

New council to be sworn in

The new St. Clair Township Council will be sworn in during council's regular meeting on Dec. 3 at 5:30 p.m. It will include: Mayor Steve Arnold, who won with 3,239 votes out of the 5,630 that were received; Deputy Mayor Steve Miller, 2,766 out of 5,476; Ward I Councillors Tracy Kingston, Jim DeGurse, and Pat Brown; and Ward II Councillors Rose Atkins and Bill Myers.

Winter parking by-law-Dec. 1

The winter parking by-law is in effect as of Dec. 1. Under this by-law, it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This by-law ensures that snow plow crews can do their job efficiently without having to slow down to avoid parked vehicles.

Property owners are also reminded that it is against the law to shovel snow out onto public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless vehicle collisions.

Two more "impaired" designations lifted from river

The St. Clair River is getting healthier thanks to measures that have been put in place through the efforts of groups like the Canadian Remedial Action Plan Implementation Committee.

The latest signs that the river is recovering came in a letter to council from Michael Goffin, Regional Director General for Ontario Region. The letter noted that, based on a comprehensive review by Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks, two "impaired" designations have been lifted. Reports from these groups indicate Beach Closing Beneficial Use Impairment and Restrictions on Dredging Activities Beneficial Use Impairment have been designated as "not impaired" for the Canadian portion of the St. Clair River Area of Concern. Mr. Goffin called these achievements "important environmental milestones."

Water utility appointments require 48 hours notification

St. Clair Township By-Law 41 of 2017 user fees requires that property owners provide at least 48 hours in advance of scheduling appointments with the Public Works department to avoid service fees.

Streetlight replacement Corunna Downtown

November 2018 - December 2018

Streetlights downtown will be replaced. During these installations, 5 or 6 streetlights will be out at a time for 1-2 days. Questions or concerns please contact Public Works.

Changes to recycling collection January 1, 2019

Beginning January 1, 2019, recycling will only be collected in blue recycling boxes. *Clear or blue bags will no longer be accepted*. Blue boxes are available to purchase at the Civic Centre and will be sold at a reduced price of \$5.75 starting September 1, 2018 until January 1, 2020.

NEEDED! Crossing guards - St. Clair Township

The Township of St. Clair requires a fill-in crossing guard to assist school children crossing in Brigden. The work involves one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon on school days. The current compensation is \$30.55 per day. This position will be on a "call in" basis and hours will vary widely depending on need. All homeowners are reminded to clear recreational sports equipment (e.g. basketball nets, goal nets, etc.) off and away from roads and streets. Please contact St. Clair Township Public Works with any questions.

St. Clair River Trail winter closure

The St. Clair River Trail will be closed annually from Nov. 30 to April 15. No winter maintenance will be completed during this period under By-Law 45 of 2018.

Courtright WWTP Odour Control Project and Final Effluent Reuse System

St. Clair Township is in the process of upgrading the Odour Control System and installing a Final Effluent Reuse System at the Courtright WWTP. The township has been approved for funding through the FCM (Federation of Canadian Municipalities) grant to assist with the costs. Some of the benefits from these projects include:

- Improvement to public health
- Improvement to the community's quality of life
- Reduction of off-site odours
- Positive impact on nearby land and residents
- Increase in home value on neighbouring properties
- Reduction in water consumption (estimated to be reduced by up to 80%)
- Decrease in facility operating and maintenance costs
- Operational improvements from the newly installed systems

The Courtright WWTP Odour Control Project is projected to be completed by *spring 2019*.

Tours of the facility are expected to be planned for late spring 2019.

During construction you may notice increased traffic on site.



HERITAGE CORNER



Memories of Skating on Talfourd Creek, Froomefield, Ont. By Alice Gibb

"Oh, I wish I had a river I could skate away on....." - Joni Mitchell

Every winter, youngsters in Froomefield started watching their thermometers with great interest. This was still the era of Fahrenheit temperatures in the 1950s and early 60s. We wanted the numbers to fall far below the freezing point. The reason - we were waiting for Talfourd Creek to turn to ice and the skating season to begin!

Talfourd Creek, which wound through the Sarnia Chippewas reserve and apparently on to the Moore Township settlement of Logierait, spilled into the St. Clair right beside the Canadian Oil refinery (now Shell Canada). In fact, that last section of the creek rarely turned to solid ice, likely due to the chemicals - and perhaps hot emissions - from the refinery. But upstream, often by late December, we had a skating rink like no other.

My mother would bundle up my brother and myself in layers of clothing from mittens to thick scarves to double socks. We'd head back through the vacant lot, owned by a Catholic order which had once planned to build a school in Froomefield, and down to the creek behind the Ryans'. Someone would have pulled logs over to the bank of the creek, where you could change out of boots and into your skates. On good days, the ice would be cleaned off and there would be a roaring fire where you could warm your fingers and toes whenever they seemed on the verge of frostbite.

Admittedly, there was a division of sorts on the frozen creek. The boys, particularly the teenage boys, were there for a reason - to play games of pickup hockey. Numbers were never a problem: the Havers family had 11 children and the Jack and Alice Ryan family had ten offspring. Jack Ryan, the patriarch, often played hockey along with the boys and he was exceptionally handy with a hockey stick.

We girls, and the younger children, usually stayed out of the

way. We would leisurely skate down the creek, towards the St. Clair. It was a winding creek, with lots of trees overhanging the banks. It was easy to pretend you were exploring in the wild. The girls would join hands and we usually traveled as far as the back of the Froomefield United Church Cemetery. There came a point where the ice wasn't quite as firm and you started to see signs of pollution along the banks. While I can recall skaters getting wet feet, I don't remember anyone actually falling through the ice into deeper waters.

We had our section of the creek and kids from the reserve (Aamjiwnaang) had their section, and we rarely trespassed on each other's territory. We vaguely knew that Talfourd Creek had been named for the brothers - Froome and Field Talfourd - who founded our village. I'm not sure any of us really knew how far the creek wound into Moore Township. Others had heard the story of the albino turtles once discovered in Talfourd Creek, and knew that those turtles were a hoax devised by the enterprising David family.

After two or three hours of skating, noses, cheeks and toes would be frozen. We'd return to the logs, take off our skates and dash home, knowing that hot chocolate and a warm house would be waiting.

Like Joni Mitchell, I still sometimes wish I had a river (or creek) to go to.

Alice Gibb, now of London, Ontario, was born and raised in Froomefield. Several generations of her Gibb and Simpson families farmed nearby in Moore Township. Her mother, Evelyn, was Tweedsmuir curator for the Froomefield Women's Institute and this spawned Alice's interest in local history. Alice has written for and edited six township histories, including Euphemia Township's history. Over the years she has written history columns for publications in London, Seaforth, Lucan and Ailsa Craig. She still misses the St. Clair River and long ago rowboat trips to Stag Island.

Changes to smoking act restrict use of cannabis and vapour products

The Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017 now restricts the use of cannabis and vapour products wherever the smoking of tobacco products is prohibited.

This includes: enclosed public spaces; enclosed work-places, including work vehicles; common areas of multiunit dwellings like apartment and condo buildings; child care centres and home child care locations; spectator arenas hosting sports and entertainment; motor vehicles where children under age 16 are present; outdoor

grounds of hospitals and provincial buildings; within nine metres of entrances to long-term care homes; sport fields, playgrounds, and school properties plus 20 metres from the perimeter; bar and restaurant patios plus nine metres from the perimeter; outdoor grounds of recreation centres plus 20 metres from the perimeter.


