Mail-in ballot a convenient way to vote

St. Clair Township residents will be able to vote for their next municipal council and school trustees in the privacy of their own home using mail-in ballots. Anyone who does not receive their ballot by October 9 should call the township office at 519-867-2021.

Residents are encouraged to fill out their personalized ballot according to the instructions on the top of the ballot, then place it in the secrecy envelope and seal it closed. Please ensure you sign the declaration but **DO NOT** enclose it inside your secrecy envelope. Once those two steps are complete, place **both** your separate signed declaration and sealed



secrecy envelope into the pre-paid return envelope, then seal that envelope. To return your ballot, drop it into the mail. You can also hand deliver the envelope to the St. Clair Township Civic Centre at 1155 Emily Street in Mooretown during regular business hours,

town during regular business hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (except holidays), until voting day, October 22, and up to 8:00 p.m. on that

Please keep in mind that any ballots arriving after October 22 will not be counted, so it is recommended that they be mailed back to the municipal office by October 17, 2018.

Sewage Service Line Warranty Protection Mail-Out

The Township of St. Clair Council endorses the Service Line Warranties of Canada Inc. (SLWC), an independent organization to offer the National Sérvice Line Warranty Program to homeowners located in our municipality. The Service Line Warranty program offers voluntary warranty protection at an affordable price for sewage lines in the event of a failure. This new optional warranty service mail-out began the first week of August, 2018. Homeowners should have received a letter in the mail from SLWC.

The SLWC Warranty Program offers protection against normal wear and tear, which is not covered under most traditional homeowners' policies. If lines break, leak or clog - SLWC will repair the line using local, licensed contractors who are familiar with local code and can ensure a timely response. This sewage program provides up to \$8,000 in coverage per incident. Additionally, the program has no annual or lifetime limits, service fees or deductibles - just protection when you need it most. SLWC provides first-class customer service with a 24/7 repair line and the recognition of the response of the recognition of the recognition. licensed and thoroughly researched local contractors -keeping dollars in the local economy. If you're planning to dig anywhere on your property this fall, all it will take is one simple call to make sure the buried pipes and cable under the surface will not be damaged or severed. Cutting a power cable or gas line can be a dangerous thing for you or whoever is doing the work, and any infrastructure that is damaged could prove costly for you.

Water utility appointments require 48 hours notification

St. Clair Township By-Law 41 of 2017 user fees requires that property owners provide at least 48 hours in advance before scheduling appointments with the Public Works department to avoid service fees.

Streetlight replacement Corunna Downtown September 2018 - October 2018

Streetlights along Lyndoch Street between Cameron St and Beckwith Street will be replaced. During these installations, 5 or 6 streetlights will be out at a time for 1-2 days.

Changes to recycling collection Attention: St Clair Township residents January 1, 2019

Beginning January 1, 2019, recycling will only be collected in blue recycling boxes. *Clear or blue bags will no longer be accepted*.

Blue boxes are available to purchase at the Civic Centre Public Works Department and will be sold at a *reduced price* of \$5.75 starting September 1, 2018 until January 1, 2020.

Crossing guards - St. Clair Township

The Township of St. Clair requires a fill-in crossing guard to assist school children crossing in Brigden. The work involves one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon on school days. The current compensation is \$30.55 per day. This position will be on a "call in" basis and hours will vary widely depending on need. Electric vehicle charging stations now available throughout county

Each year, fully electric vehicles are becoming increasingly popular offerings from almost every car manufácturer. But until now, the usefulness of these vehicles was limited to short haul excursions due to the scarcity of recharging stations. A new Lambton County initiative has seen the installation of 13 new publicly-available charging

stations at locations throughout the county.

Lambton County Warden Bill Weber says the county is in the process of increasing the availability of these stations as a way of encouraging the use of these 'green' powered vehicles. the use of these 'green' powered vehicles. "These charging stations represent an opportunity for our community to generate a positive impact on local greenhouse gas emissions," he said. "This series of installations also substantially expands the local network of charging stations available to electric vehicle drivers in Lambton."

The stations were partially funded to the tune of \$104,000 by the Ontario Ministry of Transportation. They operate on the FLO network, a Canada-wide chárging station network with over 2,000 charging stations. A media release issued by Lambton County says payment at the charging stations is easiest by using an FLO payment card, which links to a user's credit card.

St. Clair Township has yet to host a charging station, but Mayor Arnold says they will be coming as part of the county's future installation projects. "Unfortunately, St. Clair Township did not receive any (stations) during this initial round of installations, but as additional funding becomes available, the township will become part of this county wide natural." of this county-wide Herwork, ... He noted the township currently has two charging stations for electric scooters; one at the Mooretown Sports Complex and one a the civic square in Corunna.

Oversized load corridor to benefit area economy

Recent funding of \$1.2 million has been received by Lambton County to help pay for the new oversized load corridor (OLC) that is currently under construction. The corridór is a designated protected route along existing highways that connects local industrial fabricators to Sarnia harbour. This will allow the unimpeded export and shipment of oversized products to and from fabricators and Sarnia-Lambton's industrial base.

In a presentation recently made to Ontario Minister of Infrastructure Monte McNaughton, local representatives from Lambton County, St. Clair Township, Sarnia, the Sarnia-Lambton Industrial Alliance, and Sarnia-Lambton Economic Partnership listed the corridor's benefits to the community to include: improved competitiveness of local fabricators and large industry by reducing shipping costs, creating new jobs, and increasing the potential for the export of valuable locally manufactured vessels, reactors, and equipment modules.

The minister was told Sarnia-Lambton fabrication shops will be able to accommodate the needs of Alberta, the east coast, U.S. gulf coast, and international markets, amounting to billions of dollars in fabrication contracts over the next 25 years. Highly skilled labour will be required to achieve these fabrication projects and Sarnia-Lambton facilities are well-established and will be able to support the manufacture of these prod-

St. Clair Township Mayor Steve Arnold, who was part of the delegation to meet with Minister McNaughton, says, "It will be good for the township and I have supported the concept with the Minister of Infrastructure and the PA for the premier's office. Both the Lambton County Council and St. Clair Township Council have pledged financial support for the project. It is meant to provide jobs for this township in the industrial park as well as in the Brigden area." Mayor Arnold added

Ghost towns of St. Clair Township - Duthil

The pre-amalgamation municipalities of Moore and Sombra Township once boasted many small communities spread out across the land. Some were merely crossroads and others, such as Becher, still exist in some form, and others are marked by the skeletal remains of old buildings.

But their names live on. In Sombra, the names Avonry, Bickford, Henry's Corner and Charlemont still linger in the memories of our older residents, just as Moore residents recall Ladysmith, Kimball, Cromar, and Sykeston. They were all an important part of the development and history of the municipality we now call St. Clair Township.

One of these important communities was Duthill at the intersection of Holt Line and Duthill Sideroad. First settled in 1840, Duthill boasted a strong Scottish and Presbyterian presence, so

it's no surprise the name Duthill paid tribute to a parish in Invernesshire, Scotland $\,$

The first settler was James Reid, although the Grant and Tulloch families were also early settlers and still have descendants living in the area. As it grew, Duthill had a post office, a school, a United Church, a cemetery, and a ferry that spanned the Sydenbarn

Of special interest to those who traveled the roads near Duthil was an old elm tree that stood in the middle of the intersection. It became a popular fixture of downtown Duthil. It was also an important survey point and reference point in the township. The 18 metre tall, two metre wide tree survived until 1951 when it was deemed a traffic hazard and cut down.


