Changes have been made to the Municipal Elections Act, and as such, the Nomination Period has been shortened.

For those interested in running for a position on Council, for Lambton Kent District School Board Central Lambton School Board Trustee or for St. Clair Catholic District North and Central Lambton School Board Trustee, nominations are now being accepted at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre. The final day to file your nomination for any office noted above, known as Nomination Day, is Aug. 19, 2022.

stricted to areas and locations that do not obstruct vision for vehicular or pedestrian traffic, and they are subject to the consent of the adjacent land owner. They are also not permitted in municipal road allowances abutting public lands, including parks.

Any signs removed in this way will be done at the expense (\$200 per sign) of the candidate, and this money will be considered part of the candidate's own contribution to their campaign. Signs must be removed within 48hours after the day of the election. Confiscated signs will be recoverable after Oct. 24.

Waste Management, council has retracted its motion to extend the contract with Waste Management by two years. In his report, David Neely noted service by the for the purchase of efficient solar lighting. company has been very poor and not conducive to offering an extension to the contract. Staff was directed to tender waste collection (garbage and yard waste) for the period of July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2027.

Offshore emergency response report

Following the confusion over emergency response pro-cedure precipitated by a January, 2022 incident on Fawn Island, Fire Chief Richard Boyes presented a report to council outlining a number of options that could be implemented to ensure that three hard to reach areas would be serviced in a safe, timely manner.

Chief Boyes explained that two working groups were established within the fire department and given the task of researching the type of response the three problem areas would require. The teams then determined what type of equipment would be necessary to mount a safe, timely response to emergency situations in each of those areas.

In the Sydenham area, the recommended equipment for an emergency response included: an all-terrain eightwheel-drive vehicle capable of carrying four firefighters, a stretcher, rescue equipment, and a trailer to transport the vehicle to the emergency area.

The vehicle was chosen instead of a boat because water levels in the area fluctuate and the riverbed is littered with sunken debris and trees that could damage a water craft. There is also a need to travel over fields to access remote areas of the river or township. The eight-wheeler is also a vehicle of choice for fire departments in many areas of Ontario that have similar landscapes.

For Fawn and Stag Islands, several scenarios were considered and two watercrafts with specific capabilities were recommended. The boats would have to carry six firefighters and allow adequate entry and exit for them. They would also need to carry a stretcher, a fire hose and other necessary equipment, and have a self-contained water pump capable of providing effective firefighting flows. The boats would be of sufficient width, length, and power to safely and effectively negotiated the St. Clair

River in most weather conditions. And they would be hauled on trailers that would get them to the shoreline nearest the incident in a timely manner. The cost per boat, including the trailer, is estimated at \$300,000.

Chief Boyes's report was accepted and tabled until staff could get further information on the recommended vehicles.

Fawn Island parking lot lighting

The Fawn Island parking lot has experienced vandalism, the theft of boat fuel, and the theft of a Fawn Island resident's boat this year. Lighting for the lot has been re-quested by the Fawn Island Association in the hope it may be a deterrent to further criminal activities.

Parking along parkway at Brander Park discussed

When large events are held at Brander Park, some motorists have a tendency to park their vehicles at the side of the St. Clair Parkway even though the area is marked with No Parking signs. Council discussed possible ways to stop this dangerous disregard for the signs. They agreed ticketing was always a possibility, though not a desirable one since enforcement during community events would dampen the experience for the person receiving the fine.

A by-law has been proposed to address situations such as this, but for the remainder of 2022, those attending large events, such as the upcoming Aug. 20 *Mermaids and Mariners* family event, are asked to obey the law. And those who have to drive along that stretch of the parkway when it is choked with illegally parked vehicles are asked to slow down and exercise caution.

Technical upgrades approved for council chambers

The Zoom telecommunication system set up in the Council Chamber during the pandemic, which allowed council to televise meetings and communicate face-toface with delegations from industry and the community, was done with minor upgrades throughout the two years public buildings were closed. A report to council noted that, because it was believed the need for such a system was only temporary, a telecommunications or electronics company was never consulted to have a proper system installed.

During the time the staff-installed system was in use, audio and video issues arose from time to time making it difficult for those using the system to hear and/or see the proceedings. Further, the pandemic has so radically changed the way business is done that a dependable system is becoming necessary. Council has authorized staff to seek quotes and pro-

posals from companies that specialize in communication

Reedy Lane parking situation Reedy Lane in Port Lambton has a parking problem -there isn't much. But a 44-vehicle parking lot at McDon-ald Park will soon provide relief for local residents who must deal with the sometimes-inconsiderate motorists that park along their street. The new parking lot is slated to be completed by early fall, 2022. No Parking signs cur-rently installed along the street have been unenforceable because there is no mention of a related municipal by-law on them. Draft By-Law 32 of 2022 was developed to address this situation, but after some discussion and at the recommendation of staff, council tabled the motion to approve the by-law It was pointed out that the threat of ticketing illegal parking along the street would cause park visitors to park along the St. Clair Parkway and perhaps

block driveways, which could result in safety issues. In the meantime, it is hoped that motorists will be considerate when searching for a parking place near McDonald Park.

Foodcycler[™] trial going well

The Food Waste Diversion Pilot program in St. Clair Township has been a success, says Brian Black, Director of Public Works. The Foodcycler™ is now being tried by 134 township residents, as well as seven township public and catholic schools (each school received a unit as a dona-

tion from the township) and the township office. Mr. Black recommended a unit also be donated to the Wallaceburg District Secondary School, which is attended by many St. Clair Township students.

The units are still available at the St. Clair Township Civic Centre, 1155 Emily Street, Mooretown, for the subsi-dized price of \$175, and more will be ordered if demand propriate microphones, speakers, and cameras. Fire Chief clarifies Fireman's Field Day misinformation

Council was informed by St. Clair CAO John Rodey that two items of misinformation are currently circulating in the community. He pointed out that the Corunna Face-book post regarding the cancellation of the Fireman's Field Day was not accurate. The interim fire chief did not order it to be cancelled.

Current Fire Chief Richard Boyes explained the real reason for the cancellation was that an operating beer tent on firehall property was inappropriate if the hall was called out on an emergency while the event was under-way. He had suggested the beer tent be moved to the Corunna Athletic Park where the tent would not interfere

with the hall's operation as a fire station. Chief Boyes said the Fireman's Field Day benefited the community and it was hoped the event would continue. Township Community Services was prepared to assist with the use of the CAP. However, the Corunna Station decid-ed the move to the park would be too much work for everyone. Chief Boyes also clarified that no request for fire truck participation in a local parade had been denied and that fire trucks will continue to do so.

Gravel road maintenance poses challenges

The best protocols a township can develop are often no match for the whims of Mother Nature. Average rainfalls, snowfalls, and other meteorological conditions used to predict the type of care and treatments township infrastructure may require are often foiled by abnormal weather events. The recent heavy rainfalls and strong winds have posed many challenges for the Public Works staff. The township's battle with its gravel roads are a perfect example.

Council recently requested a review and report on gravel road conditions in the township be made after several complaints about their condition had been received.

In his report to council, David Neeley, Coordinator of Operations, wrote that spring is normally a time of poor gravel conditions due to the thawing of road surfaces, increased precipitation, and the lack of favourable weather and road conditions to properly grade the 327.6 kilometres of the townships gravel roads.

kilometres of the townships gravel roads. When road surfaces thaw, water frozen under the road bed rises to the surface creating soft spots in the granular that easily becomes potholes, especially if rainfall is plentiful. At the end of March, graders are dispatched to "spot grade" the worst areas, and minimize potholes and soft areas. As weather conditions improve in April, the graders begin grading all roads, but it generally takes about three grading runs to eliminate potholes, depending on depth. Graders must work the road gradually to set up a solid platform for the application of new granular.

Dust control is applied by a contractor as grading on each road is completed. Once the dust control is applied, grading is limited, letting future rainfall spread and wash the calcium chloride over the remaining road surface. July 1 through September 30, spot grading is required

July 1 through September 30, spot grading is required and most grading is not recommended because it creates more dust and cancels the benefits of dust control.

Autumn grading typically requires three trips to prepare the roads for winter. In winter, grading is done when required and weather permits.

The seasonal work done by Public Works staff requires constant attention to this schedule, as well as random weather events that may af-

weather events that may affect the schedule, in order to ensure that roads are maintained.

Motorists are asked to be patient when encountering the trucks and graders required to carry out road maintenance.

10th Anniversary of Sombra Museum Cultural Centre celebrated

The Sombra Museum Cultural Centre officially ioined the Victorian-era Bury House on the corner of Smith Street in Sombra on June 19, 2012. And on June 19, 2022, a small celebration was

held at the Cultural Centre to mark 10 years of

the to mark to years of heritage preservation. The Bury House, built in 1881 and purchased by the Sombra Township His-torical Society in 1958, had been housing collec-tions and exhibits and tions and exhibits, and preserving local heritage of the township since June 19, 1959, when it became the first museum in Lambton County. In 1972,

the former Sombra Township assumed ownership of the house

from the Historical Society, with a board comprised of two members of Sombra Council and five Historical Society members. Through the years, board membership has grown to 14 and they have worked hard to promote the community's rich heritage

In 2011, thanks to strong community support, enough funds were raised to begin construction on a second building. And on June 19, 2012, the Sombra Township Museum Cultural Centre, as it has been renamed, opened its doors to the pub-lic. It now houses: the Marine Room (Great Lakes Hall); World War II Exhibit; Maude Dalgety Reference Room; and the Con-ference Hall (Shawanese Hall.) And since opening, it has provided a community venue for valuable, illuminating programs such as the winter lecture series. It continues to be a schol-arly space where history is the spoken language.


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Lambton County Historical Society holds first post-pandemic meeting

County dignitaries gather to re-open Oil Museum of Canada

The Oil Museum of Canada, a designated National Historic Site, recently held a grand re-opening ceremony with local digni-taries on hand to cut the yellow ribbon. The ceremony drew a happy crowd of museum supporters and visitors, local dignitaries and museum/county staff members.

The museum had been closed to undergo a \$1 million renovation project which involved a number of substantial infrastructure changes and upgrades. During the closure, the creation story of the petroleum industry and the crucial role the Oil Springs area and its people played in that story, was streamlined to better-inform visitors. The modernization of the museum, built in 1960, included the replacement of all plain glass windows with UV-filtering panes

that will now help preserve precious exhibits that would otherwise be damaged by the light. The HVAC system and much of the inside layout is also updated to enhance the visitor experience.

The emergence of the oil industry in Lambton County helped the entire area flourish. For instance, Plank Road was one of the first super highways through Lambton County. It was the first true *paved* road, surfaced with sturdy white oak planks to support the movement of the heavy horse-drawn wagons that hauled huge wooden tanks of oil across the soft, swampy heart of Lambton County. The wagons, a pioneer version of our modern tanker trucks, moved the oil from Oil Springs and central Lambton into Sarnia, where it was refined at the Black Star Refinery. Its presence provided inter-county movement that helped to connect county residents with the outside world and with each other. 100km walk of remembrance may save lives in the future

A weary procession of walkers made their way down Hill Street on Sunday, June 5 morning to finish the Dave Mounsey Memorial Fund (DMMF) Walk, which started early on June 4 in Grand Bend.

Book-ended by an Ontario Provincial Police and St. Clair Township Fire Department escort, the small procession of walkers, who had covered the complete 100 kilometre route, soldiered on. They were accompanied by a few local supporters who joined the walk to show support and appreciation for the way they had benefited from past DMMF walks.

When the group reached their final destination, an excited welcoming committee of

friends and relatives, officials, and well-wishers were at the Corunna Royal Canadian Legion Hall parking lot to greet them.

The 24-hours the group spent on the road, with only a two hour rest period, was all for a good cause. Money raised during the event is used to purchase and donate defibrillators for local public buildings. Each defibrillator is donated in the name of a fallen military, EMS, fire, or police member.

fire, or police member. A new defibrillator, bought from the proceeds of this year's walk, was donated to the St. Clair Township Corunna fire station in the name of Graham Emslie of Corunna, a Sarnia firefighter who lost his life to cancer five years ago. Mr. Emslie's family was on hand to accept the donation in his name, and his daughter, Tiegan Scott, delivered a moving message of thanks for the tribute being paid to her father's memory.

being paid to her father's memory. Although the DMMF Walk is only two years old, the long-walk donation effort has been in effect for over a decade. Huron and Area Search and Rescue (HASAR), a large Zurich-based group of about 70 professional civilian volunteers that covers the Huron, Bruce, Perth and Lambton area, has been donating defibrillators for public spaces for 12 years.

lic spaces for 12 years. The first 100km DWWF walk, which took walkers from Ilderton to Wingham, honoured OPP officer Dave Mounsey, who was an early supporter of the defibrillator program. He died as the result of injuries sustained in a



vehicle collision while on the way to an emergency call. To date, six of the donated defibrillators have been used to save lives.

OPP Sgt. Patrick Armstrong, a HASAR commander, and OPP Det. Sgt. Dave Matheson, along with equine care specialist Sam –

Children learn valuable safety lessons during SCRCA's Spring Water Awareness Program
