### Looking ahead to Christmas at Aloore Aluseum

The leaves aren't off the trees yet, but at the Moore Museum, planning is an on-going thing and Christmas is one of the highlights of the year. As always, the museum's An Old Fashioned Christmas, it's most popular school program, is already being fine-tuned for another season. About 1,000 children attend each year to experience Christmas in the past. The log cabin is decorated for a pioneer family Christmas while trees and toys in the main building bring Victorian Era traditions to life. Students taste history when they participate in a taffy pull and sample the results. And each student creates a pioneer or Victorian-style decoration to take home to add to their family's Christmas tradition. Adults who visit the museum often recall attending the program as kids and making a decoration that still hangs on their tree each year.

This program is available for school groups from Nov. 24 to Dec. 18 this year. Morning and afternoon bookings are offered, and evenings can be booked for children's groups, although these slots fill up quickly. Programs must be booked in advance and teachers are advised to call the museum early to ensure the best choice of dates. The cost of the program is \$4.50 per student. ## **Moore Foundation grants awarded**

Two St. Clair Township groups recently received grants from the Moore Foundation to further their good work. The Moore Museum's grant is being used to help fund a reserve collection holding facility. Artifacts the museum cannot use at any given time will be documented, safely stored, and preserved in the room, which features environmental control. The room was modified by volunteers. The Brigden Community Decoration Team used the grant to purchase new flags for the town and to buy low-maintenance 'everlasting' planter arrangements that can be reused from year to year. The team members also do general cleanup tasks throughout the year and participate in seasonal efforts such as decorating the town for Christmas.
