



## Lambton G. S. demolition plan presented to council

One of St. Clair Township's most recognizable land-marks will soon be just a memory as demolition on the down in April 2020. However, Mr. Roorda says the meth-Lambton G. S. site continues. Ontario Power Generation representatives, Project Manager Dan Roorda and Corporate Relations Officer Steve Repergel, recently attended a meeting of council to present an update on demolition progress and the projected sequence of actions that will be taken to remove the station from the site

Mr. Roorda says large areas such as the coal handling area, conveyor, and parking garage, plus structures behind the north end of the power house and the inside of the powerhouse, have been removed, accounting for about 30 per cent of the project.

Demolition work that has been done to date is only partially evident from the St. Clair Parkway, but Mr. Roorda says this will change later this year. "We'll see a lot more visible work being done in August of this year."

A project schedule diagram that was part of the presentation showed that asbestos abatement work is underway in unit #1 at the north end of the station and will continue south through the four units, with expected completion by January of 2020. Demolition of the turbine hall will be done unit by unit from north to south, and the demolition of the pumphouses in front of the building are slated for August of this year.

od to be used for this purpose has not been decided. The decision to implode the stacks with explosives or to bring them down using mechanical means will be made closer to the time of their demolition. "The plans to take them down get developed along the way," he said.

If explosives are used, the stacks will be taken down much like a tree is felled. The specific direction of its fall will be controlled by weakening it on the chosen side of the fall prior to implosion. Mr. Roorda explained the north chimney would possibly be directed to fall toward the northwest.

Mayor Arnold asked about the potential for the creation of a large dust cloud should the stack be felled with explosives, especially in a northwest direction, which would carry the cloud across the river. Mr. Roor-da assured him that this scenario has been taken into account. "The wind that day will determine a lot," he said

The final result of the demolition will be a return of the site to a natural setting. The area where the station was removed will be made to give the impression of a park site. "Our intent is to bring the site down to slabon-grade...we'll remove everything above the concrete slab the building is built on," said Mr. Roorda. He added the appearance of the site will look much like a park.

As the project continues, the need for environmental mitigation is being looked after by JMX Demolition and Environmental Contractors, but Mr. Roorda says the work will be closely monitored by OPG. This work will include the prevention or minimization of spills to the environment, noise, dust and vibration as well as any discharges to the St. Clair River. Vibration is to be ad-dressed through careful design of demolition plans and the use of tools such as vibration absorbing mats. Waste materials will be categorized and sent to the

appropriate disposal sites such as scrap yards, certified

offsite landfills and recycling facilities.

#### Water utility appointments require 48 hours notification

St. Clair Township By-Law 41 of 2017 user fees requires that property owners provide at least 48 hours in advance of scheduling appointments with the water utility department to avoid service fees.

## Storm culvert replacements

St. Clair Parkway The St. Clair Parkway, between Port Lambton and Mooretown will have road closures for one to two days between April 15 and May 3 due to the replacement of storm culvert pipes.

No through traffic will be allowed at dig sites. Local traffic only will be able to enter from intersections north or south of each dig site. No Detour Route signs will be installed due to the short duration of the projects.

If discolouration of the water continues after 10-15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works.







### Dig Safe flag raising helps raise awareness of the importance of locating buried cables/pipes

The Dig Safe ceremonial flag raising was held at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre on April 23. The event was held to make property owners aware of the importance of having all buried infrastructure, such as power and gas lines and water lines, located before digging for any reason on the property.

The Dig Safe flag raising at 1155 Emily Street in Mooretown included members of the public, contractors, subcontractors, and other interested parties.

With the home improvement season and a seasonal increase in construction projects at hand, the event serves several purposes, including: the promotion of infor-mation sharing and the creation of Dig Safe networking contacts; the reduction in the direct costs of damage repairs and the restoration of service; the reduction of indirect societal costs, including injury or death, traffic disruption, diversion of valuable emergency services, envi-

ronmental and economic impacts, etc.; the maintenance of the integrity of essential services including vital municipal and utility infrastructure; and the protection of com-munities from threats to health and security.

The event was organized by the Ontario Regional Com-mon Ground Alliance (ORCGA) in cooperation with St. Clair Township.

All property owners and contractors are urged to know who to call to have all buried infrastructure located and marked prior to any digging.

### Training is a year 'round pursuit for St. Clair Township volunteer firefighters

On a bright, sunny day in April, volunteer firefighters from the Becher and Port Lambton fire stations gathered at the Lambton College Fire School training facility on LaSalle Line to participate in an emergency scenario that would challenge their knowledge and help them hone their skills. A few of them were new to the job and for them, the training was crucial to their ability to respond safely and effectively in whatever emergencies they may be called to attend. St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walt Anderson says these training sessions are held throughout the year. six times a year with two stations each time,' he said, adding attendance at these exercises is important because issues arise during this practical training that may not have been covered sufficiently during regular training. Bryan Kraayenbrink, a volunteer firefighter

with the Port Lambton station, says the train-ing is important to the overall function of the firefighters when they respond to a real emer-gency. "It's all about teamwork," he said. "It's good to affiliate with firefighters from the halls we'll meet at the scene." The firefighters began in a ladder truck

stationed away from the scene of the emer-gency. Once summoned, they arrived and began a routine that not only helps them fight the emergency, but keeps tabs on each fire-fighter on the scene. The commander as-sessed the scene, developed an incident plan, and started to assign teams to various tasks.


Chief Anderson explained an accountability

person is chosen to oversee a scheduling system that tracks the location of each firefighter. Once the commander assigns the firefighters to their teams, they check in with the accountability person who places their identification tags in the appropriate team area on the assignment sheet, **shown above**. For instance, the tags of the two firefighters who are assigned to staff the rapid response station will be placed on a square designated for that position. "Every person who goes in has to report to the accountability person," said Chief Anderson. Some tags are colour coded to indicate special tasks with green indicating those assigned to the "hot zone" and yellow indicating support firefighters. Throughout the emergency, all firefighters are required to stay in touch with the accountability person at regular inter-vals. When the emergency is over, firefighters must report to the accountability person where their tags are moved to the "robab" location.

'rehab" location.

Chief Anderson notes that the accountability system varies only slightly from department to department. "We try to keep compatible with the rest of the county," he said. Continued on page 11

They also spoke about the role this "liquid gold" has played throughout history and the significance it had on the lives of First Nations people and the pioneers. Visitors not only enjoyed maple syrup taffy but they were also able to enjoy scenic horse-drawn wagon rides along the park's beautiful trails.

Hunter Middaugh chose Waterspouts as his subject of inquiry and his display presented a wellresearched explanation of his project.

tion of his project. He says he was a bit undecided about the subject he would choose. "I thought about a volcano," he said.

But waterspouts took his interest and he developed an especially insightful way to explain this odd natural phenomenon. "I thought if you combine a beach and a tornado and water, you get a water spout," he said, adding waterspouts sometimes develop on land and move out into the water.

When asked how he researched his subject, he said, "I looked on Google." Hunter was <complex-block>

demonstrate the development of waterspouts using a two-litre bottle containing water. Holding the bottle upright, he quickly rotated it in tight circles until a tornadolike vortex formed in the center.

When he's not delving into scientific curiosities like waterspouts, Hunter says he plays a game called Beyblades. These are the modern version of spinning tops that can be fitted with various parts and are used in play battle. "I'm a pro launcher," said Hunter.

The young scientist has already given some thought to the future. He's considering two careers so far. "I'd like to be a train driver or the best Beyblades player in the world," he said.


