



Township part of new large scale fibre project

High-speed fibre-optic broadband services that deliver faster internet speeds will soon be coming to some households and businesses in St. Clair Township. On Jan. 20, SWIFT (Southwestern Integrated Fibre Technology Inc.) announced that four large-scale fibre projects are slated for Lambton County. Service to over 3,900 households and businesses in St. Clair Township, Plympton-Wyoming, Lambton Shores, and Kettle and Stony Point First Nation is slated for this phase.

Cogeco Connexions will receive funding to service more than 80 kilometres of underserved roads in St. Clair Township to provide faster and more reliable service to the people of Babys Point, Port Lambton, Sombra, Wilkesport, Avonry, Mooretown, and Brigden at an estimated cost of \$4.9 million. The project is scheduled to provide fibre broadband services to more than 1,700 rural residences and businesses by the end of 2021. The four broadband projects are valued at a total estimated cost of \$11.4 million.

Mayor Steve Arnold believes this will not be the end of the broad-band expansion in the township. "It's been almost 12 years since we started the internet journey and I'm very happy we will finally have a lot of our under serviced areas looked after," he said. "The really rural parts of the township are still not fully serviced but this is the first stage and I am under the impression we will see more areas completed in the next round."

#### By-law approved to recover funds from homeowners after fire

By-law 3 of 2020, a by-law that allows the municipality to use Indemnification Technology® to access applicable insurance coverage for Fire Department Specific Response fees, was passed by council during its Jan. 6 meeting. The by-law approves an agreement be-tween the municipality and Fire Marque Inc. which enables the municipality to receive payment from a property owner when fire department services are called to attend a fire in a building, contents, or a structure of any kind.

This fee is collected from the property owner's insurance; a fee collection policy of this nature has been in effect since 2015. St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walt Anderson says the property owner is not directly burdened with this cost. "There is a lot of misinformation out there on how Fire Marque works and that they go after the home-owner for the costs of extinguishing the fire. That is not true," he said. "This is something in their (home insurance) policy already.

According to the Fire Marque website (www.firemarque.com/faq-property-owners.php) "The homeowner's property taxes pay for the fixed costs of your fire department, i.e. firefighting equipment, vehicles, fire hall, etc. The additional costs the fire department incurs attending the fire at your property are eligible to be recovered through your property policy."

Further, the website states insurance rates do not rise as a result of the Fire Marque program. "Your property insurance policy already has the fire department expense coverage in it."

### Winter parking by-law

The winter parking by-law is currently in effect. Under this by-law, it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This by-law ensures that snow plow crews can do their job efficiently and safely without having their work hampered by parked cars.

Property owners are reminded that it is against the law to shovel snow out onto public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless vehicle collisions and mishaps.

6 meeting of council. Rural property owner Owen Anthony presented council with research and photographs to support his complaint that a brine solution (the township uses a calcium chloride liquid product called *Mastermelt*) is being used excessively on

Mr. Anthony noted excess brine was running into drains and coating farm equipment with corrosive material that can cause damage and necessitate expensive repairs and replacements. He believes the excess brine runoff can make its way into township watercourses and eventually, the Great Lakes. Several other complainants were in attendance to support Mr. Anthony's concerns. They noted there had also been a fall application of a sticky yellow material that was especially troublesome for the agricultural community and rural residents in general.

Mayor Arnold, who owns and operates agricultural equipment, agrees the situation is cause for concern. "I, like everyone else, must wash the equipment more often since the investment for tractors and combines is huge and it doesn't take long to have well over a million dollars invested," he said.

Addressing the yellow material which has caused such concern and potential expense for township residents, council has instructed Public Works Department staff to deliver a report on the matter. Mayor Arnold commented, "The yellow brine materi-al that was mentioned is something that Mr. Neely (David Neeley is the township Public Works Coordinator of Operations for roads and drainage) should comment on. I wasn't involved directly in its use and I don't know the reasons why it was used. It would only be speculation on my part." (See boxed item below for David Neely's initial comments.) The St. Clair Township Public Works staff report will be delivered at the regular meeting of council on Monday, Feb. 3 at 3 p.m.

The use of calcium chloride applications has become common for municipalities across Canada since 2004 when Environment Canada published *The Code of Practice for the Environ*mental Management of Road Salts was released. The code was developed to assist municipal and provincial road care departments to better manage their use of road salts in a way that reduces negative impact on the environment while maintaining

road safety.

"We have always been assured that our roads were done based on weather forecasting, coordinating with the county and all based on the MTO standards," said Mayor Arnold. "Any other calcium chloride solutions that are applied are one-offs that a private individual would apply or the township may apply on an emergency basis," he said. "The main reasons calcium chloride is applied to paved roads is to prewet the asphalt for better ice and snow penetration and freezing resistance before a major weather event takes place or if the freezing cycle over bridges is forecast to occur. These are safety precautions done to protect our travel-ling residents." He added that council is aware of this material's impact on the environment and its destructive effect on vehicles, machinery, road surfaces and bridges. "Bridges are washed yearly to help mitigate corrosion," said Mayor Arnold. "The township has spent considerable money to ensure these liquid application systems use state-of-the-art computer-driven technology." He added the typical application rate is in the range of 100 litres per lane kilometer, which is actually quite a small amount.

MSC Renewal Committee progress reported

Moore Sports Complex Renewal Committee Chair Geoff Dale attended council to report on the committee's latest efforts. He noted a new permanent logo has been designed to represent the renewal effort and two exciting new fundraising efforts are being mounted for the coming months with a third in the planning phase

Golf tourney funds approved for use to purchase emergency items

Emergency situations like high heat and snow events, and the prolonged power outages these events can cause can make it necessary for affected residents to take refuge at their local emergency shelter. But when they need to stay more than a few hours, they require accommodations the township is currently lacking.

St. Clair Township Fire Chief Walt Anderson discussed this situation with council at its Jan. 6 meeting. He said emergency equipment such as cots and bedding used to be locally available through the Red Cross, but the organization has since transferred storage of those items to a central location away from the township. He told council the committee that oversees the annual firefighter golf tournament fundraiser has offered to provide \$10,000 toward the purchase of items such as cots and bedding, as well as a trailer to store and transport them should one of the township's designated emergency shelters have to be activated. The 2019 golf tournament raised a total of \$18,000 and this project is one of several projects that has been considered for funding. Council approved the use of the funds for this purpose.

Township issues raised at ROMA Conference

Mayor Arnold and Deputy Mayor Miller recently attended the annual ROMA (Rural Ontario Municipal Association) Conference. ROMA is the rural arm of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) that allows municipal representatives to bring their specific issues of concern to the attention of the provincial and

federal government representatives.

Mayor Arnold says meetings concerning St. Clair Township had been arranged with the Minister of Infrastructure to discuss the Moore Sports Complex Renewal project and the Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks to discuss the old hazardous waste site adjacent to Hill Street east of Corunna, energy from waste at Clean Harbors, and plastics in asphalt for road construction. A presentation had also been forwarded to the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry in regards to the Conservation Authority (CA) regulations committee make-up, high water levels on the Great Lakes (including St. Clair Township), funding for shore-line protection, the speed of pleasure cruisers, etc., and the CA involvement on man-made drainage works.

#### Use of calcium chloride explained

Calcium chloride ("brine", commercial name Master*melt*) is applied to gravel roads in the spring time after spring grading to control dust throughout the summer. It is a clear colour and is applied by a contractor. The deputation that attended council referred to an extra application of dust control that was applied in fall of 2019. Although a few problem roads may get a fall application of dust control, it is not normal for a fall application to be completed across the entire road network; however, such an application was done in 2019.

This application, which was provided at no cost to the township, contained "rust" that had settled to the bottom of the brine ponds. Public Works was not initially aware that the dust control would have the orange/yellow coloured rust in it. We know many people were not happy about this event but we assure the public it will not be completed again. It was a one-off event.

During the winter months, Mastermelt is applied only to hard top roads (no gravel road application) in a practice referred to as "anti-icing". Applications are done based on weather forecasts and according to MTO standards to keep township roads safe to use.

#### **AVOID FROZEN WATER METERS AND PIPES**

#### **Prevention**

It's that time of year again! The winter weather is here and your home is at risk of frozen water meters and pipes. This can stop the flow of water and may be costly to repair. Property owners are responsible for protecting water pipes and meters from damage. Here are a few tips to help prevent frozen water meters and pipes:

- Eliminate cold drafts near water pipes
- Turn off service to external water taps
- Insulate pipes that are most prone to freezing
- Make frequent use of your water supply
- Know the location of your indoor shut-off valve in case a pipe bursts

#### If you suspect your pipes are frozen check the following:

- Most likely the pipes near an outside wall, or where the water service enters the house through a foundation wall, are frozen. Begin by opening a faucet near the frozen pipe to avoid a burst line when water starts flowing
- **NEVER** use a blowtorch or open flame to thaw a line
- Begin by warming the pipes using a blow dryer, heating pad or portable heater (Do not leave electrical devices unattended or place near flammable materials)
- Once water starts flowing, allow a small stream of water to continue until heating is restored
- Eliminate drafts and allow heat to circulate to avoid refreezing



# Don't become a victim of the silent killer

Without knowing it, there could be a silent killer invading your home. Carbon Monoxide (CO), a.k.a. "the silent killer", is an odourless, colourless, tasteless and poisonous gas. If you live in a dwelling containing a fuel burning appliance (such as natural gas stove or furnace, wood stove or oil furnace) an attached garage, or fireplace, you are required by law to have a carbon monoxide alarm.

Mild to medium exposure to the effects of CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as: headache, fatigue, nausea, vomiting, and dizziness. Fever is not one of its symptoms.



the expiry date on the unit has passed or when it fails testing. Remember that these alarms may need new back up batteries and may alarm when the battery is low.

#### **Safety Tips**

- Install a CO alarm outside all sleeping areas in your home. It's the law!
- Get an annual inspection for all fuel-burning appliances in your home.
- Test all CO alarms monthly.
- Replace all CO alarms when

- DO NOT re-enter the house until you are told it is safe to do so by a St. Clair Fire Department member



Well water safety a concern to LPH Lambton Public Health (LPH) is encouraging residents with private water wells to test their water supply as soon as possible if the well is flooded by excessively high water levels and flood conditions caused by rain and snow melt.

Harmful bacteria may enter the drinking water

supply making it unsafe for consumption.

LPH Public Health Inspector Vicky MacTavish cautions, "Until you can test your well water, use bottled water for daily use including drinking, making infant formula or juices, cooking, making ice washing fruits and vegetables, and brushing teeth."

Once floods have receded, the well should be disinfected and tested at least three times at one week intervals before the water is used for drinking. The test for bacteria (total coliform and E. coli) and water sample kits are free. Water samples must be dropped off within 24 hours of being taken. Local drop-off centres are at Lambton Public Health, 160 Exmouth Street, Point Edward, and at Bluewater Health CEE lab, 450 Blanche Street in Pe-

For a full schedule of access times for these locations and resources on how to take a water sample, visit <u>LambtonPublicHealth.ca</u>

It is recommended well water be tested three to four times per year to ensure the water supply is not contaminated.
