Moore Museum's school programs put students in touch with history

The new school year is underway and the Moore Museum's engaging school programs are ready to help teachers



bring their student's studies to life with a variety of Ontario Curriculum-related school programs designed for Kindergarten through Grade 7. The programs help students "become" pioneer children as they write with quill pens in the one-room school house, dip candles at the log cabin, try their hands at making poked rugs, or churn butter and sample it on fresh bread.

Moore Museum education programs are especially beneficial in connection to the continuity and change concept of social studies thinking. As students interact with first-person "pioneer" interpreters surrounded by artifacts inside

historic buildings, they are able to compare various aspects of their lives to those of early settlers.

Particularly popular is the

annual Christmas program. Students have the opportunity to learn about the origins of many Christmas customs. They also learn about pioneer celebrations by visiting the decorated log cabin and schoolhouse, creating a tree ornament to take home, and enjoying a good old fashioned taffy-pull.
