assured council that, throughout the process, OPG will work closely with JMX to ensure the demolition plan minimizes the impact on the local community and a project office will remain onsite. Safety precautions will to be taken will include the installation of two fire hydrants along the St. Clair Parkway.

When asked by council what will be done with the debris left from the demolition of the buildings and infrastructure, Mr. McGuire said as the plant comes down, its various components will be sorted and shipped to appropriate handlers and recyclers. The concrete will be crushed onsite and used to fill the voids left on the site to address safety issues.

To address the noise created by the crusher, Mr. McGuire said it would be placed where it would not

McGuire said it would be placed where it would not cause undue disturbance to surrounding residents.

Mr. Roorda says OPG is now developing plans for the final appearance of the plant frontage. When the designated structures have been demolished and the debris cleared away, the waterfront trail agreement will be updated and the water channels connecting the plant to the river will either be fenced in or filled in to mitigate the risk to public safety. A rendering of the post-demolition site is also being developed. also being developed.

The demolition project is phase two of the Lambton G.S. project and Mr. Roorda noted phase three would involve environmental restoration.

The Lambton G. S. site covers over 1,1000 acres and includes a wooded corridor containing over 23,500 native trees and a wildlife habitat that was developed under the Biodiversity Management Plan, approved in 1995. The facility received the Regional Corporate Habitat of the Year Award from the Wildlife Habitat Council in 2012. The tall grass prairie plantation was cared for in partnership with the Rural Lambton Stewardship Network.

A public information session is scheduled for the Courtright Community Center (Silverdome) on Thursday, Oct. 4. The time for this event is pend-

will present a major financial challenge to make the upgrades and do the work it needs. The same is true for the golf course club house. Road rehabilitation on the parkway and the trail is also needed.

To fund these projects, we need to explore funding opportunities that will help us get these projects done without undue impact on the municipal budget."


