Multipurpose sports pad proposed for Sombra Park

Representatives from the Sombra Sports and Recreation Committee presented a proposal to council regarding a multipurpose sports pad to be used for several sports in the summer and an ice pad during the winter when the weather is right. The expected cost of the project is \$150,000 with the committee providing \$75,000 and the township providing the remaining \$75,000.

The proposal was supported in principal by council subject to approval from the Director of Community Services Kendal Lindsay. The \$75,000 township contribution will come from the Environment and Education Fund.

St. Clair River Run update

The annual St. Clair River Run was the subject of a visit to council from River Run spokesperson Ben Hazzard, who announced that a half-marathon will be added to the event this year to mark its 10th anniversary. Mr. Hazzard noted in a 2018 survey, survey takers named the River Run as the best in the area and said they would recommend it to their friends.

#### Notice to property owners to destroy noxious weeds

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 13, 16, and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$80.) The cooperation of all land owners is earnestly solicited.


No through traffic will be allowed at dig sites. Local traffic only will be able to enter from intersections north or south of each dig site. No Detour Route signs will be

### Blue box update

January 1, 2019 - The elimination of clear/blue plastic bags was made by the Contractor and the recycling industry. The plastic bags cannot be recycled and create issues for the sorting facilities. Previous companies said they could recycle 'plastic film' but the market shows there is no demand for it. The previous company (Waste Management) attempted to sort the plastic film at their Cambridge facility, but that plant burned down a few years ago. Therefore, the new processing company (Emterra) has stated that no plastic film can be used during collection and that only recycled material placed in recycling containers will be picked up.

### PMC donation supports important SCRCA safety program

The St. Clair Region Conservation Authority has received \$5,000 from Plains Midstream Canada (PMC) to support the authority's Spring Water Awareness Program. The program teaches children about the hazards of spring floodwater and the importance of avoiding dangerous situations.

The program addresses a danger that often occurs in many SCRCA areas where rivers, ponds, streams and ditches are found. During the spring thaw, local watercourses can pose a greater threat than other times of the year. Children who are accustomed to playing around watercourses in the summer may face unstable ice, rapidly rising water levels, strong currents, and frigid water temperatures during the thaw.

"It is vitally important children understand the reasons why we must stay away from the high, cold waters during the spring thaw," said Sharon Nethercott, conservation coordinator for the SCRCA. ### Moore Museum receives funding to build insulated walls

The storage of museum artifacts often presents a challenge to those entrusted with their care. Temperature extremes, such as the ones we experience during our Canadian winters, can badly damage metal and wooden objects such as furniture and vintage vehi-

The newest structures on the museum site are two insulated storage buildings that house large artifacts. The insulation ensures that the materials from which the precious items are made are not subjected to the temperatures that cause expansion and contraction that weaken and damage the items over time.

The buildings, insulated on three sides, are adjoined to the large Francis E. Shaw Exhibition Building, which is not insulated and cannot contribute to the degree of insulation the new buildings require. Both adjoining walls had to be insulated, but finding the funds to pay for the materials was an issue. The labour, as

### English serving piece morphs from bone china to bunnies

Files and photos from Moore Museum

Those of us with a few decades of life behind us, as well as a few members of the less "experienced" generations, will likely recall eating soft boiled eggs from an

During the Elizabethan period in the 1600s, the English ruling class would use silver egg cups. This fashion was quickly adapted by the working class, who used wooden eggcups to mimic upper class customs.

By the Victorian Era, egg cups decorated with the most popular chinaware patterns, were being made by china companies. China egg cups were also available in sets complete with a tray and spoons. Some egg cups had

fictorian era china egg cups.

pedestals while others sat flat on the table, like the floralpatterned set shown left. The plate holding the four egg cups has round indentations to ensure the cups remain in place during their trip to the table.

Egg cup designs further developed during the Art Deco period of the 1920s and 30s, including some bearing cheerful sayings like "Morning Fresh". In the midtwentieth century, images of movie stars, cartoon characters, and famous literary char-

acters were used to decorate them.

Cups designed to appeal to children, such as the examples shown right, may have been intended to encourage fussy eaters to finish their breakfast.

Today, egg cups are still found in many households and Kid-appeal are often sold in many different materials and whimsical designs especially are many different breakfast. signs, especially around Easter.



As much as credit for this serving piece can arguably be claimed by the British upper class, there is proof egg cups have been around a while longer. During the excavation of the ancient Roman city of Pompeii, eggcups have been discovered preserved by layers of ash and la-




#### Lambton County Junior Optimists brainstorm novel event ideas

### St. Clair Region Conservation Authority annual meeting yields two award winners

The annual meeting of the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, now in its 56th year of operation, saw the election of the new 2019 SCRCA executive and the presentation of two Conservation Awards. It also saw the election of a new chair as former chair Steve Arnold stepped down from the position he has held for seven years as well as a total of 14 years as a member of the executive committee.

In his final remarks, Mr. Arnold, who also serves as mayor of St. Clair Township, noted the importance of SCRCA initiatives such as the fish monitoring project and the environmental importance of endangered local species like the eastern spiny softshelled turtles, the eastern fox snake and the Butlers Gartersnake, wildlife that serves as a bellwether for the general health of the environment. "They are the candle in the coal mine," he said

He also reviewed ongoing SCRCA projects including mass tree seeding and planting, and the strategic planning that will help carry the authority into the future. And foremost, he referred to the flood prevention and water management projects that are the heart of the SCRCA's original mandate. "We're still expand-

ing the flood proofing role and project management along the shorelines," he said.

areas of the river identified as "impaired". To date, the work has resulted in eight of the 12 identified impaired areas being cleaned up and work continuing in the effort to restore the river to an unimpaired state. Mr. Randell has also worked with groups such as the Lambton Stewardship Network and the Friends of the St. Clair River.

Another award was presented to the Lambton Shores Phragmites Community Group. The volunteer group was recognized for its ongoing efforts to limit the spread of phragmites, an aggressive, invasive plant that kills off native species as it spreads. Volunteers understand the damage this fast-growing reed can do to the environment and to the beaches along the Lake Huron shoreline. A member of the group also works with the "Inperwash Phrag Fighters"

member of the group also works with the "Ipperwash Phrag Fighters".

The SCRCA, with funding provided by the County of Lambton, is the coordinator of the Lambton County Partnership to increase awareness of this growing threat to indigenous species and biodiversity of wetlands. Phragmites also has a "restricted" designation under the provincial Invasive Species Act. 
