Winter parking by-law

The winter parking by-law will come into effect on December 1. Under this by-law, it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This by-law ensures that snow plow crews can do their job effi-ciently and safely without having their work hampered by parked cars.

Property owners are reminded that it is against the law to shovel snow out onto public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless vehicle collisions and mishaps.

AVOID FROZEN WATER METERS AND PIPES

Prevention

It's that time of year again! The winter weather is here and your home is at risk of frozen water meters and pipes. This can stop the flow of water and may be costly to repair. Property owners are responsible for protecting water pipes and meters from damage. Here are a few tips to help prevent frozen water meters and pipes:

- Eliminate cold drafts near water pipes
- Turn off service to external water taps
- Insulate pipes that are most prone to freezing
- Make frequent use of your water supply
- Know the location of your indoor shut-off valve in case a pipe bursts

If you suspect your pipes are frozen check the following:

- Most likely the pipes near an outside wall, or where the water service enters the house through a foundation wall, are frozen. Begin by opening a faucet near the frozen pipe to avoid a burst line when water starts flowing
- NEVER use a blowtorch or open flame to thaw a line
- Begin by warming the pipes using a blow dryer, heating pad or portable heater (Do not leave electrical devices unattended or place near flammable materials)
- Once water starts flowing, allow a small stream of water to continue until heating is restored
- Eliminate drafts and allow heat to circulate to avoid refreezing

HERITAGE CORNER

HAMLETS OF ST. CLAIR TOWNSHIP GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

When we take a drive through the rural beauty of St. Clair Township, it's easy to forget that there used to be tiny centers of habitation scattered throughout its *908,699.33 square kilometres.

Some of these hamlets were little more than a post office or general store surrounded by a few houses, but they were hometowns to many, places where newcomers settled and families were raised. They are the places that still live in the childhood memories of township residents like Eldon Grant. He's a founding member of Heritage St. Clair and, along with his fellow members, he's trying to preserve the memories of 32 of St. Clair Township's hamlets.

Eldon was a Duthil kid. His father, William J.Grant, was a merchant in the hamlet, which also boasted a United Church that was also Presbyterian and Methodist during its lifetime. Eldon recalls meeting his friends after school (at school house #9 where there were three students) at the "Duthil tree", which stood in the middle of the hamlet's intersection until it was cut down in the 1950s. (See photo on right.) He also recalls a sight that is not possible today. "From the hamlet you could see the masts of sailing ships going up the (Sydenham) river," he said.

A new sign recently unveiled near the intersection of Duthil Road and Holt Line is an assurance that the name and spirit of Eldon's hometown will be preserved. During the unveiling ceremony, the late Allan Anderson, an avid Heritage St. Clair member, was remembered as the man who spearheaded the hamlet project after he expressed concern that the hamlets would be forgotten.


The Duthil sign is just the latest hamlet sign to be erected and dedicated through the hard work of Heritage St. Clair. The sturdy double-sided sign features fluores-

cent lettering for night viewing and a QR code that can be scanned with a smart phone. The code will connect the viewer to the Heritage St. Clair website.

Signs have already been erected at eight hamlet sites, including Froomfield, Becher, and Kimball, with eight more slated for installation next year and the remaining 16 in 2021, depending on the availability of funding for the project. The sign project has been supported with funding from St. Clair Township and the Lambton County Creative Fund.

Heritage St. Clair President Dave Pattenden says the signs have been of value because of the additional information they encourage from those who are familiar with the hamlets histories. "(After they see them) it leads to people contacting us with more information," he said.





Mammoth delivery for NOVA Rokeby site comes ashore

The largest vessel associated with the new NOVA Chemicals Rokeby site facility came ashore on Nov. 1 at the Courtright supply dock. The mammoth vessel was loaded onto a special flatbed trailer for its journey along the St. Clair Parkway south to Courtright Line, east to Hwy. 40, then north to Rokeby Line. The move was completed without incident through a collaboration between NOVA Chemicals employees, contractors, subcontractors and local agencies.

Once installed at the site, the 345 tonne 165 foot long polyethylene stripper will stand 300 feet tall.

vehicle The used to transport the vessel is a

heavy weight in its own right. The Mammo-et self-propelled modular transporter (SPMT) is controlled by a single operator using a central panel. The wheels can be steered through 360 degrees and they have a suspension that allows each wheel to operate independently, adjusting to any bump in the road. The trailers can be linked together to accommodate extra long cargoes and they are able to keep a load level to compensate for any unevenness in a road surface.

The \$2.2 billion expansion at the Nova Chemicals Corunna site on Rokeby Line adjacent to Hwy. 40, is the first part of the project. Its projected completion date is expected to be late 2021 and when commissioned, it will produce about one billion pounds of polyethylene annually. This

product is used to make products ranging from clear plastic bags and bottles to food packaging, bulk containers, and stock to facilitate processes such as industrial injection molding.





No Frills donates valuable service to Corunna food bank

The Christmas spirit is alive and well at the No Frills in Corunna. Owner Rob Carr is helping the Corunna food bank at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church keep a supply of meat in stock by ordering ground beef through his suppliers.

Charles Mortley-Wood says the meat is an important item the food bank gives to those who come in for help. "I order 50 pounds of ground beef every two months," he said. "We work with the Inn of the Good Shepherd (in Sarnia).

Mr. Mortley-Wood says the food bank supplies about 73 families. He noted winter is especially difficult for food bank users who have less money to spend on food because of the extra cost of heating and, for some, the cost of keeping a roof over their families' heads. "Some live in their cars during the summer," he said.

The food bank is always grateful for food and monetary donations. The donation from NoFrills will save money for other necessary

purchases the food bank must make. "This will save us over \$100 a month," said Mr. Mortley-Wood.




