MUNICIPAL NOTES

Community Input Survey RFP approved
A Community Input Survey will be undertaken in St. Clair Township to gather opinions from residents regarding the township's core assets. This information will be applied to the upcoming Asset Management Plan and Level of Service document this fall. The telephone and online survey is being conducted by Probe Research Inc. this summer, and results will be analyzed and reported early this fall.

Request for concurrence approved

A request for concurrence in regard to the location of an Xplornet tower in Wilkesport at 1622 Ba-by Road was approved by council during the June 15 meeting. The approval was given after public consultation with the community and according to the township's own policy for establishing telecommunications sites.

Amended exotic animal by-law approved

The amended exotic animal by-law submitted to council at its June 15 meeting was approved. The updated bylaw does not include the further prohibition for pitbulls or any other breed of dog and is in accordance with Ontario Reg. 157/05. The update also removes minks from the prohibited animals list. And a new section entitled "Exceptions" was added to the bylaw to allow case-by-case consideration of a request by a local landowner to per-mit any of the animals currently listed as 'prohibiťed'

Phase 2 opening in effect
The further opening of businesses under Phase 2 of the province's COVID-19 reopening framework is now underway in St. Clair Township. Phase 2 allows gatherings of up to 10 people with the understanding that people observe the two metre physical dis ing that people observe the two metre physical distancing requirement when interacting with individuals from outside of their household.

Outdoor patio installations and extensions temporarily approved by council will also be allowed subject to compliance with all Provincial orders and applicable liquor licensing. This consideration will be in effect as long as indoor eating facilities remain closed and it does not contravene the res-

taurant's zoning bylaw.

Phase 2 openings (continued)

Faith communities will be allowed to open to 30 per cent capacity for indoor services, with congregation members observing social distancing between individuals who are not from their households. Active screening and attendance lists will be required to allow tracing in the event an attendee should test positive for COVID-10, and increased cleaning and disinfecting of the premises will be expected. Sunday School attendance will be limited to a total of 10 people. Attendees are asked to avoid exchanges with others, and chronic or high risk individuals are cautioned to weigh the risks before attending a service.

Use of "sea cans" for outside storage discussed by council

A discussion regarding the use of shipping containers (sea cans) for permanent outside storage was discussed at the June 15 meeting of council. Municipal staff has been asked to look into provincial and municipal precedents for this practice and report back

to council.

Measures recommended to prevent heat-related illness

The hot weather being experienced in Lambton County has prompted several heat warnings to be issued recently by Lambton Public Health. Heatrelated illness can be dangerous and should not be ignored. Symptoms to watch for include: rapid breathing, dizziness or fainting, vomiting, rapid heartbeat, extreme thirst and decreased urination with unusually dark urine. In extreme cases, it can raise body temperature to dangerous levels, cause confusion, stop sweating, and cause the victim to lose consciousness. If any of these symptoms are experienced, the following steps should be taken as soon as possible: move victim to a shaded or airconditioned area; give victim plenty of non-alcoholic fluids (alcohol can act as a diuretic and cause dehydration); and rest. Contact your health care provider, a family member or a friend immediately. If symptoms worsen, call 91.

And remember to NEVER leave people or pets in a parked care potential and the people of the person of the standard care.

parked car. Pets are affected by heat just like humans; they need a cool location to rest and fresh wa-

ter throughout the day.

Due to COVID-19, cooling centers are limited. Anyone who requires assistance due to heat should call Lambton Public Health at 519-383-8331 or 1-800-667-1839 to inquire about possible access.

Mosquito larviciding has started

Lambton Public Health reports mosquito control larviciding has begun in the county. This effort is designed to impede mosquito breeding and control adult mosquito populations with the goal of reducing the incidence of West Nile Virus in the Lambton County.

In addition to the larviciding effort, property owners are asked to take the following steps: Remove stagnant water around their property; keep eaves clear of debris; and drain water from containers and toys.

When outdoors, the use of insect repellent containing DEET is also advised during the peak times or in locations where mosquitoes are ac-

Safe disposal of dead birds

If dead birds are found, please dispose of it wearing gloves or a bag and discard it in a garbage container to put out with regular trash collection. The dead birds will not be collected by LPH.

Libraries now offers curb-side pickup

Selected branches of the Lambton County Library, including Corunna and Sombra, are now offering curbside pickup of library materials following the recent easing of some provincial restrictions. This step will mark the gradual reactivation of services at cultural facilities.

To access this service, library card holders can view materials by using the library's catalogue at *Iclibrary.ca* . By calling a library offering curbside pickup, the card holder can reserve a particular title. The card holder will receive a phone call when the material is ready for pickup. Patrons will be instructed to park in spaces that are designated with signage for curbside pickup. All materials can be returned to a drop box at any Lambton County Library location. Returned materials will be quarantined for 72 hours after drop boxes are emptied and before they are marked returned. Materials may still appear on your account for up to 10 days and late fees will not accrue.

Andrew Meyer, general manager of the Lambton County's Cultural Services, says library employees have been trained to understand how COVID-19 is spread and how to protect themselves and others against the virus. Library branches offering services have received enhanced cleaning and disinfecting.

Yard Waste update

In order to reduce the amount of compostable material directed to landfill, St. Clair Township provides yard waste collection (directed to the compost site) in the spring and fall (see calendar for dates). During this collection period, paper bags or containers clearly marked with a large X must be used.

During the summer months, yard waste will be collected with the regular waste collection, subject to the 6-item limit. During this period of time, compost will be directed to landfill, not the compost site.

Residents will no longer be able to take yard waste directly to Sarnia Compost.

Sanitary Backup Prevention


Do you have a backwater valve? A backwater valve, if properly installed and maintained, can prevent sewage from backing up into your home during a blockage or surcharge. It is recommended you follow the backwater valve manufacturer's guidelines and recommendations for maintenance.

Regular maintenance is required to ensure it operates as required during a sanitary backup.

- 1. Remove cleanout cap on top of the valve and do a visual inspection.
- 2. Ensure O-ring is in good condition on the cap.
- 3. Use a flashlight to properly see inside the valve body.
- 4. Inspect for debris build-up on body, gate (flap) and beneath the gate (flap).
- 5. If debris build-up is found, flush clean.
- 6. Inspect the O-ring for deterioration and replace if necessary.
- 7. Ensure the gate (flap) moves freely up and down.
- 8. If the backwater valve is a model with floats, check condition of floats and replace as necessary.
- 9. Reinstall cleanout cap.

The clear top allows for easy inspection to determine if the gate (flap) is open or closed.

Keep in mind, when the backwater valve is closed you *can't* use your plumbing as you normally would. Avoid showering, flushing the toilet, using the washing machine or dishwasher until conditions return to normal and the backwater valve gate is open.

Dear Homeowner/Business Owner / Tenant,

Re: Sanitary Fixed Fee

St. Clair Township has introduced a fixed sanitary fee that now appears on your water/sanitary bill. The new sanitary fee is being introduced to help the municipality pay for costs related to sanitary infrastructure required to improve the operational effectiveness of the Township's sanitary system and to meet provincial regulations. The existing sanitary charges on your bill will continue to pay for the operation & maintenance of the sanitary system within the Township.

You will notice a new line item on your bill containing the Sanitary Fixed Fee information. An average residential customer with a half inch water service will see; "Sanitary Fixed Fee Res Qtly < 1 inch" including the additional sanitary charge. The fee is based on your service size and rate class. For example, residential customers with a 1/2" to 34" diameter service will receive a monthly sanitary fee of \$1.50 in 2020. The sanitary fee will be adjusted over the next 3 years until infrastructure costs are being financially balanced.

St. Clair Township will continue to ensure that its Municipal customers receive safe, reliable and effective service related to each of its systems and infrastructure.

Sandbags and sand available

St. Clair Township Council has approved emergency relief, free of charge, to residents of the township that are affected by the current flooding / high lake levels.

Sandbags and sand will be provided as follows:

A pile of bulk sand is located in the gravel parking lot at the south end of Brander Park, 4555 St. Clair Parkway.

Please access the site from the driveway off Brander Park Road.

Empty sandbags will be available at this same site (next to sand pile) and will be stored inside a small storage bin. Residents may take up to a maximum of 500 per residential property and 1500 per commercial/industrial property.

Residents must fill and transport their own bags. Please bring a shovel.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, this site will not be staffed.

Township staff will not provide further service. We do not fill, transport or remove sandbags.

2020 Hazardous waste collections resume

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection program has resumed, allowing Lambton County residents an opportunity to dispose of household hazardous waste at no cost. Early program events in March, April and May were cancelled due to concerns raised by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The program resumed in June at the Clean Harbors Lambton facility at 4090 Telfer Road off Petrolia Line in St. Clair Township. Several future dates are planned for Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on: Sept. 12 and 26; and Oct. 17 and 31.

Corrosive items including batteries, drain and oven cleaners, as well as toxic, reactive, and flammable materials will be accepted. Items that will NOT be accepted include: PCBs, commercial,

industrial, or radioactive wastes, electronics, and explosives such as flares and ammunition.

Thompson Gardens has three beautifully-manicured gardens gracing the property this season. It has been growing in size and beauty for many years thanks to the efforts of the green thumbs who reside at TG. A few residents have special plantings they tend, while many others tend a communal garden. "We share it with all the residents here," said Sally Townsend, who has been helping with the garden for 17 years. "(When it is ready to pick) we leave it on the dining room table."

The day The Beacon visited the immaculate garden site, vegetables from corn, lettuce, and tomatoes to herbs, garlic and mixed greens were thriving, and garlic scapes were being harvested by gardeners Katherine Sullivan and Mark Gagnier. "The scapes have to be removed to allow more of the hubble "good by the scale of the formation of the garding bulble"." of the garlic bulbs," said Katherine. She added the scapes, small white bulges along the length of the green

garlic stalks, are a delicacy often pickled.

One of the features that adds grace to the three garden plots is the presence of a marigold border. Katherine explained the border is not only attractive, but it helps to discourage the attentions of the local rabbit and deer popu-

The gardeners are keenly aware that many of the Thompson Gardens residents are from rural communities and the gardens have become a focal point for them. "They love to walk around the garden," said gardener Mark Gagnier. Noting the neatly-mowed

lawns that frame the gardens, Mark explained the short length of the grass allows access for residents wheeled walkers and wheel chairs.

The many years of gardening experience the gardeners bring to their labour of love has created a showplace of Mother Nature's best work for the benefit of all Thompson Gardens residents.

SCTFD urges businesses preparing to open do complete safety check

A St. Clair Township Fire Department bulletin

As more businesses reopen according to the province's Phase 2 program, they will be operating under the "new normal" conditions. And as part of their preparations, fire and life safety requirements must still be considered.

The St. Clair Township Fire Department has created this list to help business owners check their buildings and keep their staff, customers, and property safe. Please note this is not a comprehensive list of requirements; it is a guide.

Exits

- All exits are unobstructed
- All exit doors are working properly and can be opened from the inside
- Exit signs are properly illuminated Emergency Lighting
- Complete monthly test and inspections
- Emergency lighting units are functioning Fire Extinguishers
- > Complete monthly inspection
- Pressure gauge is in the operable range (green
- > Fire extinguishers are not damaged
- > Fire extinguishers are accessible

Fire Alarm

- Complete monthly test and inspections
- No trouble, supervisory or alarm signals on panel
- Manual pull stations are accessible Fire Route
- Keep fire route clear of obstructions Fire Safety Planning
- Staff are familiar with what to do in the event of a fire emergency

Electrical

- Electrical system is in good repair
- Temporary wiring (extension cords) are not used as permanent wiring Sprinkler System/Standpipe Systems
- Complete monthly and bi-monthly inspections
- > Sprinkler heads are unobstructed
- Fire Department connections are accessible and not blocked by curb side pick up items or storage
- Standpipe hoses and hose connections are accessible

Exhaust and Fire Protection for Cooking Operations

- Filters are clean and undamaged
- Suppression system nozzles are clean and aimed correctly at appliances
- Fire extinguishing system has been serviced within the last 6 months
- Exhaust fan is clean and undamaged Annual Inspections
- Ensure annual inspections for the fire protection and detection systems have been completed by a certified contractor

Track inspection bus used to monitor and service New York Central Railway tracks

The track inspection bus from the New York Central Railway line was a frequent visitor to the Courtright railway terminal in the 1940s. These pictures from the Sirman Collection clearly show the wheels that transformed the roadworthy bus into a rail car. The photo, below left, shows the bus moving over the railway trestle west of Brigden.

The Courtright station was originally chosen as the western terminus of the Canada Southern Railway in 1869 and Courtright was named in honour of the company's president, Milton Courtright.





W. Darcy McKeough Floodway comes in handy during these high water days

Many St. Clair Township residents have never known a time before the W. Darcy McKeough Floodway was constructed, but it has become an important part of the region's flood control sys-

The massive project was undertaken to reduce the threat of flooding in Wallaceburg but the journey from proposal of the floodway to its com-

pletion was a long, contentious one.

Originally called the Wilkesport Dam and Diversion Project, it became the Sydenham Valley Conservation Authority's Project No. 65 in early 1970.

A feasibility report that came to be known as the Diversion and funded by a pro-Dillon Report was undertaken and funded by a provincial grant of \$25,000.

In the course of getting the project underway, there was dissent by a group of Sombra ratepayer who called themselves Save Our Sydenham, (SOS). The group believed the project would affect thousands of acres of prime bottomland, taking it out of production, disrupting drains and encouraging the growth of cattails and stagnant water.

The authority was presented with a petition opposing the project and offering an alternate flood control plan for Wallaceburg. It was rejected as being too costly and ineffective.

Official word that the project had been post-poned indefinitely was received from Toronto in

July, 1973.

In the months that followed, disputes over properties, easements, and what share of the total cost of the project, which was up to \$10 million by January, 1975, would be pay by the various stakeholders, delayed the project further.

Flash forward to Sept. 8, 1978, the project got underway with a ceremonial sod-turning at the west end of the proposed channel. It wasn't without incident as several landowners showed up to

out incident, as several landowners showed up to demonstrate peacefully because the authority was not willing to listen to their concerns before the construction began. Shortly afterward, more de-lays ensued as and it was 1984 before the project was completed.

Today, the seven-kilometre long grassy diversion channel runs west to the St. Clair River. It is controlled by two vertical sluice gates that remain open during normal flow conditions, but when river levels rise, the gates are closed to divert flow down the diversion channel. The floodway controls about 37 per cent of the East and North Sydenham River drainage basins upstream of Wallaceburg.





The Empathy Gap for Seniors

Dear Editor

Once again, our armed forces have saved us, this time from our blindness to the plight of seniors living in long term care (LTC) homes. Often referred to as nursing homes, these facilities house our most medically vulnerable seniors, those who require the most care.

The forces report submitted to the federal government describes a merciless state of affairs wherein the oldest of our society are subjected to the most suffering and depraved conditions. It describes social isolation akin to solitary confinement, personal care tantamount to abuse and fatality rates of about 80% of all COVID-19 cases nationally.

For too long an empathy gap has existed in our treatment of seniors. The adage "out of sight, out of mind" evolved for more than 25 years. This gap is reflected in a recent international study of long-term care in Canada wherein the highest proportion of virus deaths ranks us as the worst of 14 countries globally.

Corroboration of this desperate state of affairs is found in a Toronto area LTC home where the police are now investigating criminal negligence for failing to provide the necessities to residents.

The necessity of having to bring in the army and the police is an odious indicator of elder care in Canada.

As a local senior care advocacy group, we join with others across the province calling for a full public inquiry into the state of LTC homes. It has been a cumulative lack of accountability from experts within government ministries who have shepherded the care of vulnerable elderly to this disastrous state. The time is now to close the empathy gap.

Premier Ford, show you care. Create a full public inquiry.

Ms. Rodgers explained how this effort began and how it has expanded. "When the pandemic broke out, I had a couple of community members who were separated from their spouses (one in hospital and one moved on to LTC). The one couple had a staff worker who had an iPad so they could still see each other and talk. The other was not able to do that, so they chatted as best they could under the circumstances. Both partners have since passed (on). At that time, I thought, 'This is terrible. What can we do to help?' So we ordered a bunch of iPads to donate to various organizations to help families stay connected.'

Two months later, \$12,000 worth of iPads arrived at the Wellings of Corunna complex and they were distributed to people and organizations that required them.
Recipients included: Bluewater Health, Charlotte
Englehart Hospital, St. Joseph's Hospice, Vision Nursing
Home, Meadowyiew Nursing Home, Huron Boys Home, and the Sarnia Women's Interval Home.

Ms. Rogers says the iPads have made a positive difference to the Wellings residents who received them. "Staying connected is an integral part of living well and our residents tell us that their Wellings iPads have been a life changer during the unsettling times we are living through," she said. "Our hope is that this gesture of kindness will continue to multiply and deliver many smiles to many people living in the area, for many months to come."

Well water safety still a concern Lambton Public Health (LPH) is encouraging residents with private water wells to test their water supply about three to four times per year, and also in the event of the well being flooded by excessive rainfall or high water levels. Harmful bacteria may enter the drinking water supply making it unsafe for consumption.

LPH Public Health Inspector Vicky MacTavish cautions, "Until you can test your well water (after flooding), use bottled water for daily use including drinking, making infant formula or juices, cooking, making ice, washing fruits and vegetables, and brushing teeth."

If your well is flooded, it should be disinfected and tested as soon as the water recedes and at one-week intervals for three weeks afterwards to ensure the water is safe for drinking. The test for bacteria (total coliform and E. coli) and water sample kits are free. Water samples must be dropped off within 24 hours of being taken. Local drop-off centres are at Lambton Public Health, 160 Exmouth Street, Point Edward, and at Bluewater Health CEE lab, 450 Blanche Street in Petrolia. (Please note there may have been changes to the way samples are received. For a full schedule of access times for these locations, as well as resources on how to take a water sample, visit LambtonPublicHealth.ca

"We saw this snapper by Lake Lambton this morning," he said. "After she laid her eggs, we put a screen over the mound to keep the racoons, skunks and foxes out, but the newborn turtles will be able to squeeze through and carry on.'
