Lambton Generating Station south of Courtright was finally erased from the landscape on Feb. 12, brought down with masterful precision, and announced by the thunder of rapid-fire explosions, shattering concrete and collapsing metal. Thirty-five seconds from the first detonation, the final stack disappeared into a billowing cloud of grey dust. After over 40 years of service to the province, the station had outlived its usefulness as the future of power generation careened into the age of "green". Thanks to a video documenting the event, commissioned by Ontario Power Generation and made available on YouTube, The Beacon has been able to document the last days of Lambton G.S.

TOWNSHIP OFFICE REOPENING

As of March 1, the St. Clair Township municipal office at 1155 Emily Street in Mooretown reopened to the public.

Access will still require that COVID-19 protocol be observed. For the safety of staff and visitors alike, please wear a mask and maintain physical distancing when in the building. Please do not enter if you are symptomatic.

Shell turnaround to be one of the largest Representatives from the Shell Manufacturing Centre (SMC) in Corunna met virtually with council to explain the upcoming 2022 spring turnaround (TA). Representative Jason Woodward, the turnaround event coordinator, noted this turnaround will be one of the largest ever done at the SMC. An estimated 350,000 manhours of work will be undertaken by a work force of about 1,000 at a cost of \$120 million.

The first unit will be shut down in mid-March with a projected completion time of early- to mid-June.

The project will employ the use of one of the largest cranes in the world, the PTC35. The crane will be transported to the site in pieces contained in 115 sea cans and it will take six weeks to build. It will be used to make lifts as heavy as 500,000

During the project, there will be a need to transport oversized loads to the site, including the sea cans as well as major pieces of equipment being

fabricated off-site.

As part of the project, Shell has committed to a Goal Zero Donation program to benefit Access Open Minds, a Sarnia mental health centre for youth ages 11 to 15 who require access to core services. For every zero incident day of the turnaround, Shell will donate \$1,000 to the centre, supporting over 200 individual treatment cases.

The TA will also make a hefty local investment, hiring about 700 workers through local halls and ac-

cessing local vendors for such things as materials, services, and pre-fabricated equipment.

The overall goal of this large turnaround is to reduce the need for frequent TAs that inconvenience and disturb the community. Only two such TAs will be required over a period of six years. While the project is in progress, police and security personnel will be brought in to ensure that traffic flow is as

Winter Parking by-law

The amended St. Clair Township winter parking bylaw will continue until April 1, 2022. Under the amended by-law, it is against the law to leave vehicles or obstructions of any kind parked on public streets and roads overnight from midnight to 7 a.m. The by-law ensures that snow removal crews can do their jobs efficiently and safely without being hampered by parked vehicles.

Keep laneways clear

All boats and trailers parked in laneways MUST be set back at least to the front yard set back of the zone in which you reside. In Corunna and all builtup areas, any trailer or boat MUST be a minimum of six (6) metres setback <u>from the property line</u> through April 1, 2022.

Note: According to the Ontario Highway Traffic Act, it is against the law to shovel snow onto a public street, highway, or roadway, and anyone caught

doing it can be fined under that law.

New hydro project will support future growth

At the Feb. 7 virtual meeting of St. Clair Township Council, Hydro One representative Alex Moskalyk presented an overview of the St. Clair Transmission project, which will see the expansion of the Hydro One transmission system in Southwestern Ontario. The expansion is being done to provide a reliable, safe, and sustainable electricity system that will support residential, commercial and industrial growth in this area well into the future. The project has been deemed necessary because population growth is outpacing the rest of Ontario by about 50 per cent, and electricity usage is expected to triple by 2026.

The former Lambton Generating switchyard is part of the project's Phase 1, with a 230kv transmission line extending south to Chatham. Other Phase 1 projects will include 230kv transmission lines between Chatham and a new Lakeshore transmission station (T.S.), a 230kv line between Leamington and Kingsville area plus two new transformer stations, and a 500kv transmission line between Longwood to Lakeshore.

Ministry alert to LDD moth infestation

The Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry has issued an alert regarding an outbreak of the LDD (formerly called

gypsy moth) in Ontario, especially in southern Ontario and some areas of the northeast.

Aerial and ground surveys conducted by the Ministry in 2021 mapped damaged areas and produced a forecast that there would be defoliation in 2022 due to high populations of the LDD moth. Private landowners and municipalities are responsible for managing the moth. Mayor Arnold told council that landowners will not receive government assistance to fight the moth infestation.

A letter from the Ministry to council noted some landowners wrap bands of burlap around tree trunks in the spring; this gives the moth larvae a place to gather during warm months so they can be physically removed and destroyed. In the fall, a burlap wrap can also allow landowners to remove and destroy egg masses. Sprays are available but should be applied by licensed insect control providers.

Food waste recycling method explained Council heard a presentation from Alex Hayman, spokesperson for Foodcycle Science. The Canadian company based in Ottawa is advocating the use of a new type of food recycling appliance to process food waste. The countertop unit, which must be purchased, was compared to the size of a bread maker. A 2 litre bucket inside the unit would collect food waste including non-compostable items such as meat, dairy products, starches and tea/ coffee grounds. "You put your food waste into a small appliance and a few hours later you have cre-ated a nutrient rich soil amendment," said Mr. Hay-

man. "Every cycle takes between four to eight hours." He added the process reduces the food waste by about 90 per cent.

Processing the organic waste in the house can unimpeded as possible during shift changes and the cause odor issues and Mr. Hayman says the use of

the unit's filter is strongly recommended. For people who don't farm or have a garden, he suggested the material be donated to a community garden or farmer.

Council raised the question of using the appliance in the winter when there is no place to distribute the results of the process. Mr. Hayman recommended storing the product until spring .

Mr. Hayman said the company already partners

with over 30 communities.

He says households produce from 25 to 50 per cent organic waste and millions of tons of green-house gas is created when this material breaks down in landfills.

A 12-week pilot project has been developed where users purchase a food cycler at a subsidized rate, use the unit and track their usage over a 12 week period, then fill out a survey and provide

feedback about the program.

Mr. Hayman noted if the program was to be tried in St. Clair Township, 100 households would be required to assess the program at a cost to the municipality of \$12,500. He added the program would pay back this cost in the reduction of waste being hauled to the landfill.

Council referred the information to staff for further investigation to see if such a program might

benefit the township.

CSX level crossing

For some time now, the township has made repeated requests to CSX railway to have repairs made and tracks removed at various locations in the area. They have all failed to encourage compliance from the company, a Class 1 freight railroad operator based in Florida which operates in Ontario, Quebec, and the eastern United States. A report to council from Works Department Coordinator of Op-erations David Neeley and Director of Public Works Brian Black promptéd a discussion regarding the company's failure to effect the badly needed improvements.

To date, all of the CSX crossings along gravel roads in the area have been covered over by the township, but the crossing at Broadway Street in Port Lambton is still exposed and in disrepair. Mayor Arnold suggested a motion requesting Lambton County to pave over the crossing with asphalt even if the township has to pick up the bill for it. The motion was made and carried. "We've suffered long enough in the village," said Mayor Arnold.

The need for repair on the CSX crossing at Bentpath Line was also discussed. Since it is a county must make the request for

ty road, Lambton County must make the request for the repair of Bentpath Line. A motion was made to bring the matter to the county and, should CSX re-fuse to make the repair in a timely manner, the repair would be done either by the county or the township, with the cost of the repair being referred back to CSX. A motion to pursue that course of actions was carried.

FROZEN WATER METER AND PIPES

Preventative:

It's that time of year again! With the winter weather here, your home is at risk of frozen water meters and pipes. This can stop your flow of water and may be costly to repair. Property owners are responsible for protecting water pipes and meters from damage. Here are a few tips to help prevent frozen water meters and pipes:

- Eliminate cold drafts near water pipes
- Turn off service to external water taps
- Insulate your pipes that are most prone to freezing
- Make frequent use of your water supply
- Know where your shut off valve is inside, in case a pipe bursts

If you suspect your pipes are frozen check the following:

- Most likely the pipes near an outside wall, or where the water service enters the house through a foundation
 wall are frozen. Start by opening a faucet near the frozen pipe to avoid a burst line, when water starts flowing
- NEVER use a blowtorch or open flame to thaw a line
- Begin by warming the pipes using a blow dryer, heating pad or portable heater (Do not leave electrical devices unattended or place near flammable materials)
- Once water starts flowing, allow a small stream of water to continue until heating is restored
- Eliminate drafts and allow heat to circulate to avoid refreezing

IMPLOSIONS SOUND: LAMBTON G.S. BECOMES HISTORY

The brief thunder of explosives detonating at the former Lambton G.S. power station on Saturday, Feb. 12 sounded the death knell for the well-known St. Clair Township landmark. Commissioned in 1969 by Ontario Hydro, the four-unit, 2,000 megawatt coal-fired station operated by Ontario Power Generation was decommissioned Sept. 20, 2013 as OPG transitioned away from coal.

The last weeks of the station were marked by workers positioning blast barriers to mini-

by workers positioning blast barriers to minimize the impact of the implosion on off-site properties.

Community builder George Stewart leaves lasting legacy

George Stewart was born in West Calder, near Edinburgh, Scotland on April 7, 1825, one of two children born to John and Mary (Gowans) Stewart. John Stewart died in 1828 and a few years later Mary Stewart married James Nesbitt. George's formal schooling ended at the age of 9 when in 1834 his stepfather decided to move with his wife and step-children to Canada.

Eight weeks aboard the sailing ship *Margaret Bogle* brought the family to Quebec and on to Ontario. The family first settled along Bear Creek in Moore Township but soon relocated to the riverfront along the St. Clair River. George worked along-side his step-father to clear their land for farming.

At the age of 18, George left home to make his own mark on

the world. He signed on as cook on the lake vessel Athol. Seventeen years of sailing saw him rise through the ranks. He served as mate of the steamer Benjamin Franklin and the Huron. The passengers of the Huron presented him with a spy glass as a memento of the voyage on one trip in 1854.

At Port Sarnia, on Jan. 25, 1856, George Stewart married Miss Jean Gibb, who's name appears as Jane on the marriage

certificate, but all other records indicate Jean.

The Stewarts had nine children: Margaret, Mary, John James (who died in infancy), John James Stewart (2), Jessie, Eliza

Jane, Robert Gibb, Agnes Isabella, and Annie Làurie.

In 1859, George gave up life on the lakes for life along the river. He bought large parcels of land around Courtright and began a cord wood business that thrived over the next fifteen years. George also built a planing mill in Courtright, manufacturing and selling lumber. Bringing together his two careers, he also owned and operated a vessel to carry the lumber to various ports. Disasters brought these businesses to an end, however, when his ship was wrecked on Georgian Bay and his mill burned down after being struck by lighting. George retired to manage his 700 acres of farm land, which made him the largest individual taxpayer in Moore Township at the time. All of the land was rented out for cultivation.

In 1866, George Stewart's military career began in response to the Fenian Raids. He served as lieutenant of a cavalry troop of 70 men stationed at Mooretown to guard the river from Sarnia to Sombra. This service, and similar service in 1870, earned him a Fenian Raid medal. He rose to the rank of major and, in 1894, he was retired by the Dominion government with the title of Lieutenant-Colonel. In 1902 he received a gold medal that had been ordered by the late Queen Victoria for all officers with over 25 years

of service in the colonial auxiliary forces. George Stewart was also very active in community life. He served on the Council of Moore Township, as well as on Lambton County Council. He was a member of both the Masonic Lodge and of the I.O.O.F. Lodge. As a member of lodges in Michigan, he also organized the Masonic Lodge in Mooretown, which


later re-located to Courtright.

When the Presbyterians in Courtright, who had previously worshipped at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Mooretown, decided they wanted a church in Courtright, George was instrumental in establishing the new church. As donor of half the cost of the new building and donor of the needed lumber from his mill, the new church was named Stewart Presbyterian in his honour. The church was officially opened in 1892 and his wife, Jean Stewart, lived to celebrate the occasion with him before she preceded him in death on March 23, 1895.

Lt.-Col. George Stewart lived to the age of 87, passing away on Feb. 6, 1912. Jean and George are both buried in

However, items not returned by 30 days after the due date will be considered lost and borrowers will be charged

replacement fees for those items.

Fines for children's materials were eliminated in March of 2020 to ensure children have access to library material at an

early age to build literacy skills that will benefit them for life.

Library membership is free. In addition to books, cardholders can borrow a wide variety of items including DVDs, electronic books, music, movies, audiobooks, and even snowshoes.
