Broadband Internet expansion in Lambton County announced

The lack of Internet service to underserved homes and businesses in Lambton County has been a problem for years now, but solutions to date have proven to be financially prohibitive or impossible for many.

But a new targeted broadband project recently announced by Southwestern Integrated Fibre Technology Inc. (SWIFT), in partnership with the provincial and federal governments, may improve access to high speed Internet for homes and businesses throughout the county.

The \$11.2 million project will focus on connecting underserviced homes and businesses where current service does not meet the universal service objectives of the CRTC (Canadian Radio-television Telecommunications Commission).

According to a Lambton County media release, this project is part of the first wave of deployment from SWIFT. It notes, "Lessons learned from the experience in Lambton County will be used to ensure success as the project is carried out across the rest of Southwestern Ontario."

Lambton County Warden Bill Weber said, "The vision for this project began in 2005 and we are proud to be included in the early part of its implementation."

In St. Clair Township, there has already been an ongoing fact-finding effort by council to bring a workable, affordable solution to township residents who are underserviced or unable to access the Internet from their homes. Mayor Steve Arnold says this announcement offers some hope that answers will be found to this important issue. "(So far) we haven't been able to find out much more, however we are optimistic that this announcement will benefit us as we continue in our quest for dependable high speed Internet for all of our township's residents," he said. "I think it is good to have (Lambton-Kent MPP and Ontario Minister of Infrastructure) Monte McNaughton and (Sarnia-Lambton MPP) Bob Bailey on board...We've been told there will be more information released to us as the plans are finalized."

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 13, 16, and 23, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the municipality of the Township of St. Clair are destroyed throughout the season, the municipality may enter upon said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the cost against the land, plus an administration charge as set out in the Act. (Minimum charge per parcel is \$80.)

New waste/recycling collection changes July 1st, 2019

New changes to recycling and waste collection will begin Monday, July 1, 2019. Please refer to mailing sent out at the beginning of June.

<u>Please Note: Clarifications</u>
1. Lambton Line and Kimball Rd. are included in rural

roads collected on both sides.

2. Your recycling day may have changed, but the recycling rotation week number has not, except for St. Clair Parkway between Courtright Line and Bickford Line (now week 2).

On the current Recycling and Waste Calendar, the week beginning Sunday, June 30th, will remain in rotation order as week 2, followed by week 1, week 2, etc.

Sewer Main Flushing

Public Works will be flushing sewer mains connected to the St. Clair Township Sewer System, during the hours of: 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

For current areas affected, refer to stclairtownship.ca During this maintenance procedure, you may notice some gurgling noises in your drains.

If conditions persist after 24-48 hours of normal use, please notify Public Works.

Hydrant flushing

Public Works will be undertaking annual flushing of fire hydrants connected to the St. Clair Township Water Distribution System, during the hours of: 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Until Fall 2019

For current areas affected, refer to stclairtownship.ca During this maintenance procedure, you may notice some water discolouration using your taps, flushing toilets, doing laundry etc., as some sediment may be drawn into your residence. We recommend that you run the cold water tap for a few minutes or until the discolouration disappears. If discolouration of the water continues after 10-15 minutes of normal use, please notify Public Works.

St. Clair Township By-Law 41 of 2017 user fees requires that property owners provide at least 48 hours in advance of scheduling appointments with the water utility department to avoid service fees.


Do we care about our community?

New playground facility at Stewart Park now accessible to special needs children

Stewart Park on Hill Street in Corunna now has one of two accessible playgrounds in Corunna that offer fun for special needs children. The park was dedicated on June 14 with the enthusiastic assistance of a group of Grade 2/3 students from Col. Cameron Public School. The park will soon have a paved walkway that will facilitate easy access for wheelchairs. Director of Community Services Kendall Lindsay says the walkway will be completed when the ground has dried up enough to work on. He added the existing playground equipment, which had been vandalized, was also out of date regarding safety requirements. At the dedication, MPP representative Eric Nixon (shown below on the left) presented a plaque to the township commemorating the provincial Trillium Grant of \$39,200 that was contributed to pay for the new play equipment, which includes a special gated swing and lowered play stations.

The plight of cancer patients who need expensive drug therapies but lack the resources to pay for them is being addressed by a London-based initiative, ACT Now. Its benefits are far reaching, as St. Clair Township cancer patient Deb Vandendool has discovered.

In March, the Vandendools teamed up with many lo-cal volunteers and the Optimist Club of Sombra Township to hold a fundraising event at the Wilkesport Community Centre that included entertainment and auc-

A crowd of 280 people turned out for the occasion and Optimist Phil Johnston says the auctions were especially successful. One generous person bid on a pie that cost him \$250, then auctioned off pieces of the pie at about \$110 per slice. "People there that evening said they'd like to start a fundraiser like that (on a regular basis)," said Mr. Johnston. When the money was tallied at the end of the evening, the event had garnered \$30,200 for ACT Now.

Deb, whose diagnosis is metastatic breast cancer, Deb, whose diagnosis is metastatic breast cancer, says she is grateful for the support the event inspired throughout the community. "They're so generous," she said. "The community is so open." The Vandendools spearheaded a similar event in 2017, but Deb says the recent event received even greater support. "It almost doubled what we raised two years ago," she said. Also on hand for the occasion was Jim Sulston, representing Heartland Farm Mutual, who presented ACT Now with a cheque for \$2,000 from the company's iHeart community fund.

ACT Now was formed in 2011 by Dr. Kylea Potvin, a medical oncologist with the London Regional Cancer Program, who found it unacceptable when she heard about the difficult situation some cancer patients face when trying to acquire expensive therapies. She and a group of her peers set out to help alleviate the problem through fundraising and advocating for support from community corporations and businesses.

Community Better Challenge kicks off fundraising drive



A fundraising drive to help pay for a comprehensive renewal and upgrade project at the aging Moore Sports Complex is underway. Many funding sources are being explored to help fund the project, which carries with it an estimated \$35 million price tag,

but fundraising will also play a part.

A sunny May afternoon saw the kick-off of that effort as 220 people of all ages gathered at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre to participate in the Canada-wide ParticipaCTION Commity Better Challenge Walk to Win event. The challenge asked participants to keep track of their active minutes through an app that automatically added their activity to the total community score.

A total of 183 people registered to add their activity minutes to the township's score. Everyone, regardless of age, capability, body type or physical activity level was able to get

Speaking about the Community Better Challenge, which ran until June 16, acting Coordinator of Community Programs Brittney Fraser noted the goal of the program was to inspire wellness and active lives. "As a community we believe that we can inspire a nation, turn the fitness world on its head, and truly find alternative ways to rock! We aspire to change minds before bodies and use beat and alternative movement to launch people to new heights of self-worth, happiness, and human connection," she said. "Together we can make a differ-

This tracking continued from May 31 to June 16. The community with the most participation and the most accumulated active minutes was to be awarded \$150,000 for the community. Regional winners won \$20,000 toward physical activity initiatives of their choice.

When the result were tallied for all participating communities, St. Clair Township came in fourth in Ontario and seventh nation-wide. The township is now in competition with 29 other communities across Canada for the \$150,000 grand prize. The next step will be to write a report for submission to the ParticipACTION judges outlining strategies used to motivate participation and community willingness to participate in collective



events. Official data revealed Canadians coast-to-coast tracked a total of 263,420,922 minutes of activity.

Sombra Museum's 60th anniversary MBRA MUSEUM marked by evening of celebration







The Sombra Museum's 60th anniversary celebration was an evening of good fun and good food aimed at raising money to help further the museum's projects and programs.

It is a point of pride for its members and supporters that the Sombra Museum was the first museum in

Was the first museum in Lambton County and the Sombra Township Historical Society was the first of its kind as well. Information issued by the museum attributes the facility's beginnings to the feeling of pride that pervaded the nation in the 1950s.

Before that, community groups like the Women's Institutes saved news clippings and family stories in scrapbooks known as the Tweedsmuir books. They recorded information about pioneer homes, village origins, and other heritage themes. The Sombra Museum and Moore Museum's dedicated volunteers continue to carry on the documentation of the township, collecting and preserving information, photos and artifacts that will be available for generations to come. They also teach heritage through public programs and events.

From the opening of the Sombra Museum in the Bury House in June, 1959, its volunteers have continued to expand museum collections and seek out information about community history. The museum has also expanded to include the Sombra Museum Cultural Centre.

The 60th anniversary event celebrated the hard work and dedication of generations of museum volunteers. The Sombra Museum continues to grow and to provide the community with a cultural roadmap into the future.

Uncertain weather couldn't beat 15th Annual Car Show




St. Clair Township recently welcomed a new family to town and the art scene will never be the same.

I. school for the arts, he worked for Simpsons Lithograph, where he took on such projects as the album cover design for Celine Dione's "Let's Talk About Love" (featured the Titanic love theme "My Heart Will Go On") for Sony Music. "I was over the moon," said Will. "I'm a great Celine Dione fan." But the structured nature of the work eventually led him to move on. "It's a lot of stress and I realized it wasn't really creative." Will is a master of artistic mediums from oils and acrylics to pastels and sidewalk chalk, and his inventive creations are far-reaching, ranging from the whimsical and naturalistic to the macabre.

It was his mastery of artistic forms that led him to the tatto industry. "Tattooing was changing," said Will. "There were no artists; they used transfers (of pre-drawn designs) called "flash". I was contacted to see if I could do original designs and I fell head over heels into it (tattooing)." He says being able to take part in the creative process of helping a customer take an idea and give it form is very satisfying. "It has become a rite of passage for some people. They want to





commemorate (a milestone in their lives) like a first child." His love of the tattooing art form has led to his ownership of four Neon Crab tattoo shops across Ontario. His expertise can also be viewed online with his cable series, Engaged In Ink, currently a Rogers television production. Now in its third year, Will reveals the world of tattooing in all its forms. "It's educational," he said. "I teach different aspects of tattooing. For instance, I have done episodes on medical tattooing." He pointed out that doctors often use tattooing to restore natural body features like a nipple after cancer surgeries or to mark

areas that are of concern. He's done episodes on pain tolerance with London-based Dr. Dwight Moulin, a pain management specialist. 

Steps being taken to limit threat to oak trees

The St. Clair Region Conservation Authority (SCRCA), in partnership with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, has been monitoring Nitidulid (picnic) beetles that are known to carry a fungal pathogen known as Oak Wilt. This disease has affected trees throughout the U.S. and concerns are that it might reach Canada. Tim Payne, SCRCA manager of forests, says the trapping of the insects employed traps laced with bait and pheromones to attract the beetles. The insects will be torted for the Oak Wilt fungue. insects will be tested for the Oak Wilt fungus.

"Monitoring for Oak Wilt is important if we are going to be able to defend against its spread into Ontario," said Mr. Payne. "The better educated we are, the better equipped we are in dealing with (the insect's) invasion, if one were to occur."

Healthy trees become infected when open wounds are exposed to the fungus by the Nitidulid beetle. The fungus can also be transferred from tree to tree through their root systems if they have graphed together. The fungus causes the cycling of water and nutrients to become restricted, leading to the eventual death of the tree. For more information, go online to: www.scrca.on.ca


